# Jack Turner and JA Memories


### BILL BOEHLERT - 1<sup>ST</sup> VICE PRESIDENT




You can join us for the whole trip or just one half or the other

### Yards & Inches World Record Broken Twice in the Same Day!

They started arriving shortly before dawn at the designated launch site just inside Huntington Harbor. There were kayaks of several sorts (single and double hulled, powered by paddle, propeller, and fins), pontoon boats with and without frames, one 18' aluminum boat, and a lone float tube. We were later joined by a motorized sailboat (minus the sail). Several in attendance had never fly fished there or any other bay. All were there in an attempt to break the world record for the 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Yards & Inches Tournament thereby gaining a lifetime of notoriety and fame.

It looked to be a great day with a nice overcast sky, no wind, a moderate incoming tide, and comfortable temperatures. We all raced for the harbor entrance to prepare for the incoming rush of water and the rising tide. The tide started slowly but eventually increased to near river-like flows. After several minutes of rigorous paddling "upstream" (or motoring for those so equipped), it was a quick ride downstream with the current. Several early hook-ups meant it definitely had the potential to be better than last year when the tide disappointed us.

Unfortunately, for several us, our initial visions of grandeur faded quickly and we were happy to simply get our first fish onboard. Others were left with valuable lessons to ponder and thoughts of those that got away. Word soon spread that Craig McLaughlin had broken the previous record of 77 total inches. However, his excitement was short lived.

Kevin Green, winner of the original Yards & Inches Tournament, roared back to reclaim his spot on the perpetual trophy and renew his reign as Harbor Master Extraordinaire. He did so with an astonishing

catch of 7 different species (halibut, spotted bay bass, sand bass, lizard fish, mackerel, croaker, and calico bass). His total of 111" spread over 11 fish set a new standard that will be hard to beat. Plans are already being drawn up to pre-fish the harbor over the coming year in an effort to close the experience gap.

Thanks to Mick Woodbury, we were all treated to a wonderful closing ceremony complete with posole, beverages, and exaggerated tales. Kevin was grilled for all the details of his winning approach, including the white over olive Clouser that caught most of his fish. Other participants and their totals included: Nani Blyleven (17"), Jim Fournell (30"), Craig Haines (0"), Tommy Kendall (0"), Van Lloyd (18"), Al Ross (6"), Robert Ruscitto (20"), John Stine (0"), Bettye Swart (0"), Jim Thomason (21"), and Mick Woodbury (24"). This event is developing into a great way to explore and experience our local water so make plans to join us next year.



# Project Healing Waters Update

On July 19, eleven volunteers from Long Beach Casting Club took nine disabled veterans from the Long Beach VAMC fishing on the West Fork of the San Gabriel River. This river is perfect for a day-long fishing trip. We were really pleased to have along Rex Jennings, the Chief of Voluntary Services, who drove the VA van for the veterans so he could see Project Healing Waters in action.

Club member Chuck Moore and another Forest Service representative met us at the Educational Center and escorted us beyond the locked gate so that we had most of the eight miles of the West Fork to ourselves. For those who have not been there, this section has four handicapped-accessible fishing ramps. This is important for our group because we had two vets in wheelchairs and several who walk with canes. The casters learned that, while the trees provide pleasant relief from the hot sun, they can be a problem for those who aren't careful about their casting. It was a good learning experience.

Matt, a relative newcomer to our group, caught the most fish (seven) during the three hours of fishing and the largest at eleven inches. He also lost the most flies in the trees, but he was all smiles. Any day on the water is a good day, but when seven out of nine disabled vets catch fish, it is a very good day.

One of our participants just returned from a PHW trip to western Montana. Jesse selected a similar trip last year as his prize for winning the national rod building contest, and he was invited back again this year by the hosts, who include Ed Nicholson, the PHW founder and CEO. Again this year, Jesse had a great trip in a variety of fishing environments.


Matt has been selected to participate in a PHW trip to West Yellowstone the end of August. In addition

### Fly of the Month: Foam Beetle

 $\mathsf{T}$ t's mid to late summer and I have just reminded myself that I have been neglecting an important  $oldsymbol{\perp}$  part of a trout's diet — terrestrials. The land dwelling insects that fall accidentally and somewhat helplessly into the aquatic food chain. But at this time of year when the hatches of more notable fishier types of insect species wane while they wait for cooler weather, then terrestrials can prove their value many times over.

Fishing the margins and edges of streams, grass banked ones in particular, with terrestrial patterns such as beetles, ants grasshoppers and crickets can be very effective. I remember one trip to Henry's Fork years ago when one club member worked for over an hour to one particular fish, a particularly large fish, and finally nailed it with a Crowe Beetle (yes, that is the correct spelling).

This pattern has been quite effective on a variety of water types such as spring creeks (the Henry's Fork and Hot Creek), tailwater fisheries (the Green River) and freestone rivers (the Madison and to some extent the Owens River). The wing liners on this fly, which stick out from under the shellback, add to the illusion that the poor creature is struggling in the surface film attempting to fly away.

### Materials for tying the Foam Beetle:

Hook: Standard dry fly; sizes 12 to 20

Thread: Black 6/o or 8/o

Body: Fluorescent green Krystal Flash

Shell back: Black closed cell foam (evasote or other)

Wing liners: Fluorescent green Krystal Flash


Legs: Black rubber legs Head:



### Instructions for tying the Foam Beetle:

- Start by attaching your thread to the hook at the bend of the hook and wind forward to the head space. Put a drop of cement on the thread to help lock it in place.
- 2. Cut a ¼" wide by 1/8" thick by 2" long piece of foam and tie it onto the hook by winding down to the bend and back to the head space. Make sure it is firmly attached to the hook and lies squarely on top of the hook.
- 3. Tie in the 2 to 4 strands of the Krystal Flash body and wrap them to the bend and back to the head space. Tie in the 8 to 12 strands of Krystal Flash wing liners on top of the hook and trim them so they are the same length as the body.
- 4. Tie on the legs with 2 legs per side and using 'X' wraps.
- 5. Pull the foam shell back forward and tie it down firmly at the head space directly in front of the

legs and whip finish. Trim off the excess foam in the same manner as an elk hair caddis creating its head.


