Who You Gonna Call? Glenn Ueda Tells Us How to Bust the "Ghost of the Coast"

Gorbina make tiny ripples in very shallow surf. If you're lucky enough to see one, you've probably already spooked it. If you haven't, your fly probably will. But, if it doesn't, and the corbina takes your fly, you'll be treated to a battle with a trout-sized fish that fights like a marlin. Catching this "ghost of the coast" is an art, and one of its most well-known practitioners is our May speaker: Glenn Ueda. Glenn will talk to us about strategies for catching corbina, or "beans", as they are affectionately nicknamed by the wild-eyed, obsessed anglers who fish for them. Glenn is legendary in the little world of corbina on the fly.

A little autobiographical background from Glenn:

"I now enjoy sharing my passion for fly fishing by conducting store and club seminars throughout Southern





California. A budding writer, I had my first article 'Ghost of the Coast' recently published in California Fly Fisher. With numerous inquiries and always seeking new challenges, I launched 'So Cal Flats Fishing Guide Service' in the spring of 2017. A resounding success, I learned as much about myself as my clients did about corbina. My mission is to have those that I guide learn not only the finer points of pursuing corbina but to also raise their awareness of access to public waters, many of which are walking distance from our home in Huntington Beach. My wife Mona along with our two dogs Kai and Mac have lived in 'HB' since 2015.''

And a little something about his talk: "Glenn holds multiple IGFA world records. He will be talking about sight-fishing for the coveted California Corbina in our local Southern California surf. Matching the Hatch

TREVOR WALKER, PAST PRESIDENT

The small creeks of southern California are overhung with trees and bushes, and a smorgasbord of insects falls onto the water. This means that the trout will rise to anything that looks edible. On tail waters, spring creeks, and large freestone rivers it is a very different story. Typically, large hatches of water-borne flies occur and the trout key in on these hatching flies. Normally, all the angler needs to do is match the hatch and present a drag free drift, and success is assured. The problem is that artificials that appear to us to match the hatch may not appear to be a good match from the trout's view. If no one is doing much good with accepted imitations, it is time for something completely different. A few examples from my experiences illustrate the problem.

Many years ago, Christopher Walker, past president Margaret Walker and I arrived at Osborne Bridge, which spans the Harriman reach of the Henry's Fork, hoping to fish the Green Drake hatch. The water was thick with Green Drakes but a huge flock of Franklin gulls had moved in, swooping over the river and gobbling up all the Green Drakes. Despite the river being blanketed with duns, surface action was zero.

After a quick discussion with a few other anglers at the bridge we concluded that the gulls were putting the fish down. The only thing to do was to check upstream for a gull-free section of the water. The mailboxes parking lot one mile upstream was full. At Last Chance, another mile upstream, there were cars everywhere, so we decided to try the Henry's Fork above Island Park Reservoir. We parked at the Coffee Pot Campground and walked about a mile upstream. To our relief, there were lots of Drakes and no other anglers.

We drifted our Drake patterns for 20 to 30 minutes with very little success. Quite suddenly, Margaret started to steadily catch fish so we asked her what fly she was using. The answer was size 10 to 12



Renegades. Without a second to lose, Christopher and I both changed over to Renegades and we all finished up having the kind of day where you lose count of the number of fish released. Now all this time the fish were most definitely taking drakes so we were forced to conclude that although a Renegade did not look like a drake to us, to the fish, it looked more like a drake than the customary patterns.

Yet another example of the completely wrong fly working when all else fails comes from Raynolds bridge on the Madison in Montana. The date was mid-June, two weeks before the salmon fly hatch was due and six weeks before hopper action could be expected. This time, three past presidents {Trevor Walker, Margaret Walker and Dean Rickerd} were fishing—again there was little action and nothing notable going on below the surface. Finally, in desperation, Margaret put on a hopper. The fish rose to the hopper as if they had been waiting for it all year. Suddenly, a slow day became a good day.

Why the completely wrong fly worked cannot always be explained immediately. In this case, we would eventually find out why Margaret's change over to a hopper saved the day. The same three past presidents were involved; this time, the date was October. We hiked in to Little Lakes Valley (the location of the club's Brookie Bash) and were dismayed to find the second lake in the chain, Marsh Lake, partially iced over. The lake appeared dead and Margaret, following her rule of starting with the same fly that she had used the previous day, fished a hopperthathad worked on Hot Creek and the Owens.



The year has been filled with casting, as full as a casting club could hope for.



