SoCal Steelhead?

ot long ago (actually it was the March edition of "Target Talk"), I contributed an article about a steelhead conservation effort in Northern California. I'm sure many of you are aware that there were once spectacular steelhead runs in Southern California as well. Steelhead ran in most of the local rivers and creeks, including the San Gabriel and Los Angeles Rivers, and Piru and Malibu Creek.

Before Malibu Creek was dammed, it was known as a great place to catch steelhead. Humphrey Bogart was a big fly fisherman, and designed his own flies for steelheading on the creek. Legend has it (I can't verify this story, but I like it so much I'm including it) that he and star Tyrone Power got drunk one time and had an argument about the best method for catching steelhead.

Mr. Bogart showed Mr. Power his favorite fly, and Mr. Power showed Mr. Bogart his method of choice: a snub-nosed .38 revolver. Bogart won the ensuing contest hands-down—bullets don't travel very well under water. Again, I have no idea whether this story is true, but after all, this is a fishing newsletter.

In the 1920s, the Rindge family built a dam on Malibu

Creek and the steelhead population took a downward turn. The last recorded steelhead was caught in 1936. The dam is still in place. It was a popular hiking destination in Malibu Creek State Park for years; I've been there several times myself with a local hiking club. In August of 2014, it was closed to the public as it had become (as quoted from THE MALIBU TIMES):

"...a destination for teenage daredevils and vandals who, according to State Parks officials often make the treacherous hike to the dam in order to drink, dive into the creek and paint the dam's walls."

Search and rescue in the narrow canyon is dangerous and expensive. In November of 2013, a dam-bound hiker fell 200 feet. Rescuers had to use a helicopter and winch to get him out of the canyon. In addition, according to Craig Sap, a spokesman for the State Park system: "Sanitation conditions down there have been reported to be abysmal, not just the trash but also the human waste down there."

One solution, which is also of interest to fans of the steelhead, is to tear down the dam. Another quote from THE MALIBU TIMES: "...for years, the State has been pushing to tear down Rindge Dam, which is said to have a negative impact on the steelhead trout's migration up and down Malibu Creek and may prevent spawning. Opponents, however, argue the project could cost up to \$100 million and be a waste of state resources for a small population of fish. Residents of Serra Retreat also worry its removal could unleash tons of dirt and sediment that has built up behind the dam."

Granted that the current steelhead population in Malibu Creek is small (the Southern California steelhead is genetically different from other varieties and is listed as an endangered species), that is very likely because there is not enough habitat downstream of the dam to support a larger population. There is no immediate plan to remove the dam, so this situation will likely continue in its current state for a while.

Malibu Creek is only a symptom of the real problem for Southern California steelhead: the huge human population. Yet these fish are not giving up on us. Any of you who have gone, as I have, to fish in Santa Paula Creek or the lower reaches of Sespe Creek, have driven along the Santa Clara River on Highway 126. The river runs at a crawl, and is primarily used to irrigate citrus groves. Even so, adult steelhead try to run up it—steelhead big enough to supply bragging rights if caught on the North Umpqua in Oregon.

We're not giving up on the Southern California steelhead either. In 2012, NOAA, or the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, published the "SOUTH-CENTRAL/SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA COAST STEELHEAD RECOVERY PLANS. Here is a summary of the plan's objectives:

- Prevent steelhead extinction by protecting existing populations and their habitats.
- Maintain current distribution of steelhead and restore distribution to some previously occupied areas.
- Increase abundance of steelhead to viable population levels, including the expression of all life-history forms and strategies.
- Conserve existing genetic diversity and provide opportunities for interchange of genetic material

between and within viable populations within the DPS.
 Restore and maintain suitable habitat conditions and characteristics for all life-history strategies, thereby

preserving the diversity of life-history strategies that allow for adaptation to a highly variable environment.

 Conduct necessary research to refine recovery criteria, monitor the status and trends of individual populations, and adaptively modify recovery actions and strategies in response to new information and better understanding of the biology and habitat requirements of the species.

Restoring a steelhead population in Southern California, given the challenges, will take a lot of time and a lot of work. Even so, I'm looking forward to catching my first adult steelhead in Malibu Creek or the San Gabriel River. I'm not guessing I'll need a Spey rod, however.

Notes from the Pond

Improved casting accuracy pays off when the fishing is tough!

ast weekend, Jim, Mitch, Rob, and I fished the Santa Ana River and the fish just weren't biting. One of my excuses for not catching is that there were few areas to cleanly make a back cast. Since casting was difficult, I spent most of the day dapping my dry fly in hopes of a bite. Late in the day, I stumbled on a spot that I could make a 30 foot cast upstream to a very promising spot just downstream from a large rock. You may guess what happened next.

Perhaps the fish were easily spooked that day. In this case, the accurate and longer cast paid off with a nice rainbow...and I avoided getting skunked.

Come on out and improve your casting accuracy at the upcoming Sunday Casts November 20 and December 4 and 18, casting starts at 9:00 AM. Practice placing your fly on that promising fishing spot on your first cast.

CASTING TIP: Shallow water, as in low flow streams, accuracy will count. False cast above your target until you are sure you can place the fly in the right spot, on the first try.



