History of Long Beach Casting Club - Part Two

The second part of a three-part series about the History or our club and its first ninety years...

LBCC & THE INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF FLY FISHERS

LBCC members were instrumental in the formation of the International Federation of Fly Fishers in 1966, and have been very active in this organization since its inception. Club members Jim Eriser (president

for two years), Jim Green, Duke "Best-in-the-West Steelhead Fisherman" Parkening, Frank Gray, Allan Rohrer, Alex Siemers and Bob Middo have served as board members. Joe Libeu, Barbara Rohrer-Hobson, John Van Derhoof, Bob Middo and Tim Lawson have recently served as members of the IFFF Casting Certification Board of Governors.

LBCC has had many Master Certified Casting Instructors. Our "masters" have been Ray Bianco, Joe Libeu, Guy Manning, Mike McClay, Bob Middo, Jamie


Murphy, Alex Siemers, John Van Derhoof, Alan Rohrer, Barbara Rohrer-Hobson, Bill Heard, Stephen Lim, Jim Solomon, Dok Arvanites and Tim Lawson.

As the popularity of two-handed casting has exploded, LBCC has kept up with the interest. In addition to hosting workshops and teaching lessons, we have three certified Two-Handed Certified instructors: Bob Middo, John Van Derhoof and Jim Ansite.

In the fall of 1991, the IFFF started a Women's All-

Around Trophy for casting and named it the Barbara Rohrer Cup to acknowledge Barb's work on behalf of the IFFF in teaching and promoting casting. The first winner, fittingly, was our own Margaret Walker. A Master Certified Casting Instructor and IFFF Casting Board of Governors member, Barbara was made an Honorary Life Member of LBCC in 1999 in recognition of her many contributions to the club and its casting program.

Additionally, both Barbara and Allan became IFFF fixtures by hosting and running the annual IFFF Conclave and Faire casting competition for 20+ years. The Colliander Cup, presented to the winner of this event, was won in 1984 by John Van Derhoof.



Allan Rohrer and Barbara Rohrer-Hobson added Lifetime Achievement in Fly Casting Instruction Awards to their

extensive collection of previous awards. Joe Libeu was honored with the Mel Krieger Fly Casting Instructor Award, given to someone who has dedicated his life to fly casting instruction, is known as a motivator of students, is known for sharing his knowledge of teaching with others and has made a significant, long-term contribution to the art of fly casting instruction.



Many club members have served on the board of the



American Casting Association, and Mark Tsunawaki, who is currently serving, has continued that tradition.

Two of 39 American Casting Association Hall of Fame honorees were LBCC members: Ed Thomas and Jim Green. In addition to being an international champion, Jimmy introduced the first graphite rods through Fenwick in 1973, and invented and patented the Feralite Ferrule, the first fiberglass ferrule. Jim invented tapered lead core shooting heads, and, he and

his partner introduced nylon monofilament as a running line for shooting heads, much to the benefit of distance casting.

We have hosted nine ACA national tournaments.

 A tap dancer from New Jersey named Joan Salvato (Wulff) participated in the dedication ceremony of our casting pond prior to the 1947

> Tournament. She took home a teardrop camper/ trailer raffle prize in addition to a world distance record.

- Eighteen-year-old Jon Tarantino won 13 first places and a new world record at our 1954 Tournament.
- At the 1961 National Tournament, our Ed Thomas became the Wet Fly Champion after a legendary cast-off that was ten consecutive perfect games, eventually winning by just one point over Steve Aleshi.
- Fourteen-year-old Steve Rajeff attended our 1971
 National Tournament and won the Anglers AllAround Award, the All Fly Cup, and three world
 records.
- At the conclusion of the 1978 National, Long Beach's Barbara Rohrer was the top finisher in Ladies' Accuracy Flies, Accuracy Plugs and All Accuracy Combined Events. Brothers Steve and Tim Rajeff

cast the exact same distance in 1 oz. Distance Plug and shared a new world record.

- During the 1984 Tournament, Steve Rajeff continued to excel with the best score in eight events. Long Beach's Matt Rickerd set a national record in All Accuracy for intermediates, and won the Robert Budd Memorial Award as the Intermediate All Accuracy Champion for the second year in a row.
- The 2000 Tournament marked the 75th birthday of

Long Beach Casting Club. Four casters cast perfect scores: Chris Korich, Steve Rajeff, our Matt Rickerd and Andy Staff.

