## **Get Out Early**

s it summer already? It seems like we just went to the Lower Owens (which is still fishable by the way). With the minimal rainfall we've received, run-off may already be over in many places (or at the least done much sooner than normal). Many creeks are already at mid-summer flows. That means you need to get out there early this year to fish your favorite river while it's still flowing. The same will hold true for some of our lakes in the fall if you're a Stillwater fan.

I got an early start which turned out to be a little too early. Craig Bond and I stopped by the South Fork of the Kings River in Kings Canyon National Park following a trip to Hume Lake. It was disappointing to see so much white water as we descended into the canyon. While the run-off was not nearly as high as normal, it was high enough to make most of the river un-fishable. We were able to get above some of the feeder creeks and find some fishable water. The fish count was low but if you're not going to catch a lot of fish, it's hard to beat the view standing in that river. Hume Lake was new to both of us and our catch rate improved from minimal to moderate by the time our 2 days were up. There's a reason they say 10% of the fisherman catch 90% of the fish as we learned afterwards talking to a few that have fished there frequently.

As I've said in previous articles, fly fishing presents a myriad of opportunities to fish all kinds of water for all kinds of fish. That may be even more important this year due to low water flows. We have an abundance

of surf in the area which requires very little equipment and we have several club members that would be happy to help get you started. There are shad coming in this month in Central/Northern California and bass are all over the Southland. And don't forget the feisty little bluegill (and some that are not so little).

Of course, our trips this month are not dependent on run-off as we'll be visiting Newport Bay and San Diego Bay. We've been fishing Newport Bay in March but moved it to June this year to hopefully improve the experience with warmer water temperatures. San Diego Bay seems to fish well year round and I highly recommend that outing if you can make it. Thirty-plus fish days are not uncommon and the views from the bay are fantastic.

Following my own previous advice, I'm going to be branching out this summer and try fishing for carp (there, I said it in writing). They've long had a

## Newport Bass Tournament is Near!



## San Diego Bay Jam IV

It's time once again to hit that dynamite fishing hole down south; yes, it's the San Diego Bay Jam. This is number IV and it's scheduled for the weekend of 15 June 2013. As in previous years the plan will be to make Saturday the "official" day some folks (me included) will likely make a weekend of it.

Our trip last June (2012) was a great outing with all participants into fish on Saturday. The catch included spotted and barred sand bass, yellowfin and black, mackerel and even a small halibut. Other species may include: calico bass bonito, corvina, sculpin and even bonefish right around the corner in Glorietta Bay. There were a number of doubles in the mix (a typical bay rig consists of a fly and dropper; we'll discuss rigging at the pre-trip meeting). Since the tides are running about the same this year, we might expect to find similar fishing action again this year.

For the previous Bay Jams our launch spot has been at Tidelands Park. Because of it's unique location Tidelands has lighter (and slower) boat traffic than many other places on the bay. In addition there is a lot of good structure to fish close to the launch point and it can easily be explored by float tube, pontoon boat, or kayak.



WHEN: The weekend of June 14-16, 2013 with arrival in San Diego sometime between Friday and fishing



time on Saturday morning. The main event will be Saturday, the fishing will start about 6:00 AM. We can use a similar schedule for those fishing on Friday and/or Sunday. I'm not sure how much leeway there is on the 6:00 AM time but I've started unloading my gear earlier than this.

<u>WHERE</u>: Tidelands Park on Coronado at the foot of the Coronado Bridge. Check the location online with Google Maps.

**LAUNCH LOCATION:** Easy beach launch from sandy beach, short paddle out to moored boats which mark a good place to start loosening up your casting arm.

EQUIPMENT, FLIES, ETC.: Saltwater compatible 6 or 8 weight rods (or even 10 wt.); sink tip or shooting head sinking lines for when the tide is rapidly flowing and intermediate lines for slack-tide conditions. Some flies to consider: Dave's Liberace Clouser, Newport Special, ghost shrimp patterns, Piconi's Prowler, Newport Special, Doug Uyematsu's DUI and New Beak, and last but not least Kim's Surf Worm.