Larry Allen Wins 2016 IFFF Mel Krieger Award

arry grew up in the Dallas/Fort Worth area of Texas. He graduated from Loma Linda University School of Dentistry and, while in Dental School, he met his future wife Marie. The two married and now live in Mesa Arizona.

He started fly fishing at the young age of 12 catching his first trout on a fly in the Rocky Mountain National Park. Since then he has fished all over the world, both fresh and saltwater.

In 1981 Larry opened the first fly shop in Arizona, Allen Fly Shop, which was located in Tempe, Arizona. He has taught fly-casting, fly tying, fly fishing classes, and has been a guest speaker to many fly-fishing organizations since 1981 throughout the US. He also became the Arizona Fly Fishing school instructor for the Sage Rod Company. He was a past instructor for Mel Krieger in his Club Pacific fly-fishing schools and became an IFFF Certified Casting Instructor in the early stages of the instructor program. In 2004 he received the IFFF Master Certified Instructor Certification.

Larry joined the Long Beach Casting Club in 2005 after being introduced to the casting games by Joe Libeu and John Van Derhoof and introduced to the ACA by Henry Fujita of the Oakland Casting Club. Since then, Larry has won 4 National Tournament individual gold medals, 2 team gold medals, and a member of the ACA All American Team 6 times.

In 2012, Larry started the Rio Salado Casting Club, introducing casting and tournament casting in Gilbert, Arizona, where members of the Long Beach Casting Club (many of whom lived in Arizona, including Past President Ron Robinson) along with GLoomis rod designer and tournament casting champion, Steve Rajeff and current ACA president Henry Mittel,



provided demonstrations and instructions.

Larry was nominated for the IFFF Mel Krieger Instructor Award in which the criteria are as follows:

- 1. The award will be given annually, if warranted, to a person, a couple or club who have dedicated their lives to fly casting instruction.
- 2. An IFFF member must make the nomination.
- 3. The recipient must be a member of the IFFF.
- 4. The recipient must be an IFFF Certified Instructor.

<u>ADDITIONAL CRITERIA</u> - that may be considered in selecting recipients of this award:

- 1. The candidate should be known as a motivator of students.
- 2. The candidate is known for sharing their knowledge of teaching with others.
- 3. The candidate has made a significant, long-term contribution to the art of fly-casting.

In August 2016, Larry was honored being awarded the Mel Krieger Instructor Award at the IFFF Conclave in Livingston, Montana. Larry now joins another LBCC Mel Krieger Award winner, Joe Libeu, who received his—as the very first recipient—in 2007.



Fly of the Month: **Solly Clouser**

This month I would like to a present a great surf pattern submitted by my friends Al Quattrocchi and Jim Solomon. These two guys are diehard, fanatic surf fishers and they practice their passion on a regular basis. They are both outstanding and talented fly fishers and fly tiers.

This fly has been very successful for them on a wide variety of species in the surf and I have it on good authority that this pattern is also dynamite in freshwater as well.

If you have a hankering for a local salty tug, give the Solly Clouser a try and I am sure it will prove successful for you as well. (—ed.)

Materials for tying the Solly Clouser:

Hook: Gamakatzu B10S stinger #4

Thread: Monofilament

5/32" Dazl-Eyes or bead chain Eves:

Tail: Fox Squirrel Tail

Oil color Rubber legs tied in 'V' style Legs:

Tail Flash: Orange Krystal Flash

Body: Grizzly Variant Schlappen Orange Body Flash: One turn of Dyed UV Polar chenille

Head: flat Diamond Braid

Instructions for tying the Solly Clouser:

Tie in eyes a distance of approximately. 1/3 length of hook shank behind eye of hook. Figure eight eye and then post eye with approximately. 5 tight wraps of thread. Then glue underside of thread to eye.


Wrap thread to just behind eye of hook and tie in one sparse clump of squirrel tail approximately. 3 times the length of hook shank or however long you want the tail. Make sure you put a small amount of super glue on the top of hook shank. Pull hair over top of eyes. Wrap thread tightly at eye of hook then jump thread to just behind the eyes. You want the head of fly to taper nicely. Tie hair down to just before bend of hook.

Tie in rubber legs "V" style starting behind eyes to just short of bend. Make sure legs are divided to each side of hook. Tie in sparse clump of orange Krystal Flash "V" style. Apply super glue to top of the shank and tie in sparse clump of squirrel tail starting at behind the eyes. Now you have sandwiched the rubber legs and flash which should prevent the legs from wrapping around the shank when fishing.

The body is made from one long and large variant schlappen hackle that is tied in wet fly style. Make sure each wrap is pulled back before making the next wrap. You want the hackle tips to lay back. Tie in on wrap of dyed UV Polar chenille wet fly style. Wrap thread back towards bend of the hook while you hold the hackle and chenille in the position of a wet fly. Next tie in about a 3" length of flat diamond braid and wrap sparsely around eyes and to just behind eye of hook. Whip finish and then apply Tuffleye to head.

This fly really pulsates in the water so let it drop during your strips. Remember to always vary the stripping pattern until you find the right Mojo.
