# The Colorado River at Lees Ferry

Thether there has been a club trip to Lees Ferry, I'm not sure. What is for sure is that this past September's trip was one of discovery. A hundred plus years ago the settlers discovered Lees Ferry as a way to cross the Colorado River with easy reach to the other side.

On Sunday, after eight hours from Long Beach, paralleling the cliffs of northern Arizona with no sign of the river, no trees or clouds or any sign that water may be found here, just dry desert. At Cliff Dwellers Lodge, our hotel for this trip, we had to ask "Where is the river?" "Fifteen more miles east" was the response. Only as we got within one mile did we see water.

The next day, when we got with our guide and on the river, the size of the water we were to fish for the next 3 days amazed me. In some places it was close to ¼ mile across and 1200 feet below the canyon walls. We fished 15½ miles upstream to Glen Canyon dam. It is the largest river I have ever fished.

Whether by wading or drifting we all worked hard at catching fish and are grateful to the guides for their expertise. Casting the two weighted flies and lead weight on a 14' leader was a challenge. Soon,we were able to connect with the fat, beautiful Colorado River rainbows averaging from 12" to 18". The heavy current and heavy fish took a toll on 5x tippets. We also had to learn an extreme hook set—moving the rod tip from the water's surface to well overhead to do a proper hook set with that 14 foot leader. Stripping green woolly buggers was another effective technique.

Some were rewarded with a sighting of a California condor. One was spotted flying high beside the canyon walls. We also saw



wild mustangs as they came to the river to drink.

Because it was less expensive, we went for the annual license at \$55. Now our Arizona fishing licenses are good thru September 2017 and perfect for a return trip next June 2017 to catch the cicada hatch. It's supposed to be really good.



# In Memoriam: **Margaret Walker**

argaret Walker's role in the history of Long Beach Casting Club is a large one. For those of you who didn't have the honor of knowing her, Margaret was a tournament caster and outstanding fly fisher. She placed in several national and regional

casting tournaments, and was the recipient of the inaugural IFFF Women's All-Around Trophy (the Barbara Rohrer Cup, named after another club member).

Margaret was a member of Long Beach Women's Casting Club before women were permitted to be members of Long Beach Casting Club. While some LBCC members welcomed the admittance of women, many were adamantly opposed to it and

threatened to cancel their memberships. Legal counsel advised that the club could not discriminate against any potential member so, in 1981, the club admitted its first female member. Ironically, our first female member moved out of state shortly thereafter. In 1983, the Board of Directors welcomed the membership of six more women in LBCC including Margaret. She later became a Life Member.

After serving terms as Recording Secretary and Captain, Margaret was elected the first female club president in 1989. During her presidency, an auction raised a remarkable \$6,543.00, 75% of which was earmarked for speakers. There was a massive cleaning of the attic and clubhouse that filled more than two dumpsters, and the club hosted the casting

> games of the Senior Olympics. The club received its federal tax exemption as a 501(c)3 non-profit and lease negotiations were begun with the city that would take nearly three years to complete. With characteristic good grace, Margaret credited those achievements to the hard work of others.

I will always remember her calm demeanor, endearing sense of humor

and reassuring attitude, how she encouraged me when serving as club president and then again when starting our Project Healing Waters program.

It was a pleasure and an honor to know her.



# On Target...



ooking for a way to catch more fish? Improving your catch with sharper casting skills can start at the Long Beach Casting Club pond. The club has many experienced casters willing to help with tips to keep tight loops. Remember, tight loops in casting brings increased opportunity for catching fish!! So, come on out to the Sunday Casts at 9:00 AM on November 6 and 20.

Thanks to our noteworthy casting instructors, Bob Middo and John Van Derhoof, who taught about 25–30 casters the casting skills in the Intermediate Casting Class on October 4, 11, and 18. Attendees learned to recognize casting problems, self-correct problems, improve casting distance, learn the double haul, learn to mend lines, and learn to fight big fish. These casters are welcome to continue to improve their casting skills on our Sunday Cast at 9:00 AM. (November 6 and 20). Let's all work on our casting skills and be ready to participate in the Southwestern Tournament hosted by the Long Beach Casting Club, on February 17 and 18, 2017.

Tournament Casting: On September 11, the Captain's Handicap was a success with casters honing their skills in preparation for the Northwestern Casting Tournament on October 15 and 16. The results of the Northwestern Tournament will be reported in the December Target Talk.

Casting Tip of the Month: Improved control of the fly may be achieved by either shortening the leader tippet or increasing tippet diameter. Stiffer tippet means fish can see your line. Light tippet increases your chances to catch fish, but requires higher skill to cast. So, practice casting to fish with very light tippet and catch more fish!