**POST FISHING LUNCHEON:** Non-fishing activities will be discussed at the Pre-Trip Meeting and if there is enough interest we can set up a BBQ luncheon on Saturday following the fishing.

**LODGING:** Participants to make their own arrangements for accommodations. There are numerous inexpensive motels as well as campsites in the area (book now). We will discuss a group gettogether for Saturday night celebrations, etc., at the Pre-Trip Meeting.

WHERE: Midway between Bishop and Mammoth on 395 is Rock Creek (Tom's Place). Drive up (West) Rock Creek 10.7 miles until you can't drive any more and you're at Mosquito Flats Campground, park only in authorized spots.

THE TRAIL: Good trail with Rock Creek on the left. Moderate elevation change. About 1 mile in is Heart Lake which looks like a good meeting point and is midway to Long Lake. We will pass or be near a half dozen named lakes and a bunch of smaller ponds plus connecting creeks.


## Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing

his must sound a little repetitive by now: we  $oldsymbol{\perp}$  won two awards in this year's national PHWFF rod building program. Two out of nine. That means two of the veterans in our program will get to select a national fly fishing trip as their prizes. More than 440 rod kits were ordered this year and the builders have become very competitive, learning elaborate wrapping techniques. Justin Robles won third place among first-time rod builders and Mike Escarcida won third place in the category for those who have eye or upper extremity disabilities. The list of the volunteers who have made rod building such a success is long and led by Alan Ross and Joe Richter. They all deserve a big thank you for the many hours of work and enthusiastic support. The seventy minute Steve Hasty Healing Waters Documentary is finished and has been submitted for inclusion in several film festivals. You can Google it to see a trailer. Part of the documentary was shot at our clubhouse, with interviews of several of our participants about our rod building program. Sometime this fall we'll have a movie night to show the film and some of the rods built by our vets. We won't have all the best rods, however, because several were donated to raffles in order to raise money for the program.

Speaking of raising money, we had a banner spring in that regard. First there was the Fred Hall Show, under the leadership of Jeff Sadler, with a net of \$5057. In April, our new friends at Santa Ana River Lakes held a fundraiser that brought in \$9331, which was followed by the One Fly Surf event that earned \$3020. May 4 was Breathless Agony from which we get \$1000. Jim Wilcox has been building custom rod jigs with beautiful woods and donating the money to PHWFF.



All these major fundraisers, in addition to the smaller amounts that come in during the year, will fund our trips this summer.

With fundraising still in mind, I have two trip donations that I would like to somehow use if anyone would make a modest donation to PHWFF. One is half day of guided saltwater fishing with Vaughn Podmore. Huntington Beach, Long Beach and Newport Beach, walk and wade or boat. Normally \$200-375 for one or two anglers.

The other is a four night, three day guided fishing for two at Falcon's Ledge in Altamont, Utah. This is a two-for-one deal, so someone would have to pay the Lodge their fee for one angler (\$2235) and the second goes free. The annual trip to Bishop is May 14-17. We love this trip because the people of Bishop really make us feel welcome and feed us at the VFW Post after days of fishing with guides who generously donate their time. In June, six vets are going on an exploratory trip to Redding to fish with PHWFF volunteers from that area; their program was started by former LBCC member Dick Recchia and is thriving. In July, the newer vets are going to the Big Horn to be spoiled by the Stroda's of Leaning Tree Lodge, and the more experienced vets will be going to West Yellowstone later in the summer. Our fundraising makes all of this possible and we thank everyone for their support, whether in time or money.

You may notice the camo paint and peanuts on our faces which serves two purposes: we can sneak up on the little fishies and those of you who didn't go won't know who had such a great time and hold it against us. (This is also a Yash tradition for many years now.) The two things we cannot control turned out very, very well.

The weather was nearly perfect with the day before we got there starting out at 10 degrees and not getting much warmer. Our first day was cold but tolerable. It got progressively warmer with the last day in t-shirts.

The day we left was scheduled to snow.





