Leader's Line...

Who Wudda Thunk It? Fly Casting for Par!

Well it happed and hopefully it will happen again. In December, Hutch Hutchinson a designer and Orvis representative for the Bend Oregon Orvis Fly Casting Course came to LBCC and set up a mini golf course with holes in and around the Casting Pond. The course was set up to utilize various casting skills that one would encounter in real fishing situations. Each hole has skill levels for beginner intermediate and advanced. Some of the skill levels relate to the starting position of the first cast which is similar to the men's and ladies tees in golf. Other skill levels involve accuracy such as larger rings at the target for beginners and decreasing sizes for advanced levels. As the difficulty increases specialty casts such as curve casts come into play.

Throughout the year I have had requests to schedule every bizarre event that you could think of. When Bob Middo called me and asked if we could put this event on the calendar, I thought "what kind of Goofy thing is this?" My first thought was to shine the event with some bogus excuse, but then I realized that Bob Middo was requesting this".

Bob is one of the clubs most accomplished casters—a Master Instructor Single-Hand and Two-Handed Certified Instructor. Knowing that he wouldn't suggest something that did not merit our participation, I skeptically agreed to the event. This probably was one of my best leaps of faith decisions I have made.

About 20+ members showed up to participate in the Golfing with Flies event on a night that there was so much fog around the club that I expected to see I cabod Crane emerge out of Sleepy Hollow and ride onto the course. Visibility was good enough for the group to

divide up into foursomes and do a Shotgun Start.

The fun had just begun and contrary to most golfers, the participants had to place full faith in the honesty of their group, as the location of the fly after the cast was most difficult with the lighting conditions on the grass. Also, as in golf, decisions had to be made as to whether to lie up or go for it. Mark Tsunawaki, never being feign of heart, decided to go for it. Where it was prudent to go around the tree at the end of the pond, Mark decided to cut the corner and cast between the pond and the tree. Had there been 1/32 knot of wind to the right, he might have regretted that decision, however either luck or skill prevailed and he landed on the concrete bank of the pond, just six inches from the water (water is a no no and rewards your entry the same as in golf. One hole had an expert target ring so small, that if your approach shot to the hole



brought you within ten feet of the ring, your could not cast to it. That is, not until one of the "experts" figured out that if you took off the tip of your rod, you could make the cast using just the tip.

The entire duration of the game you could hear people laughing and whining all around the course. Everyone was sort of quasi-serious about the game and I think this is what made if so much fun.

After everyone had finished, Hutch gave a very detailed explanation of the Orvis course located in Bend Oregon along with the challenges and learning opportunities that were considered in its design. If you are in the area of Bend Oregon, it would be well worth your time to check out the course. If the fish are not biting that day, consider playing golf.

At the end of the day I think everyone came out with the same enthusiasm and understanding that this was not just some "Goofy Idea". Instead there has been interest in seeing how LBCC could implement some mini version of the Orvis concept. For this reason, we will be having an informal gathering for anyone interested in looking into the possibilities available to us. We will show the date of this gathering in the Calendar Section when it becomes available.

Jeff Sadler & The Green River





Maggie Merriman Entomology Workshop





Fly of the Month: Anchovy Baitfish

 \sqsubset veryone reading this would love to fool and feel the pull of a 5 pound trout. But have you ever tried the pull 🖵 of a 5 pound bonito, skipjack tuna, corbina, halibut, striper or yellowtail? Frankly, there is no comparison between a trout and virtually any saltwater species of fish. Sadly, far too few freshwater fly fishers have experienced this thrill. But when or if they do, they are never quite the same.

This month's fly is the same pattern I have used in the salt for years. You can add feathers to it, tie in an extra hook, make it two inches long and almost transparent for bonito or stretch it out and bulk it up to 12"-15" for billfish of 100 pounds or better but it's still the same "basic" fly. The dark green/medium green/white combination given in the pattern imitates an anchovy. Tie it in a size range of #4 through #1/o for local fishing. It is easy to tie and casts remarkably well for it's size and is durable to last through several fish.

You can "match the hatch" with other color combinations such as green/yellow/white (mackerel), Black/ gray/white (sardines and mullet) and blue/green/white (sardiñas, runners and flying fish). Remember this however, when tying these flies use a quarter to one half the amount of material that you think you need. This pattern works best when dressed lightly. There are times when you need the fly to land with a distinct "splat" lighter weight and appearance is generally better.

So tie one on, run over to King's Harbor or hit the surf this winter and enjoy the experience.

Materials for tying the Anchovy Baitfish:

Hook: Mustad or Tiemco stainless steel or cadmium plated in sizes #4 to #4/o

Thread: White 3/o or Flymaster plus

Tail: White natural goat or synthetic "saltwater" hair and pearl Krystal Flash

Gills: Dyed red tanned rabbit skin or matuka strip. Underwing: Same as tail but without the Krystal Flash


Overwing: Dark green natural goat or synthetic hair and black pearlescent Krystal Flash over medium

green natural goat or synthetic hair and fluorescent lime green Krystal Flash

White thread with pearl Krystal Flash over the top (an option to help it sink faster is to place a Head:

large cone shaped bead onto the hook at the start and wrap over it with the Krystal Flash)

3mm to 9mm doll eyes (I prefer yellow with a black pupil) hot glued to the fly and the hook Eyes:



Instructions for tying the Anchovy Baitfish:

- 1. Start tying by attaching your thread to the hook and wind down to the bend and place a drop of head cement on the thread and let it soak in. Tie in a clump of hair that is about 1 ½ to 2 times the length of the shank. You will have to adjust the amount of hair depending on the size of the hook but err to side of wimpy rather than bulky. Tie in about 10 to 20 strands of Krystal Flash on top.
- 2. Cut two small triangles of the rabbit skin gills and tie them in on either side of the hook at the same location as the tail. Advance the thread forward to the head space and tie the underwing on the underside of the hook. Use the same amount as the tail and its length should be about halfway between the end of the tail and the bend of the hook.
- 3. Tie in the medium green hair with the lime green Krystal Flash on top and they should extend back

- to the end of the tail. Tie in the dark green hair on top of the medium green with the black Krystal Flash on top of it all. The dark green should be a little thicker than the medium green.
- 4. Wind a smooth head and tie in 3-4 strands of pearl Krystal Flash and wind up the head and back down tie off and whip finish the thread. Using a permanent black marking pen color the top of the head. Invert the fly and apply a liberal drop of Sally Hanson's Hard as Nails With Nylon and let it dry. The color of the top of the head will perfectly match the hair and Krystal Flash on the top of the wing and inverting the fly will keep the ink from running to the underside of the head.
- 5. Use a hot glue gun and glue the doll eyes to the fly just forward of where the tail was tied in (make sure it is in front of the gills which should peek through the hair). This location is much more natural looking than sticking them on the fly's head.
