When we sent out the email to you announcing the fire, many of you responded. Here is a sample of some of your replies:



"I am heartbroken. I spent many years at the club and many years on the board. Too many fond memories up in smoke. Like many of the past members who have gone before us, the memories are with me forever. Regards, Dino"

"Thanks for the update. My profession is home building and I have done major fire restoration on several buildings including a 400 year English walnut mansion that had been torn down in England and shipped to the US around 1908. I restored it in the late '60s and then took it apart and reconstructed it piece by piece in the mid '70s. I am a volunteer for any position you might need to fill. — Joe"

We have gotten off to a decent start to our recovery but we will need to be flexible, adaptable and innovative in adjusting our ongoing operations. The LBCC website will become a focal point for dissemination of current information about the club. It should be the first place you check when you have questions.

I'm always impressed with the diversity of talent in the club. When we have challenges, people who have the expertise that's needed seem to just appear to help out. They are like guardian angels. So as I stood there on Monday morning at 8:00 AM looking at a wrecked club house covered in soot and with 3 inches of wet ashes on the floor, I joined a small group of members who also gathered to see the damage. The fire inspectors soon arrived to continue their work. As I wondered what to do, one of our members offered guidance: how to work with the fire

inspectors, how to get the insurance company moving, how to get approvals for quick clean up, and what kind of contractor to call in for disaster clean up. What are the odds that just at the right moment, a member shows up who is a fire captain specializing in hazmat clean up? Another member called in to offer help with clean up refer me to a contractor who could be there in 48 hours. That afternoon at 2:00 pm we began initial clean up to save the floors with a team of 12 members who shoveled wet ashes into wheelbarrows for the next 3 hours. And on it goes. It's hard not to get emotional.

The fire represents a dark moment in our club's history. The story of our recovery may represent one of the highlights. Be there to write it with me.



A Rusty Tip

considered washing my car this week so it rained. I assume everyone knows about the adverse affect water has on flies. Some hooks rust quite quickly. Indeed that is why it is often safer and more humane to the fish to just cut off a fly that is too difficult to remove without doing additional damage to the fish. The hook just rusts away in short order.

But moisture in the fly box can quickly infect all of the flies with rust, causing them to lose their hooking ability in a short time. I carry one of those desiccant cylinders I find in aspirin bottles in each of my fly boxes. It's not that I am prone to falling in the river (although I have and then I'm prone) or even fear falling out of a drift boat (NO ONE does that). But I often fish in inclement weather in either rain or snow and no matter how quickly I decide on which is the next fly to tie on, some moisture gets into the box while it is open. So my little desiccant is there like a tiny hair dryer for my flies!

I mention this only because I noticed in one of the recent fly-fishing catalogs of more stuff I that can't live without that one manufacturer is including a little desiccant material in its new line of fly boxes. Seems like a good idea to me.

Fishing with Murphy and His Law

Before taking off on a fishin' trip, you assemble everything you need and, almost invariably, a lot of things you will never need and meticulously pack them all into the car—with the exception of one thing—an antidote for Murphy's Law. As near as I can ascertain Murphy's Law states: "What can happen, Will happen".

Jack Duge and I were slated for a trip to Lake

Mead, bass fishing, and we were going in my '48 Plymouth sedan. We were sailing along quite nicely when, near Victorville, I noticed that the car was behaving a bit queerly and stopping to check found a low tire. We were close to help and got there just in time. The tire was so bad that a new tire was needed, which was put on, and we were off. Within another 50 miles—the same thing—this time we had a nail in the new tire! We had to put on the spare and stopped in Las Vegas to have the

tire fixed and then off to Temple Bar Landing.

OFF TO THE HAYSTACKS

We arranged for a boat, loaded our things into it and started across the lake. Before we left the bay we had to turn around and come back. The boat was leaking so bad we couldn't keep the water from our gear. We secured a new boat and changed our gear over to it and took off again. This time we made it and chugged across the lake to the area known as the Haystacks, which look just like haystacks downstream from the Temple. We picked a nice bay with a lot of throwing sized rocks for our camp and got everything ashore and set up.

You may ask about throwing rocks. These are for the wild burros that wander into camp in the night and you reach down from your cot and heave the rocks at them. Of course you don't go back to sleep right away because of all the braying—but you do get used to it—finally. They are very inquisitive and when the camp is quiet they will come right into the area. They also drop calling cards.