• During the 2006 Tournament, Steve Rajeff won his 34th ACA National Championship. 13 national records were broken at the distance field and two perfect scores of 100 were posted by Chris Korich in Dry Fly and Steve Rajeff in Trout

Fly. Richard Fujita participated in his 58th national tournament.

- In 2011, LBCC was the first to hold a four day National. The most notable event was the entertainment/raffle at the awards banquet by Caitlin and Lauren Kozicki.
- In 2015 we will be hosting our tenth National Tournament in conjunction with our 90th anniversary celebration.



Fly of the Month: Bend-Back Henry's Fork Stonefly

 T love to catch fish. I hate to catch rocks. It is for these two reasons that I have embraced the bend-back \blacksquare style of hook. No other method I know allows a fly to work so near the bottom while minimizing hang-ups. It is there fore a natural choice for tying stone fly imitations. The Henry's Fork Stone Fly developed by Mike Lawson of the Henry's Fork Angler in Last Chance, Idaho is one of the most representative and easiest to tie stone fly patterns around. By tying it in the bend-back style only adds to its effectiveness.

The two best ways to fish a stone fly imitation is understanding that it really requires two different types of flies. The first method is to use an un-weighted fly that is tied on a curved or bent body and fish it dead drift with a split shot and an indicator. This simulates a stone fly that has been dislodged from its protective rock cover and is drifting helplessly in the current with it's abdomen curled up in a fetal position. This method is best used during hatch and non-hatch conditions.

The next method requires a heavily weighted fly with a straight abdomen that is fished on the bottom. When a stone fly is ready to molt into a winged adult it crawls across the bottom past a picket line of hungry fish to shore. Here it crawls up onto a rock, stump or up into some vegetation and transforms from a nymph to an adult. This is where the Henry's Fork Stone Fly excels.

I fish this fly with a short line in a down and across fashion with a LOT of mending to keep it on the bottom and from climbing in the water column. I also do not cast this too far out into the flow of the current--again trying to get it down and keep it there. At the end of the swing I will employ a slow retrieve to crawl it across the bottom and hopefully entice a strike. When this hatch is on, believe me the fish will watching and waiting!

MATERIALS FOR TYING THE BEND-BACK HENRY'S FORK STONE FLY

Hook: 4x long with ring eye in sizes 8 to 2 (Mustad 9674)

Thread: 6/o or 8/o black

Weight: Medium to heavy tungsten wire on the shank

Tail: Dark brown goose biots Body: Black 2 or 3 ply wool yarn Wing case: Black 2 or 3 ply wool yarn

Thorax: Dark brown

Angora goat

dubbing


Poor quality dry Hackle:

fly cochy-bondhu (brown feather with black center. also called the list, and tips) or

furnace

INSTRUCTIONS FOR TYING THE BEND-BACK HENRY'S FORK STONE FLY

1. Create a bend-back hook by holding the hook with a pair of pliers. With the hook point up and at a point about ¼ of the shank behind the eye carefully bend the eye down approximately 10 to 15 degrees downward. Place the hook in the vise so that the section of the shank with the eye is horizontal and the point of the hook is up.



2. Attach your thread and tie on two pieces of tungsten wire lengthwise on each side of the shank. The wire should extend from the bend of the hook to the bend in the shank. Wrap more tungsten wire over the shank and the pieces of wire you just tied on. The idea here is to create a wide and heavy body.

IN THE VISE

3. Tie in your wool yarn and make one complete turn as a tag and tie off but do not cut off the excess. Tie in the goose biots on either side of the wool tag and hook forming the tail. The tail should be about the length of the hook gape. Wind the wool



yarn forward to a point just before the bend in the shank and tie off

- 4. Tie in 3–6 (depending on the size of the fly), 2-inch pieces of wool yarn where you finished the abdomen to form a wing case. Using a dubbing loop dub the Angora goat thorax and stop at the headspace. This should be very shaggy. Select a hackle about 1½x the length of the hook gap and tie in the hackle by the tip. Wind 3–6 turns of hackle depending on the size of the fly and the quality if the hackle. The hackle should flow back over the thorax and the body.
- 5. Take hold of the wool yarn wing case and twist it about ¼ to ½ a turn, which will keep the yarn pieces together. Pull the yarn wing case forward and tie it off securely. Form a small head, whip finish and add head cement.
