


Our September 25 meeting, a Thursday now that we're back home again, will be both entertaining and educational. We'll hear Dennis Tsuyuki share some hard-earned secrets about Hot Creek techniques (they also work elsewhere). Dennis is a pretty young guy and will be sharing much more experience than he could assimilate on his own, thanks to Hot Creek legend, Mas Okui. Mas calls Dennis the son he never had and they've shared many good times at streamside.

Covering knowledge they've both developed the hard way—by trial and error—we'll get to glean the cream of the tips and techniques that really work. Dennis spends a lot of time at Hot Creek Ranch with people who pay big bucks to learn dry fly secrets. We get to hear the same know-how, but without the price tag or the scenery.

Dennis builds his presentation around the ABC's. But don't be fooled. This isn't kindergarten stuff; he just keeps it simple, on target and informative.

What the heck is micro-drag? If you don't know, you will after listening to Dennis. Even better, you'll know how to overcome it. Twenty foot dragfree drifts? Yeah right. But yes. That is right. You'll learn how you can do it too.

Weight forward lines? Sure, they help us with those long, straight casts that look so good on the



pond. But maybe, just maybe, there are other lines that produce more results. Dennis will give his take on the matter.

Line dressing, knots, casting techniques. It's all there. I first heard his presentation at Sierra Pacific Flyfishers as a half-day workshop. So with just an hour, be prepared to listen fast, take notes and just maybe increase your own numbers.





Van Derhoof Scores a Perfect "100"



Worth Your Salt

Attention all kayakers, small boat folk...maybe even float tubers...

Barely four miles from the clubhouse is a decent bit of water that most people drive right by, or more accurately, over. If you've ever crossed the PCH Bridge just as you come into Surfside, you know the spot. South of PCH it's called Anaheim Bay and belongs to the Navy. Since 9/11, you don't wanna fish there. Looking up the barrel of a 50-cal machine gun manned by an 18-year-old kid is a thrill, but not in a good way. North of the highway it's called Huntington Harbour and much more friendly. We'll stay on the inland side of the bridge!


Since much of the water isn't easily accessible, it doesn't get too much fishing pressure, although the kayakers are beginning to discover just what a nice piece of water it can be.

Local knowledge makes a big difference and since these are my home waters, I'm happy to share my several years of fishing experience for a club event.



Granted, not everyone has a kayak. But there are 10 Catayak discount rental coupons available at the Open House. Other kayak rentals are also available.

If you want to give it a try, Saturday, September



20 has a good tide. The Pre-trip will be on Wednesday, September 10 and will include maps, successful lures, access spots, etc. The event will be called the "Yards and Inches Tournament". The winner will be judged by the cumulative number of inches of fish caught. Three 12-inchers and you already have a yard. Any size fish adds to the total. This will be the honor system; each person measures and records his own fish. No bait, lures or flies only, barbless only. Fly rods in one category; spinning and casting in another. Any test line (smaller is better). I use six. Larger lines don't get hit as much.

What are the rules? Any sport fish you catch and remove the hook from. Long distance releases don't count.

What's a sport fish? Everything except sharks and rays.

What might you catch? I've caught calico bass, halibut, mackerel, sand bass, spotted bay bass, white sea bass, and yellow fin croaker. I've also caught sharks and rays. One ray was hooked for 110 minutes before he got tired of the silliness and simply broke the line. Another was on 93 minutes before the same thing happened.




Pond Cleaning

Fly of the Month: Ed Schroeder's Parachute Hopper

There is an old fly fishing adage states that "the larger the fish the smaller rise". While it is obviously not always true it certainly seems to be the case most of the time. I have noticed it while fishing topwater for bass with hair bugs and especially while fishing for trout with hoppers.

With hopper fishing its always the little ones, those barely larger than the fly itself, that launch themselves through the surface trying to get their tiny mouths around their perceived lunch. Meanwhile, the local toughs sip in the fly so quietly that you barely notice it. Years ago, while fishing the Wood River in Oregon, I had the epitome of a bad day. Here the river paralleled an agricultural field with a dirt road immediately next to its bank. As farm trucks ran up and down, the road the grasshoppers trying to fly out of the way were caught by the afternoon wind and blown right into the river. You could quite literally watch the rise forms follow the trucks up and down the river as trout, many in the 3 to 6 pound range and a few exceeding 10 pounds, fed on the hapless insects. As I fished the rise forms were so subtle that I missed fish after fish. Oh, the pain!

Recently, I became reacquainted with hopper fishing on a small stream in northeastern Utah. A little smaller than Hot Creek, this oasis in the desert was filled with 14" to 20" rainbows, browns and cutthroats. On a late summer afternoon the one fly that they seemed to crave was Ed Schroeder's Parachute Hopper. Ed's pattern is an excellent, low profile, slower water hopper imitation that is relatively easy to tie. Be sure to tie it in several sizes and in more than one color.

One final piece of advice—keep your eyes peeled.

Materials for tying Schroeder's Parachute Hopper:

Hook: Mustad 9671 or Tiemco 2302 in sizes 8,10 & 12

Thread: Primrose 6/o or 8/o
Post Wing: White goat body hair or

calftail tied short

Body: Pale yellow dubbing is

standard but also try tan

and pale green

Downwing: Oak mottled turkey tied

tent style

Legs: Brown turkey tail or

ringneck pheasant tail

glued and knotted

Hackle: Grizzly tied parachute

style

Thorax: Dubbing to match body

Head: Match thread color




Instructions for tying Schroeder's Parachute Hopper:

- 1 Start by cutting off two 1/4" to 1/8" wide sections of turkey or pheasant tail for the legs. Apply a generous amount of head cement or Dave's Flexament (my preference) and stroke it into the fibers and set it aside to dry. Repeat this process for the other section.
- 2 Place the hook in the vise and attach the thread to the hook at a spot over the point of the barb. Wind forward to the headspace with smooth tight wraps. Cut off a clump of goat body hair that is about ½ to ¾ the diameter of a pencil. Knock out all of the short fibers and fluff, place in a hair stacker and align the tips. Tie in the wing with the tips forward, stand it up when secured and post it with a couple of turns of thread. As this wing is only for the parachute hackle it should relatively short—no more than the gap of the hook.
- 3 Wind back down to where the thread was attached and apply dubbing to the thread. The body needs to be a little thicker than the normal dry fly so be sure to apply more than the normal amount of dubbing to the thread. Wind the dubbing onto the hook about ¾ of the way up the shank. Cut a ½" wide section of oak mottled turkey quill that will be used for the down wing. Trim the tips of the section so that it is pointed in the middle. Using the loose loop technique tie the wing section in over the body like a tent and extending to the bend of the hook.
- 4 Select the now dry sections for the legs. Tie an over-hand knot near the tip end of the section. The portion from the knot to the tip should be ½" to ½ the length of the section from the knot to the butt. With both sections knotted tie in one of the sections on either side of the body. The knot should be higher than the tented wing and the tip should extend to the end of the wing.
- 5 Apply a small amount of dubbing to the thread and wind this to a point immediately behind



the wing. Select a hackle whose barbs are about 1½ times the width of the hook gap. Tie in the hackle insuring that a small section of bare stem is exposed. This will help keep the barbs from going in all the wrong directions when you start winding. Wind the hackle by starting the first turn a little high on the wing and spiraling down to the body using about 4 to 6 turns and tie it off securely behind the wing.

6 Dub the reaming section of the body to the headspace, form a small, neat head and whip finish. Apply cement to the head and go fishin'.
