## Get Out & Fish!

**W**e are fortunate here in Southern California in that we can fish year round. I just returned from our January trip to the Lower Owens. Although the wind was gusty, the weather was very comfortable and only promises to be better for our next two trips there. The fishing ranged from okay to great depending on location. While the river flows were slightly lower than normal there were still plenty of fish if you kept moving until you found them. Floating the reservoir also proved to be worthwhile. We had a great turnout and once again I was impressed by the number of people willing to help other club members new to our sport. Make plans to attend this month's trip.

In addition to fishing, we have several other activities available this month. Long Beach will once again be the host of the regional Southwestern Casting Tournament this month. While casting tournaments are not as big as they once were, they still provide an opportunity to improve your casting and maintain your casting muscles so you're ready for your next big trip. If you don't want to cast, please consider volunteering to help.

Our beginner's fly tying class continues this month moving into dry flies (Elk Hair Caddis, Adams, Humpy). If you need help with any of these drop in for a refresher. Our new Wednesday night fly tying forum is going full steam. Each week presents a new fly or technique to improve your tying.

If you're not going on the Lower Owens outing this month, make plans to attend the SWC-FFF FLYBUY that will be held at the club on the 8<sup>th</sup>. It features a great "garage sale" of used gear, silent and live auctions, casting instructions and tying demonstrations by over 20 tiers (including several Buszek Award winners). The cost is \$10 for FFF members/\$15 for non-members and includes lunch.

It's shaping up to be a great year. Although we still need more water (pray for snow), we have lots of places to fish. You just may have to change where you go or the type of water you fish. Back by popular demand, an extended Pre-Trip instructional seminar for beginners to the Lower Owens in Bishop. Dan Rivett, Yash Iseda, and John Lincoln sponsors of the Jan/Feb/Mar Lower Owens trip put on a Saturday beginners class specific to that trip on that river. They roped the big doofus (me) into helping. We always meet at the bridge in the campground at 9:00 AM on Saturday of the trip and take beginners out to help them learn fly fishing and the river. We have learned that many are, how do I say this politely, clueless on set-up and basic equipment.

So, we have developed a short clinic telling what we use and why. You will be amazed at how similar experienced fly fishers are and then shocked by some of the differences between us. All we are doing is telling you what each of us do, in all fishing situations it is up to you to learn as much as you can and select the method that suits you best.

This is not at all as comprehensive as Joe Libeu's ON-THE-RIVER clinic as we don't go into casting, entomology, reading the water and several other issues, just the most basic stuff. This is also a Pre-Trip meeting where locations, times, food, flies, etc. are covered.

All are welcome whether you're going on the trip or not. This is aimed at beginners who need basic help in rigging lines, leaders, etc. plus fly selection and what a basic vest ought to have in it (and not.)

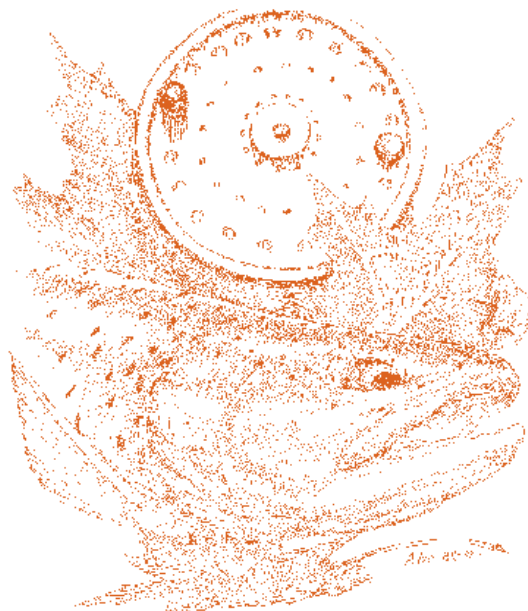

**Beauty?** You cannot believe how beautiful the view is from the overlook near our hotel. The river itself runs through a spectacular red rock and green tree lined slot canyon. The drive from Salt Lake is a geology tour.

**Cost?** Approximately \$790 includes five day lodging at Red Canyon Lodge and two days guided fishing by Trout Creek Flies.

# Fly of the Month: Smoke Jumper

**I**t seems like everywhere you look these days another new fly pops up and takes the fishing world by storm. The storm doesn't usually last too long but certain patterns manage to withstand the test of time due to their effectiveness and ease of tying. This month, I nominate the Smoke Jumper.