The river ran a very low but consistent flow with drift fishing from boats productive but wade/walk fishing more challenging. I spent two days hunting dry flies and only casting to rising or cruising fish. I didn't get big numbers but those I got, I caught on my terms. Fantastic!

The Green is very scud rich and scuds have high concentrations of beta carotene which causes the trout to be brilliantly colored. The fish were exceptional this year with the spawning female rainbows being almost black with a vermillion stripe. The sizes ranged from 16" to 20" with a few over. The brown and bow above are typical. I caught a whitefish on A section which was unusual but several were caught on B (and there are even more in C — ed.).

In retrospect I was worried about the large crowd but it turned out not to be a problem at all. So next year we'll just let loose and see what happens. My advice is to find your partner and sign up early, real early.

## Fly of the Month: Bullet-Head Cicada

You could always hear their drone at stream side but it hasn't been until recently that cicadas have become popular as a fly fishing pattern. Now, thanks to their use on the Green River, cicadas have become recognized as a deadly pattern for trout. Another nice benefit is that it also doubles as a great stonefly, hopper and cricket pattern as well!

Cicadas have been popular in New Zealand for years now. I remember reading about tiers from the land of the kiwi imitating them when I was kid in the '6os. This was about the same time that matukas were being introduced to American fly fishers. Technically, we have been using them for a long time but only by mistake. I doubt that a trout sees much of a difference between an adult giant stonefly pattern and a cicada pattern...

On the Green River the cicada is most often used as a dropper/indicator to a nymph or a midge pattern. There are times however when the fly by itself is quite effective. Tie up the pattern in both black and olive green with emphasis on the black. Another idea would be to tie it in a yellow and tan with rubberlegs as a hopper pattern.

If you are planning a trip to the Green River or a myriad of other western streams this spring or summer be sure to include the Bullet-head Cicada in your fly box.

#### Materials for tying the Bullet-head Cicada:

Hook: Tiemco #2312 or

equivalent style in

sizes 10 to 6

Thread: Black or olive 6/o or

8/o or color to match the natural you're

imitating

Body: Rear - Black or olive

polypropylene yarn twisted and tied on extended body style Front/Head – Black or

olive dubbing

Underwing: Fluorescent green

Krystal Flash

Overwing: Black or very dark

brown elk hair or mane folded back bullet style

Indicator: Fluorescent green deer

hair or glow bug yarn



#### **Instructions for tying the Bullet-head Cicada:**

- 1. Attach your thread to the hook at the headspace and wind down to the mid-point of the shank. Tie in the one or two strands of polypropylene depending on the size of the fly. Twist the yarn very tightly. Hold the yarn at the end with one hand and at the point where you want the extended body to end with your other hand and fold the end back to the hook shank and it tie down. Let the yarn twist itself into a tight rope. If everything looks okay then cut off the excess if not re-twist the yarn tighter or looser to achieve the desired effect.
- 2. Advance the thread to the headspace. Remove the desired amount of elk hair or mane and stack the tips. I recommend elk mane, as it is longer and more durable. Measure the length of the wing carefully making sure that the wing, when folded back, will extend from immediately behind the eye to a point just beyond the end of the extended portion of the body. Tie the wing in at the eye with the tips going forward.
- 3. Apply dubbing to the thread and wind the dubbing back to where the rear portion of the body was tied down to the shank. Tie in 6 to 12 strands of Krystal Flash as an underwing. They should extend to a point just short of the end of the body.
- 4. Grab the tips of the wing and fold them back over the body. If necessary give the wing a slight twist to help keep the strands together. Tie the wing down where the dubbing and extended part of the body meet. Whip finish and apply some head cement at this point before tying in the indicator.
- 5. Both materials are tied in using the same method. Use 20 to 30 strands of deer hair with all of the underhair removed or a single strand of glow bug yarn. Lay the material on top of the wing and parallel to the hook. Wrap over the material with a couple turns of thread without letting it rotate with the pull of the thread. Whip finish the thread

before you trim the indicator to shape. Pull the ends of the deer hair or glow bug yarn up and trim them into a very small dome with your scissors.
