Leader's Line...

Fishing or Catching?

We have all heard that old saying "The fishing was great, but the catching was kind of slow." Back in the days before I started fly fishing, I always viewed that maxim as pure sophistry, just obscuring a lack of luck behind a witty smokescreen.

Now that I have converted to fly fishing, the logic is much clearer. The beautiful surroundings, the artistry of the cast, the whisper of the stream, the wind in the conifers—so many factors combine to make the fishing experience sublime in itself. Nevertheless, catching still adds a lot to the experience. So, why do some fishermen always seem to get the hookups?

Sometimes the difference between the guy catching and another who is just fishing is obvious. One stalks the spots carefully, examines the bugs on the rocks, takes the water temperature, and pumps fish stomachs. His flies are tied like works of art, and he casts them with precision. He analyzes each rise to determine what is being taken and how far below the surface. He has already studied what bugs hatch in that particular spot in that particular month. His systematic, methodical approach maximizes his success.

Other times, the difference between you (hypothetical "you" in this case) and the guy with the constantly bent rod are less obvious. He doesn't cast any better than you, his flies are tied in a similar fashion (or he might even be using yours!), he is equally casual approaching the stream and casting out the fly he

tied on the night before, yet he keeps getting takes. You might be pulling identical streamers from a float tube, fishing the same sinking line and identical woolly buggers, yet the trout are yanking the rod out of his hands. Or perhaps you are in a boat together on Crowley, using identical midges at identical depths. But one indicator keeps diving while the other only indicates disinterest. What gives?

It seems that some folks are just "fishy." Whether it is karma from a previous existence, an innate oneness with the universe, or some strange soul-meld with the trout, these anglers almost always find a way to get fish to bite. It is an elusive quality, a je ne sais quoi attribute that no one can isolate or imitate. Those who possess it probably don't have much of a clue either, and just respond with "I would rather be lucky than good."

Until I figure it out, I will be sure to appreciate the beauty of the surroundings, the whisper of the stream, and all the other pleasures of fly fishing.

In the meantime, may you all have great fishing—and catching—this year.

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Fly Fishing Big Bear Lake





A Gift That Keeps on Giving


BCC members have a great reputation for their generosity. Many of you give freely of your time, talent and treasure on behalf of the club. I suppose some of us like to give something back in return for the valuable education and camaraderie we have experienced. Some just like teaching others. Eventually all of us find a way of doing our share even when it involves 'paying it forward' for the benefit of new or future members.

What if you could give the club a gift that would keep on giving indefinitely, even long after you have passed on to that perfect trout stream in paradise; a gift that would provide a quiet reminder each year that you cared enough to make a difference?

About eighteen months ago one of our board members, Howard Uller and I began to explore the idea of establishing an endowment fund for the club. It seemed like a good idea: a way for members to provide an enduring gift to the club; a way for the club to have a modest source of income to offset increases in expenses.

Of course the idea raises lots of questions, so we recruited a team of people (Gary Spencer, Joe Gustaff, Rich Garrett and Mick Woodbury) with financial, legal and business experience to help. And we collected lots of copies of plans from other non-profit organizations. The main source of guidance came from Howard who brings a rich and varied career of fund raising and endowment experience.

Eventually we came up with a proposal, presented it to the board and they approved it in January 2011. Then we discussed it with the club's past presidents and received their enthusiastic endorsement. I think the only complaint was wishing that we had done it years ago.



The following is general information about the fund. The purpose of the fund is to provide for the long term funding and financial stability of the Long Beach Casting Club which owns the fund and has ultimate authority and control over all property in the Fund, and the income derived from it. The Board establishes rules, procedures, and policies for the operation and administration of the fund and your president appoints a committee to administer the fund.

The fund operates under specific guidelines and procedures. The fund is a restricted fund. That means only the net investment earnings (interest and dividends) from the fund may be used by the club for operational costs. The fund's net investment earnings will be transferred to an operations account of the club on a quarterly basis at the discretion of the board. The capital gains will be reinvested into the fund's principal. A withdrawal of principal may be considered only under circumstances in which the future survival of the club is at risk. A withdrawal of principal must be unanimously approved by the Board, as well as by a majority of members of the club at a special meeting convened as specified in the Bylaws of the Long Beach Casting Club.

A seven member Endowment Committee oversees and administers the fund. Members will serve for indefinite terms but will be reviewed and appointed annually by the President. The committee's goals are: to foster the growth of the Fund by means of promoting donations; to assure the conservation of principle and to generate a reliable and reasonable rate of long term net investment earnings. The committee consists of Rick Hilles and Howard Uller as co-chairs and Joe Gustaff, Rich Garrett, Mick Woodbury, Kathy Kim and Gary Spencer.

The investment strategy for the fund will focus on conservative and moderate risk investments. Consideration will not be given to aggressive strategies associated with profit maximization and market timing using short-term and/or speculative investments. The Committee will be given flexibility within the above guidelines to use their expertise and experience towards the achievement of the fund's investment goals.