I have only just learned of this fly and many of you who have attended the Wednesday night Fly Tying Forums had the pleasure of learning about it and tying it from Joe Libeu. Joe told me about the Smoke Jumper several months ago and I have mentally stored the info away and feel now is the time to let it all tumble out.

What do I like about this pattern? What is there to not like about it! Look at the images and read the instructions; it will be simple to tie. Look at the images again and tell me this fly won't work—use by itself or as the top fly in a two fly rig. What I really like about this pattern is the body and wing combination. Change the body a little by adding wire (and weight) and it will suspend its fanny down into and through the film. You could even add one or two turns of hackle as a parachute (albeit increasing the tying difficulty!) around the base of the CDC wing allowing it to "hang" it even better in the meniscus. Fish love a pattern that has the appearance of helplessness!

I have looked at versions of the fly online and there are tons of variations. I've seen hackle stacker styles and all types of wing, thorax and body combinations. I have listed three combinations that I think will cover the widest range of conditions especially if you want to give one a try on the next Owens River Trip: 1) one closest to the original as best I can tell with a peacock eye or herl quill body; 2) the classic Zebra Midge version and; 3) a Smoke Jumper version of my favorite 3\$ Dip (see the March 2013 edition of Target Talk for that pattern).

The three combinations I recommend should cover the vast majority of **my** needs but what about yours?

## Materials for tying the Smoke Jumper:

- Hook: Tiemco 2487 Midge/Emerger style in sizes 14-22.
- Thread: 6/0 or 8/0 of a color to blend with body color.
- Body: Combinations to consider:  
Red thread with silver wire rib,  
Black thread with silver wire rib,  
Stripped peacock eye quill.
- Thorax: Peacock Herl or Hairline's Peacock ICE Dubbing.
- Wingcase: CDC (cul du cunard) fibers (try natural or light gray).
- Wing: CDC fibers from the Wingcase over the eye.





## Instructions for tying the Smoke Jumper:

- 1 Attach the thread to the hook and wind the thread down to the middle of the bend. If you plan to tie the fly with a peacock 'eye' quill or 'herl' quill body then let's talk a bit about the difference. Many people believe that the classic two-color quill is from the herl—it is not. Using the quill from herl will give you a very slightly barely noticeable two-colored body when wrapped. The peacock **eye** quill is the proper choice and will give you a striking light and dark segmented look that it is remarkably realistic! Use a plastic (not rubber which is more abrasive) drafting eraser to gently rub the fluff off and tie in the quill by the tip end and wind up to the thorax.

To tie a wire ribbed version then tie in the wire at the middle of the bend. Wind your thread smoothly forward to the thorax remembering that this is your body; so make it look nice! Spiral the wire evenly forward to the thorax and tie off. If you want to make the fly sit lower in the water, then wind the wire closer together. I recommend wiggling the wire to remove the excess rather than cutting it with your scissors—it will help save your scissors and the broken end will not cut your thread while the scissor-cut end will.

- 2 Select one good quality CDC puff or feather for the wing. If your CDC plumes are not really good quality I suggest using two. I really like a fairly full wing and wingcase for this fly which will help it hang in the meniscus and not slide below it. Tie in the CDC at the beginning of the thorax and pointing rearwards. The length of the CDC should be about the length of the hook. Remember, this is the wingcase and the wing. If you are in doubt stop and fold the wingcase forward to the eye to double check that it is the correct length. If, when you are finished, the wing looks too long then shorten it by plucking the ends with your finger nails and not scissors which will look unnatural.
- 3 The thorax should be peacock herl or peacock herl colored dubbing. Using herl, tie it in by the tip and with the dull/dark side pointing forward. Wind



forward as needed to produce a full, neat looking thorax. Lately I have become quite enamored with Peacock ICE dubbing and regularly use it in place of herl. If that's what you want to use then apply dubbing to your thread creating a short, tapered rope and wind this forward to the headspace and pick it out a bit with your bodkin; this will help with flotation and realism.

- 4 Pull the CDC wing forward over the thorax. I like to let it slide a small amount down the sides of the thorax as this will let float better but don't get carried away. If it wants to slide down too much, give the material a quarter twist to keep it under control. Tie the wing off at the headspace and then wind a couple of turns around the base of the wing to help gather and control it. Form a neat small head, apply some head cement and you are ready to head on out to the stream and give your new Smoke Jumper a try.
