Leader's Line ...

Is the LBCC Well Endowed"? Not Yet, However it is on the Way

It seems like it takes an unpleasant event to motivate people to take action to seek a solution to the situation. The unpleasant event I am referring to was the necessity for LBCC to increase the annual dues for club membership this year.

Recognizing that increasing costs to operate our club is a reality, the Board of Directors and other concerned members have "stepped up to the plate" to investigate supplemental methods of easing our future financial obligations. Numerous ideas are being investigated to supplement our current income sources; however, any suggestions to be effective over the long term must be of a recurring nature to insure an ongoing revenue stream.

Although the club is financially sound, we are striving to insure that it stays that way. In an informal discussion on the subject, Howard Uller made the suggestion that LBCC set up an Endowment Fund. After a couple of months of tweaks and improvements to the original draft that Howard prepared and presented to the Board of Directors, a final version was approve at the March 7, 2011 Board Meeting.

To give a simplistic explanation of how the fund will work, I refer to an old TV advertisement for Roach Control in your home. They were selling a product called the Roach Motel where the theme was the "The roaches come in but they don't go out". Or if you don't remember that ad, try a line from the Eagle's song HOTEL CALIFORNIA, "You can check in but you can never leave". What does this have to do with our Endowment Fund? The concept is that monies contributed to the fund are not available for distribution for the clubs daily operating needs—with the exception of a catastrophic event that would threaten the existence of the club. All contributions will be held in some form of a fiduciary account, the details of which are being established. Only the income from the fund would be distributed for general club usage.

In the beginning, this will probably be of minimal benefit, however as the fund builds, the income should increase. After a few years the fund should increase to the point that this will be a material benefit to our annual operations.

Keep LBCC in mind when you are deciding what to do with the lottery money you just won, or for the destination of current or future charitable contributions that you may be considering.



Patagonia Chronicle: Encountering the Unexpected

Gary and I had arranged three days of advance fishing before our group arrived. But our outfitter doubted that this group of old guys had the

stamina to deal with the demands of walking and wading the wilds of Patagonia, so to some degree we were proving ourselves. Day one we fished the Catan Lil, a small river about the size of the Lower O and wehadanicewarm up. Now we were in the big time, hiking over gravel bars, river rock and slick bottoms (no cleats) in fast water on the Collon Cura to fish the big river and its more remote serpentine back

channels that wound their way through a maze of deep wooded banks.

We started around 9:00 AM; now it was late afternoon and Gustavo, our guide, and I were into a picturesque channel under a canopy of trees in dense woods. We had found a deep pool and I in my waders had gone across as I cast my dry-dropper rig to see if Mr. Brown might be home while Gus observed carefully from the other bank. When I finished I looked over

and realized that without waders, he had decided to stay on the opposite bank. He suggested that I bushwhack upstream on my side of the bank and meet him at the mouth of the stream where it met the river. I agreed.

So I continued upstream, observing the water, looking for additional opportunities to fish deeper pools if I could get to them through overgrowth. Strange, I thought, as I saw a pile of scat; that doesn't look like droppings from the red stag deer but more like bear...

bears; perhaps javelina? While still looking for another chance at the stream I encountered another pile. The going was getting tougher through the dense wood and I saw a game trail that lead to an opening to the sunlit gravel beyond the wooded area. As I turned to follow the trail I looked up to see a cougar looking back at me from 100 feet or so at

but there are no

the opening. Our eyes met. Holy smoke! I thought as I watched him turn and casually walk away giving me a good view of his hind quarters and long tail.

As I felt a shot of adrenaline, I thought, time for plan B. I'll hike back downstream to where I saw another opening. Besides I'll bet he is long gone and just as unhappy about seeing me as I am about seeing him. So I got to the next opening, looked out and had an "oh s***" moment because there he was again

looking back at me and not the least bid perturbed. That's when I got scared.

Okay, I'm hustling back downstream, not running but moving as fast as I can to the original entry at the deep pool; this time I'm across in a flash to the other side. Despite what I agreed to with Gustavo, I now have no intention of walking the other bank upstream. Now I'm walking this side upstream for the next 15 minutes or so but the stream has now become braids and faded out. The river is nowhere in sight. My reference point is almost gone.

The time: 6:30, the long shadows signal about one more hour of daylight. I wonder, should I keep going—see if I can find the river or perhaps I should go back to the pool where Gus and I last saw one another because by now he must be looking for me. Can I find the spot again? Or should I bushwhack in the direction where I think I can hear the sound of an occasional car in the distance? Gustavo told me that he got lost once when he was exploring this place and he slept in the woods that night. Sounds easy enough but do I have matches in my back pack? Then of course there is the cougar....and I know I am definitely not spending the night. I wish I had taken the time to get my bearings so I'd know that the road was really in the direction of those high hills. Then there is another pesky problem: I have no water; Gus has it.

Well I'll see if I can find the spot by the pool where we last saw one another although by now I'm not real pleased about hiking through the tall grass. Sure enough I found it without too much trouble.

I'll give it about a half hour wait; keep calling about every five minutes; odds are Gus is looking for me right now. In about 15 minutes, I hear a shout back and see his blue shirt emerging from across the stream. As we meet he says, "Why didn't you meet me at the river?"

Now the guys in the group refer to me as 'Cougar Man'. I just refer to me as Stupid.

AGAIN... Many of you did not make it on this trip because of the monster storm that was predicted. And once again, the monster storm did not materialize.