NOT SO SWEET DREAMS

Both of us were sleeping peacefully when it felt as though someone or something had hit me in the stomach! That was the morning that they fired the first atomic bomb test at Yucca Flats and we

really felt it at Lake Mead. Both of us came out of the sack and looked at each other and wanted to know" what was that?" We didn't find out till we got back to the marina. Incidentally, I don't think the bass liked it much either—we never got a hit all morning!

Going back after lunch, we got about 3 or 4 miles from camp and my 1950 5 hp Johnson outboard quit. So we rowed back to camp. We had some tools so we began

looking for the trouble and finally traced it to the outlet from the gas tank. Taking out the filter we found that it was clogged and the gas just wasn't getting through. The tough part was getting the fitting apart to clean it, which happened to be soldered in place. We had to heat it up until it came loose and voila—the motor ran! That evening we fished the cove where we camped and took some nice fish. Next morning we packed up our gear and headed back to the marina. On our way home ran into a roadblock with the officials looking for (illegal) aliens and we had to unpack all of our gear. A little further on, we were stopped again for doing 60 mph in a 55 mph area!

I am sure that *can* and *does* apply, so beware and be ready.



Fly of the Month: Super Bug

When was the last time you saw a bluegill that was large enough to fillet? Have you ever seen one that large? We're not talking about the fish at El Dorado Park—the ones that you occasionally launch on your backcast with your 4 weight when you set the hook. No, I'm talking about bluegill where you go out after them using a 7 weight.

Not too many years back, the February club trip was to Lake Morena in San Diego County. This trip helped to fuel its own special spring fever for many of the club's members. Not only is there the lure of monster bluegill but there are trophy bass inhabiting the lake. In fact the IGFA Fly Rod World Record Largemouth Bass (13 lbs., 9 oz.) was caught in Lake Morena on 8 pound test from a float tube by Ned Sewell of the San Diego Flyfishers and the lake record is 19 lbs., 3 oz. Both the bluegill and the bass provide their own brand of excitement. Sadly Lake Morena, part of the San Diego Lakes system which provides drinking water to the area, has suffered from repeated near drainings resulting from the drought conditions over the last 20 years. However, I understand that the lake is slowly coming back.

In years past, the unanimous fly of choice back then was the Super Bug. Created by LBCC club members Larry Stoner and Allan Rohrer, this fly is great for a large variety of fish and not just bass and bluegill. In Larry's book Lake Flies for Southern California, he writes "Of all the flies Allan (Rohrer) and I have fished with this fly has been the greatest surprise to us."

This fly was originally tied on a keel hook, which is no longer readily available. I have switched over to a Tiemco 200 hook tied bend-back style virtually eliminating snags. This is a marvelous pattern that does deserve a place in you're fly box, *especially* if your going to Lake Morena.

Materials for the Super Bug:

Hook: Tiemco 200 in sizes 16 to 8

(have lots of #14's for Lake

Morena)

Thread: Black 6/0 or 8/0

Weight: 6 to 12 wraps of .015" lead,

depending on the size

Tail: The center tip of a black

marabou plume, 2-4 strands

of pearl Krystal Flash

Body: Extra fine chenille—1/3

black, 1/3 emerald green,

1/3 black

Hackle: Black poor quality dry fly


over the black chenille



Instructions for tying the Super Bug:

1. Holding the hook with a pair of pliers about two headspaces behind the eye, bend the eye

portion up about 10 to 15 degrees in relation to the shank. Place the hook into the vise with point up and wind on the lead down toward the bend. Attach the thread at the headspace and wind down to the bend of the hook.



2. Tie in the marabou tail. It should be about the length of the hook and be sure it is not too thick. Place a couple strands of pearl Krystal Flash on either side

- of the tail. The Krystal Flash should extend slightly beyond the tail
- 3. Select a hackle with the barbs about 1½ times the length of the hook gap and tie it in on the far side of the hook. Tie in the black chenille and wind down 1/3 the length of the shank and tie it down. Wind the hackle about 1½ turns and tie off. Keep the hackle sparse so don't wrap too many times.
- 4. Tie in the emerald green chenille and advance the thread forward over the black chenille and the hackle. Wind the emerald green chenille down the next 1/3 of the shank and tie it off. Stand up the black hackle and wind the remaining black chenille over the final 1/3 of the shank and tie it off. Wind the black hackle over the last section of black chenille another 1 ½ to 2 turns and tie it down. Wind a small head and whip finish.


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Yellowstone in the Fall Do It Yourself