# Venison Stag Christmas Dinner

# Fly of the Month: Black Bear-Red Butt

The Black Bear-Red Butt is a venerable and effective Atlantic salmon and Pacific steelhead pattern that introduces fly tiers to a host of different techniques that can be applied to a wide variety of different types of fly fishing patterns.

It teaches a relatively unknown and very strong method of attaching hair and hackle tip wings. This method, popularized by Ed Haas uses the looped eye of the salmon fly hook to hold the wing pointing forward before binding it down. Then after the rest of the fly has been tied the wing is folded back to its desired position creating a small head and a wing that is virtually impossible to pull out.

Another technique that is learned is the proper way to tie in and wind both flat and round/oval tinsels. Flat tinsel should always be wound from front to back to front and each turn should butt up against the previous turn. There should never be any overlap or "shingling" of the each successive turn. This creates a very smooth body that does not allow any location where a fish's tooth could grab. This fly also teaches the tier how to properly tie and wrap floss as well as a technique to keep the floss from changing color or darkening when it gets wet. Finally, a method of hackling is used that allows the hackle flow back toward the body naturally and without a number of unnecessary thread wraps.

The Black Bear-Red Butt is a great fishing fly and has many variations such as all black or with a green butt. It can be tied as a standard salmon/steelhead wet fly on a standard hook for winter or early spring fishing, as a low water pattern tied as a smaller size on a larger hook for summer/low water conditions, or even with long, flowing body hackle of a Spey pattern.

### Materials for Tying the Black Bear Red Butt:

Hook: Sizes #10 to #2/o, looped

> eye salmon style; Partridge Wilson; Tiemco #7989; Daiichi #2051 'Alec Jackson'

or Mustad #36890.

Thread: 6/o or 8/o primrose or light

cahill

Wing: Black bear hair or black

(natural or dyed) squirrel tail

or calftail.

Tag/Ribbing: Fine oval or round gold tinsel.


Body: 1/5 Flat silver mylar tinsel;

> 1/5 Fluorescent red floss; 3/5 Black African goat or seal

Hackle: Black rooster, poor quality dry

fly.






### Instructions for Tying the Black Bear Red Butt:

- Attach the thread at the mid-point of the shank. Remove the wing material from skin and slide it between the shank of the hook and loop of the eye. Don't use too much hair as it will be hard to fold later. Measure the length of the wing by folding it back towards the bend—it should not reach the bend. Bind the butts of the wing down with tips pointing forward.
- With the thread at the mid-point of the shank, tie in the flat silver mylar tinsel and then the extra fine oval gold tinsel on the lower back side of the hook. To help hold the flat silver tinsel in place as you start to wind it, cut a small scallop in the tinsel very close to the end.
- 3 Hold the fine oval gold tinsel back along the shank with your left hand and wind the flat silver mylar edge to edge—no overlap—to the spot directly over the point of the barb. As you wind you will have to keep pulling the fine oval gold tinsel back and along the hook shank. Reverse direction with flat silver mylar back to the starting point and tie off. Tie in one or two strands of fluorescent red floss.
- 4 Make sure that your fingers are dry and free of dirt and oil. Stroke the floss flattening it into a ribbon. Wind the floss evenly with a slight overlap on top of the flat silver mylar. Proceed to a point halfway down the mylar and wind back to the start and tie it off. The mylar beneath the floss will cause the floss to glow even when wet.
- 5 Apply the dubbing to your thread. African goat is stiff and spiky and can be difficult to dub. Wet your

- fingertips slightly, rub them together and forcibly apply it to thread. The dubbed body should be slightly tapered. Use a heavy dubbing needle to pick out fibers along the underside of the body to give it a slightly shaggy appearance.
- 6 Wind the tag which should be 2 or 3 adjacent turns of the oval gold tinsel and then continue winding the rib evenly and tie off. There should be 4 or 5 turns which defines the change between the different body materials. Select and fold the hackle and tie it in by the tip. If you cannot fold the hackle then stroke the fibers from the tip down until the fibers are perpendicular to the stem. Wind the hackle with each turn directly in front of the preceding turn. The hackle should be 3 to 6 turns depending on the quality of the hackle and the size of the fly. The hackle should extend about 2/3 of the way to the point of the hook.
- 7 Fold the wing back over the body and squeeze firmly at its base to help fold the wing back. Evenly wind thread over the base of the wing forcing the wing down over the body. When the wing is in the desired location you will see that you have already formed a neat head. Whip finish winding forward toward the eye. Touch the head with a permanent black marker, apply a couple of coats of head cement and the fly is complete.
