Leader's Line...

Learning to Become a Better Fly Fisher

JIM THOMASON, PRESIDENT

Just returned from a weekend stillwater fishing class where we were introduced to a variety of new techniques including fishing "Naked", "Dangling", and "Hanging." While it was not an official club trip, there were 11 club members in attendance and we had a great time floating together and helping each other try out the various things we learned. I was especially impressed by everyone's willingness to share information about what was 'working" as each catch was followed by a shout-out of "got that one on a (hare's ear, pheasant tail, damsel, ice cream cone) fishing (under indicator, naked, stripping, on the hang) at x feet from the top or bottom." That kind of real time information can really increase everyone's fish count. If you too are into learning new things about our sport, consider attending some of our upcoming events.

Fall is one of the best times of the year to fish as the rivers and lakes have cooled down and the summer crowds have diminished. In preparation for the fall, now is the time to come out and join the Tuesday night casts to get your arm and your aim in shape. In addition to our usual Tuesday night casts which run thru the end of the month, on August 16th we'll be featuring a special casting night headed by Mark Allen.

Tailored after the Danish Games, this casting event features a series of stations each requiring different real world casting techniques. In addition to casting to multiple targets at various distances, you'll also cast under obstructions (imagine a tree branch), around obstructions (imagine a rock), through obstructions (imagine a hole between upper and lower leafy branches), and with obstructions at your back (imagine a high weedy bank). You'll also make

long casts (imagine the flats), reach casts (imagine currents), off-handed casts (imagine wind over your dominant hand side). These are all situations you're likely to encounter in a normal day of fishing. If that's not enough, if you've already completed our beginning casting class, we'll be offering our intermediate casting class in September. It's a great way to work on some of the more advanced casting techniques.

For those of you that know how to tie, we have scheduled a brief tying session prior to several of our upcoming outings where we'll tie one or two flies suitable for the destination. It's a great way to brush up on your tying skills and get that little bit of extra motivation to spend some time at the vice. For those of you that don't tie or can't attend the outing,

it's a great way to learn more about some of the flies we'll be using on the outing. For you new members, stop by and get to know more people in the club. I think you'll be impressed by everyone's willingness to help you improve your skills.

If you've already got your casting down and tie plenty of flies, you might want to consider our rod building class in September. While it takes some time and experience to master the advanced skills, such as feather inlays and specialty wraps, the basics can be learned quite easily. Add some simple customizations and you'll have a truly memorable rod. You might even save some money and be able to make basic repairs to any of your rods should the need arise.

With all these choices, there's no excuse not to get out there and try something new. By the way, fishing "Naked" involves using a long leader fishing midges on a very slow retrieve without an indicator. "Dangling" is the use of a full sink line fished vertically, and "Hanging" is attempting to induce a take with a slow lift and long pause at the end of the retrieve prior to re-casting.

Measure Up at the Yards & Inches Tournament



BCC offers a lot of fishing opportunities, but nothing is as close to the Club as the Yards & Inches Tournament, and gives you a year of bragging rights and your name on a perpetual trophy, and the opportunity to have fresh posole, chips and beer at the weigh in...uhh,...add in.

Mark your calendar now for Saturday, August 4th and join the Fleet in the pursuit of spotted bay bass, sand bass, various croakers, halibut, mackerel, perch, etc. The 5-ft tide is incoming the entire morning so there will be an extended prime-catching window.

Yards &Inches rules are simple. Measure the length of all sport fish you catch (no sharks or rays; fly rods and flies only; no bait) and keep a running total of the length of all fish caught. Highest total length wins. They don't have to be big; think looong. Start at 6'ish and fish till noon in Huntington Harbour.

You'll need to fish from something floatable—like small boats, kayaks, pontoon boats, dinghies or float



tubes. For float tubers, there are hundreds of boat docks to fish where you won't have to fight current or tides.



The Pre-trip Meeting is at the clubhouse on Wednesday, July 25th at 7:00 PM. You'll learn everything you need to know: maps, launch sites, lure du jour and location of lunch.

TIRED OF BEING PUSHED AROUND?

Winds can be a nuisance in any body of water, especially when it keeps you from fishing your spot. Lake Crowley is notorious for afternoon winds that can literally blow you across the lake.

There are ways to extend your fishing time. You can pay Cabela's \$40 to \$75 for their drift sock. Or, for way under \$10 you can make your own. At the Yards and Inches pretrip meeting, on July 25th, Mick Woodbury will show you how to make and use a drift sock (also known as sea anchor, or drogue). Also the one thing you NEVER want to do when using one.

If you're in the Fleet, or ever fish from a float tube, kayak, pontoon boat, or dingy, you will learn to show the wind you're no pushover.

Fly Tier Extraordinaire



6,000 flies; one man. On July 2, 2012, John Woodling reached the astonishing number of six thousand flies tied and donated to Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing.

He began in March of 2011 when he heard of a national "Tie-A-Thon" that was tying flies for PHWFF. He pledged to send 200 flies for that event, but kept going until he reached 1,500 flies. He liked the idea of tying flies for disabled veterans, so John went to the PHWFF website and contacted PHWFF.

Because he lives in Southern California, he was referred to me. I invited him to come to PHWFF classes at the Long Beach Casting Club so that he could meet the participants. He did, and brought more flies with him. Each week he brings another 100-200 flies, all beautifully tied. On July 2, he had reached the amazing total of 6,000 flies.

Two volunteers purchased a gift club membership for John so that he could help with our program; he has since renewed that membership. John is now a regular volunteer and helps with the weekly classes in rod building, tying and casting, and is going to be the lead instructor for fly tying this fall.



In addition to filling the fly boxes of the veterans in the Long Beach PHWFF program, his flies have been sent to other programs in the region, and used as raffle items to help fund the program.