AGAIN... The dry fly action was excellent and starting for many as early as 9:00 AM and not ending until 4:00 PM.

here is one more month left in the annual rod building program before the completed rods are sent to Pennsylvania for judging. In January, custom rod builder Terry Henson came to our class to demonstrate some of his feather inlay techniques, and show his inlaid grips and reel seats. Several of the veterans in our program are now using some of his techniques. One Purple Heart Medal recipient has inlaid the reel seat and a portion of the grip with Purpleheart wood, added a Purple Heart USPS stamp and some feather embellishment. At least two others are working on feather inlay. The quality of work has improved dramatically each year and it's always exciting to see the final products.

We have another trip to the Big Horn River planned for this September. Last year's trip was such a success that it didn't take long to decide to go again. This year, we are going with disabled veterans from the Mission Hills VAMC in the Sepulveda Valley, where a Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing program is run by Sierra Pacific Fly Fishers. We're hoping to take eight vets from Long Beach and six from Mission Hills.

We officially started fundraising for this trip at the Pasadena Fly Fishing Show, where many people came to our booth, said that they had seen us on Fly Rod Chronicles and put a donation in the box without being asked. 

Procedure for Locking Up the Clubhouse

Here are the procedures that all members who are entrusted with keys must observe when unlocking and locking up the clubhouse. We cannot stress how vitally important that these procedures be followed.

The person opening club is responsible for the lockup. If you will be leaving prior to lockup, designate someone to lock the club. Prior to locking door that you are exiting (usually the front door) please perform the following:

- Check to be sure that all exit doors & windows are locked. The doors that require locking are the kitchen, wet room & front door. The two doors in the meeting room with push bars are self locking and should not be touched—please, do not dead holt!
- Turn the coffee pots off and check to be sure range top and oven is off
- Close all interior doors.
- Turn off all lights; both interior and exterior (porch)
- Turn off air conditioning/heater and fireplace
- Enter your code number into the system and exit within 60 seconds
- Lock the deadbolt on door you are exiting
- Close and lock the driveway gate

Many of the more experienced members in attendance assisted with the ON THE RIVER CLINIC held the same weekend. 15 new fly fishers were introduced to the Libeu method of nymphing which is so effective on the Lower Owens. They were also treated to dry

fly, streamer, and soft hackle casting demonstrations along with an introduction to entomology, river safety, and reading the water.

The fishing was pretty good, but not great. If you were in the right place at the right time (generally a pool below faster water from 12:00–1:00) you were rewarded with a brief BWO hatch. The fishing really picked up during that time. Outside of that period covering lots of water fishing the deeper water resulted in several additional fish.

It's always surprising Saturday night at the Pizza Factory when you see just how many people are in attendance. All 25–30 club members were up for the weekend, all having a good time sharing good food and fishing stories. 

Fly of the Month: Parachute Emerger


ne of the greatest revelations of the last 20 years of fly-fishing has been the emerger. This style of fly and life phase of the mayfly has proven to be one the most effective weapons an angler has for taking fish in difficult spring creek and slow water conditions.

For those new to the sport and still learning about entomology and particularly the mayfly cycle of life I will include a few insights about emergers. As the name implies this phase of the mayfly is the transition from being an aquatic nymph to flying adult. With many species of mayfly, especially fast water species, the emerging or metamorphosis happens so quickly that is seldom ever seen by fish or fisher and is of no benefit to the angler. The fish feed on the nymphs while they ascend to the surface and then quickly fly away.

However, for slow water species like Blue-Winged Olives, Pale morning Duns, Green Drakes, Sulphurs and several others their emergence is much more perilous. These mayflies rest helplessly in the surface film freeing themselves of their nymphal shuck or for the wings to expand and dry. These insects are an easy target and the trout know it. They quickly learn that these mayflies will not fly away and will ignore all other foods or imitations

For those of you planning a trip to the Green River be sure to have some of these flies for the "scum suckers". Overcast, early afternoons on the Green produce an excellent hatch of Baetis in the back eddies and slow side currents. Large trout, aka "scum suckers" feed heavily on these insects and the Parachute Emerger is an excellent choice to fool them.

Materials for tying the Parachute Emerger:



Instructions for tying the Parachute Emerger:

- Place the hook into the vise and attach your thread. Wind sown to the mid-point of the shank and then back to the thorax creating a smooth stable base. Select a short, full CDC plume (use two if necessary) and tie it in with the tips pointing forward. Stand up and post the wing with few wraps of thread and a tiny drop of head cement. The wing should be shorter than normal—about $\frac{1}{2}$ = 2/3's the length of the shank.
- 2. Select a good quality hackle with a barb length of about 3/4 the length of the shank. Remove any excess barbs from the stem and tie in the hackle alongside the wing with the dull/concave side facing forward. Make sure that enough bare stem is exposed so that you can later wrap about half a turn without hitting any barbs. This will make cleaner looking parachute hackle with fewer stray barbs sticking out at odd angles.
- 3. Advance the thread about half the way down the



bend. Select a half dozen to a dozen strands (depending on the hook size) of Zelon fibers for the tail and tie them in. The length should be about 3/4 the length of the body and should appear sparse. The idea is to have the tail below the surface not holding the fly up above it.

4. Apply dubbing to your thread and wind a thin smooth body. Wind the hackle parachute style approximately 2 to 4 turns around the base of the wing depending on the size of the fly. Remember to wind from high to low. Tie off the hackle and apply more dubbing to your thread and smoothly dub the thorax from behind the wing to headspace. Wind a small, smooth head, whip finish and apply head cement and your fly is ready for your next trip.

The Club will hold its annual Awards and Installation Dinner at the clubhouse on Sunday April 17, 2011 at 5:00 PM.


