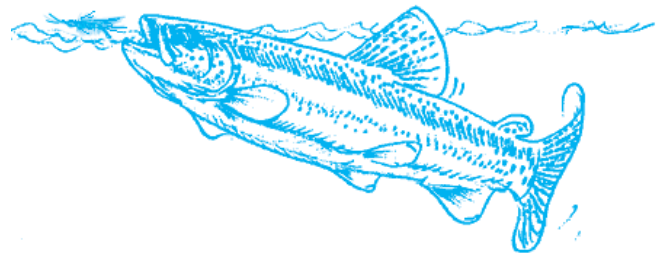
Art Daily also found a bargain by staying in his trailer

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Fly of the Month: Bead & Wire BWO

It's time to start thinking about the Green River and more and more mayflies will be popping on the Owens (at least until they raise the water levels!) so here's a fly that should help you catch a few more fish. You have seen it before in Target Talk but it has been a while and I was very impressed using it on the Green last year. While I have seen several flies similar to it and variations of it the pattern presented here works really well. So without inventing a new name, I offer a description: the Bead & Wire BWO.

I love to cast over fish feeding on BWOs (Blue-Winged Olives). It can be quite challenging to work with and around the various currents while simultaneously dealing with selective fish. While I don't think the pattern is too important during a BWO emergence I do feel that the flies' profile, its presentation and most importantly matching the appropriate stage of the insect the fish are feeding on is. This pattern, as the point fly, in combination with say an olive RS-2 (February; 2013) or an olive Hair-Winged Dun (May; 2014) as a dry-dropper will be quite effective. Because the Bead & Wire BWO has a bead head and a wire body I would not use any additional weight to the set-up; just an indicator four or five feet above the top fly. Also, using this fly as the bottom fly in a two-fly rig with a Halo (April; 2012) or a WD-40 (February; 2012) would really enhance someone's ability to fish this hatch successfully as well as ruining several fish's day.

While I am sure that this pattern will work with a variety of other hatches and circumstances it is a BWO in color. You could make some modifications to match other insect species by changing the wire, tail and leg color. For example, switching to a pale pinkish tail, one green and one copper wire and tannish brown legs would be perfect for a Pale Morning Dun. A pale pink tail with two dark green and one chartreuse strands of wire and a mix of yellow and dark olive legs would work for Green (flavs...short for flavilinea), Giant Green and Brown Drakes.

Frankly, I can't wait to give this a pattern a test run in a couple of weeks when I am back fishing the Green!

MATERIALS FOR TYING THE BEAD & WIRE BWO:

- Hook: Tiemco 2457 or equivalent, size 16, 18 or 20
- Bead: Silver bead to match the size of the hook; use tungsten if more weight is needed
- Thread: Olive 8/0 or as needed to match the natural
- Tail: Pale olive Zelon or Antron; sparse
- Body: Small olive, green and silver
Ultra Wire or as needed to match the natural
- Thorax: Peacock herl
- Legs: Same as the tail
- Wing Case: Pearl Krystal Flash or mylar sheet with UV cured glue over the top.



INSTRUCTIONS FOR TYING THE BEAD & WIRE BWO:

- 1 Slide the silver bead onto the hook. If you need more weight use a tungsten bead but not when you use this with a dry-dropper—way too much splash and you want to fish this just below the surface. Attach the thread to the hook, wind a small jam against the bead to hold it in place and then wind the thread down to the bend of the shank. Tie in 10–20 strands of olive Zelon or Antron for the tail. The tail should be about one-half the length of the body and quite light looking in appearance.
- 2 Tie in the three strands of wire and wind the thread back to the bead. Wind all three strands of wire together up the shank all the way to the bead making sure that you keep them together but not crossing each other. The color order is silver, olive, then green and the body needs to be smooth with the strands of wire butting against each other.
- 3 Wind the thread back to a point where the thorax begins and tie in 10–15 strands of Krystal Flash for the wing case. Next, tie in one nice, full strand of peacock herl and wind forward leaving enough space behind the bead to tie in the legs and secure the wing case and tie off. Another option I love, especially for small flies, is Dark Peacock Ice Dubbing instead of the peacock herl.
- 4 Tie in about 10–15 strands of olive Zelon or Antron for the legs as though they were a mayfly spinner wing. Antron is finer usually textured so it is better for smaller flies. Trim them to length so that they are slightly shorter than the tail on either side of the thorax. The legs should sweep back towards the bend at about 45 degree angle.
- 5 Pull the wing case forward giving the strands a slight twist to help keep them together and tie them down at the bead. Form a small, neat head against the bead and whip finish. Apply a dollop of UV curing glue on top of the wingcase and hit it with a UV flashlight or expose it to direct sunlight. The UV flashlights are available at Home Depot and other similar stores and are commonly called scorpion lights. This is because they are used by folks living in the desert who want to find scorpions whose bodies glow in UV light.

ADVANCED ON THE RIVER CLINIC: You will be introduced to the increasingly popular Czech and other European nymphing techniques. You will learn both short and long-line methods and how to tie these rigs. You will be amazed at how effective these methods of subsurface fishing are, and your understanding will help you improve in other areas of fly fishing.

2015–2016 Dates:

November 14–15, 2015; February 5–6, 2016; March 19–20, 2016.

Both clinics are limited to a maximum of 6 students. A \$300 tuition includes two full days of on-the-stream instructions and stream-side lunch. Not included are lodging, tackle, other meals, licenses and transportation. Dates are subject to change based on local conditions.