The fishing was hot in the cool waters of San Diego Bay on our June club trip. About fifteen members and guests showed up for some superb fishing, some just for Saturday, some for two days, and a few for the full Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

In spite of the absence of our guru Joe Austin, everyone caught plenty of fish—wily old veterans like John Stine and Mick Woodbury as well as those new to the saltwater like Rix and Yumi Gano. The hottest rod, though, belonged to Craig Bond, fishing for the first time in the ocean. He hauled in between 50 and 60 fish on Saturday alone, including several doubles (fish on both flies). Most of the fish were spotted bay bass—a rugged piscine brawler that puts a good bend in any 8-weight. There were also a few mackerels, yellowfin croaker, black croaker, and a tiny halibut. The most successful flies were the Newport Special, Piconi's Prowler, Gracie's Ghost Shrimp, and Kim's Surf Worm. Generally, though, the spotties will viciously attack anything that you pull past their nose.



If you were unable to attend this trip, it is not too late to catch the bite. I went the following Friday and the fishing was still outstanding. Get your old

bones up early, do the drive, and have a great time in the bay.

Fly of the Month: Polly's Casual Dress

any of our older members may well remember this month's pattern, Polly's Casual Dress. This pattern was a very popular with many of us way back eons ago and went by the unusual nickname of the "Pink Slug" (I don't know why so if you ever run in to Ian Walker and Mike Juno, ask them and then let me know).

The Casual Dress came from the vise of E. H. "Polly" Rosborough and was published in 1969 in his book TYING AND FISHING THE FUZZY NYMPHS. Polly was a true character and lived in Chilloquin, Oregon near the banks of the Williamson River. This is great generic pattern that imitates a great variety of different insects — mayflies, stoneflies, caddisflies and dragonflies to name a few. It is fuzzy and has a generic, suggestive form rather than being a precise imitation. I feel that the fly's effectiveness stems from this fact. In fact, many of you who know of our very own (Allen) Lowe's Grey Nymph will see similarities, but I think of a Casual Dress as a Lowe's Grey nymph on steroids...

I have used this fly as a searching pattern for years and alter its size and color to meet the demands of the particular stretch of water I am fishing. Try tying the fly in other colors such muskrat dyed olive and black. You can use other materials that have lots of guard hairs, such as a hare's mask, to achieve the same effect.

I also highly recommend adding something like Borden's ICE dubbing (like UV Dun or UV Pearl) to the body or the color adds a very nice and "controllable" amount of flash to the fly that can really help with how fish respond to it. With these material and tied on a salmon fly hook it makes a great steelhead and Alaskan trout or salmon pattern.



MATERIALS FOR TYING POLLY'S CASUAL DRESS:

Hook: Mustad 3906B or equal in sizes 2 to 18

Thread: Black 6/o

Tail: Muskrat guard hairs and fur color to match

body

Body: Muskrat dubbing natural or dyed

Ribbing: Gold wire

Hackle: Muskrat guard hairs and fur collar

Head: Black ostrich herl or peacock herl and black

thread

Instructions for tying Polly's Casual Dress:

- Attach thread to the hook behind the headspace and wind down to the bend of the hook. Select a good quality piece of muskrat skin and stand up a small amount of the guard hairs and fur so that they are perpendicular to the piece of skin (to keep the ends of the guard hairs even) and cut off. Remove about half of the fur, set the excess aside and tie in the guard hairs and the remaining fur as a tail. The tail should be as long as the shank.
- 2 Cut a 4" long piece gold wire and tie it in along the back side of the hook. Cut more guard hairs and fur from the muskrat skin, add it to what you removed from the tail and mix it up with your fingers to use as dubbing. Apply the dubbing to the thread and wind it 3/4 the length of the body. The body should be smoothly tapered and cigar shaped. Wind the gold wire ribbing in the reverse direction of the dubbing 5 turns and tie off. Secure the fly with a 3-turn whip finish but do not cut off the thread.
- Prepare a 3" to 4" long dubbing loop with the thread. Prepare some more muskrat guard hairs and dubbing for the hackle in the same manner as the tail but about 2 or 3 times as much and cut off the hide. If you own a dubbing twister now is a great time to use it as it allows you to control the loop opening and tension easily.

Place the guard hairs and fur in the dubbing loop



so that the cut end is only about 1/8" past the thread, tighten the loop and spread out hair and fur so that it is somewhat even from end to end. With a dubbing twister or shepherd's hook twist the loop until the hair and fur are secure. Without letting the loop untwist, grab it with a pair of hackle pliers and wind the loop 3 or 4 turns. Take care to keep the good ends of the guard hairs pointing to the rear of the hook.

4 Tie in the ostrich herl and wind 2 or 3 turns and tie off. Wind a very small (5 turns or less) thread head and whip finish. Apply some head cement to the thread only and the Casual Dress is complete.

Note:

When I tie this pattern in dyed olive and dyed black muskrat I like to use peacock herl for the collar instead of black ostrich herl. While I am not sure it works better I do like the way it look—so much for practical application and logic...

Notes from the Pond



Wouldn't it be nice if we had some type of portable filtration device that could be used to vacuum the detritus off of the bottom while the pond is full or skim the floating algae? Put on you thinking caps and let's talk.

I hope all of you are making time to go fishing this summer. Whether it is a trip to the Sierras, a destination trip or the San Gabriel River the added skills honed at our Tuesday night casting games will improve your success. Your improved accuracy in reaching that fish holding against the far bank under the bush will have you saying "why didn't I cast the games years ago?"

Remember, the Tuesday games start at 7:00 PM and the schedules of events are in the Roster on pages 66 & 67. Bring your our rod or use one of the club rods that are already set-up for the various games.