No conflicts of interest will be allowed. Under no circumstances shall any endowment committee member, member of the board of Directors, or any member of the club be permitted to gain any benefit or profit, directly or indirectly, from the management, maintenance, or existence of the fund, including, but not limited to any fee, referral fee, or receipt of benefits in kind.

If at some future time the Long Beach Casting Club merges with any other club, all the provisions in respect to the Endowment Fund would apply to the merged club. If the LBCC should ever be dissolved without any lawful successor, the fund, including both principal and interest to date, shall be distributed as specified under the club's Articles of Incorporation.

The committee plans to do several things promote donations to the fund; they involve regular articles in TargetTalk, educational/informational presentations at monthly business meetings three times a year, as well as at the annual membership meeting. We also plan to have an annual or semi-annual breakfast seminar promoting estate planning/financial planning and the club's endowment fund.

We know that it sounds like a long story and a lot of detail. But the concept is simple: to make a gift to the club that will live on in perpetuity. If you would like to make a cash donation or a bequest from your estate, talk to any member of the Endowment Committee.



Fly of the Month: WD-40

Iknow winter is almost over and it is time to start focusing on mayflies and caddis but you may be making a serious mistake. If you fish anywhere this spring or early summer it is likely to have abundant, hatching populations of Midges and Baetis and the WD-40 is one pattern that needs to be with you. Can you say the Owens (Upper and Lower), the Green, the San Juan, the Colorado and several dozen more I failed to mention? Of course you can...

Spring is a day to day occurrence in the High Country. Winter continues to hang on with cold blustery conditions and the WD-40 is still a must have for these colder hatch conditions. The fly, invented by Mark Engler (also referenced as John) for use on the Frying Pan River in Colorado where large Midges and lots of Baetis mayflies are a preferred food source for the river's trout population. However the WD-40 is quite versatile in imitating other species of insects depending on the color, size and style that you tie. It is a good idea to carry the fly in several different colors to match local conditions including tan, black, pink, red and gray beyond the olive shown here. Vary the sizes to include a range of #16 down to #20.

This pattern has been around since the '80s and because of its popularity it has proffered more variations than you could shake a stick at. What is being presented to you is the original pattern as best as I can determine and it still, according to many, is one the best. You can add a bit of flash to the body or the wing case through the use of Krystal Flash or similar materials or add some weight and impart a jigging action by adding a bead head. Still other variations include adding a wing—in particular a short, upright emerging wing.

Fishing it dead drift with an indicator or a dropper dry fly is my favorite method of using the WD-40. Be sure to complete your drift and allow the imitation to rise through the water column like an emerging insect or you will be missing about 40% of your strikes. Continue to retrieve the fly slowly for a short distance before your next presentation and drift. Fishing the WD-40 in this fashion is a great way to spend the day.

Materials for tying the WD-40:

black

Hook: Midge emerger style such as a Tiemco #2487, size #16-20 Thread: Olive 6/o or 8/o Tail: Wood duck flank fibers (hence the 'WD') Body: Thorax: Muskrat dubbing including the guard Wood duck flank fibers; Wing case: can also substitute pearl kystal flash Head: Same as body or

Tying instructions for the WD-40

- 1. The WD-40 is simple to tie and very effective fly to use. Place your hook in the vise in the standard fashion. Attach your tying thread just behind the headspace and evenly wind down the shank to a point where the thread is directly over the point of the barb. Remove a clump of about 4 to 8 fibers, depending on the size of the fly, from a wood duck flank feather or substitute. Tie them in so that they extend beyond the bend and are about the length of the shank. Do not trim the butt ends as they will used for the wing case.
- 2. Smoothly wind the body using your tying thread. I like to spin the thread counter-clockwise every 8 to 10 wraps to keep it flat and untwisted. The body should be a thin, smooth, slightly cigar shaped and extend about one-half to two-thirds the length of the shank.
- 3. Before you proceed to the thorax dubbing fold

- back the butts of the tail and add any additional wood duck fibers you need in order to create the size of the wing case that you want. Or if you want a flash back style, remove the tail butts and tie in the flash material. Your thread should now be at the beginning of the thorax.
- 4. Thickly apply muskrat, including the guard hairs, to your thread to form the dubbing. For an even shaggier appearance you can use a dubbing loop. Wind the dubbing forward to the headspace evenly, avoiding overlap that could weaken the fly, and tie off at the headspace.
- 5. Pull the wood duck fibers or flash material forward over the top of the thorax giving them a slight twist to help keep them together. Tie the fibers down securely with a few thread wraps. Form a small, neat head and whip finish. Using your bodkin, pick out the underside of the thorax creating a hair and dubbing legs/hackle and your WD-40 is complete.



Notes from the Pond

JEFF GROSS, CAPTAIN