National Casting Champion, Jimmy Green said, "Casting is really not very difficult. It doesn't take any more strength to make bad mistakes than it does to make the correct movement."



The small brook trout hit the hopper immediately, and flipping it from an ice flow into open water seemed to work especially well. Later, thanks to Gary LaFontaine, we learned that when the wind blows against a mountain front like the eastern Sierra a strong updraft is created, which can carry hoppers and other terrestrials to great heights and drop them onto high country lakes.

The salmon fly and the golden stone are the hatches that all of us love to fish. The Henry's Fork around the boat launch just downstream from the Warm River confluence is a prime stonefly area in June. Margaret, Trevor and Dean Rickerd fished here during a salmon fly and golden stone hatch. The fish treated our Sofa Pillows, Irresistibles, etc. with disdain. Suddenly, Margaret started to catch fish and told us they were taking Chernobyl Ants like they were going out of style. It's a simple pattern consisting of a narrow strip of gray foam material, tapered at both ends and tied to a large hook; tying time about 30 seconds As we age, seeing small dry flies on the water becomes a challenge, and so Margaret and Trevor increasingly resorted to fishing soft hackle wet flies across and down. Trevor prepared fly teams with a partridge hackle peacock as the dropper and a partridge and pheasant tail as the point fly. This team was rapidly attached to the main leader by a loop to loop connection. Margaret would often *REPLACE* the beautiful partridge and pheasant tail with a prince nymph. Trevor would carefully explain that a nymph was fished on the bottom with or without an indicator. Soft hackles, on the other hand, were designed to fish just below the surface.

Reality set in when a novice friend from Crestline joined Margaret and Trevor on the Firehole. In the late afternoon, much to Trevor's chagrin, the novice friend was catching two fish to every one caught by Trevor. "What fly are you using?" shouted Trevor. "The Prince Nymph Margaret told me to put on!" shouted the novice. At that instant Trevor became an instant convert and the Prince Nymph





became a vital part of his soft hackle arsenal.

The conclusion is that when no one is doing any good by matching the hatch the day may be saved by experimenting with something completely different, as these examples show. We emphasize that one should always start out with the conventional approach and only use the unconventional approach when matching the hatch is clearly failing.



Fly of the Month: Smoke Jumper

It seems like everywhere you look these days another new fly pops up and takes the fishing world by storm. The storm doesn't usually last too long, but certain patterns manage to withstand the test of time due to their effectiveness and ease of tying. This month, I nominate the Smoke Jumper.

I learned of this fly in 2014, and many of you who attended the Wednesday night Fly Tying Forums back then had the pleasure of learning about it and tying it from Joe Libeu. Joe told me about the Smoke Jumper a few months prior and I feel that now is the time to again let it all tumble out.

What do I like about this pattern? What is there not to like about it! Look at the images and read the instructions; it will be simple to tie. Look at the images again and tell me this fly won't work—use by itself or as the top fly in a two fly rig. What I really like about this pattern is the body and wing combination. Change the body a little by adding wire (and weight) and it will suspend its fanny down into and through the film. You could even add one or two turns of hackle as a parachute (albeit increasing the tying difficulty!) around the base of the CDC wing, allowing it to "hang" it even better in the meniscus. Fish love a pattern that has the appearance of helplessness!

I have looked at versions of the fly online and there are tons of variations. I've seen hackle stacker styles and all types of wing, thorax and body combinations. I have listed three combinations that I think will cover the widest range of conditions, especially if you want to give one a try on the next Owens or Green River Trip: 1) one closest to the original as best I can tell with a peacock eye or herl barb body; 2) the classic Zebra Midge version; and 3) a Smoke Jumper version of my favorite \$3 Dip (see the March 2013 edition of Target Talk for that pattern).

The combinations I recommend should cover the majority of **my** needs but what about yours?

MATERIALS FOR TYING THE SMOKE JUMPER:

- Hook: Tiemco 2487 Midge/Emerger style in sizes 14-22.
 Thread: 6/0 or 8/0 of a color to blend with body color.
- Body: Combinations to consider: Red thread with silver wire rib, Black thread with silver wire rib, Stripped peacock eye barb.
- Thorax: Peacock Herl or Hairline's Peacock ICE Dubbing.
- Wingcase: CDC (cul du cunard) fibers (try natural or light gray).
- Wing: CDC fibers from the Wingcase over the eye.



INSTRUCTIONS FOR TYING THE SMOKE JUMPER:

Attach the thread to the hook and wind the thread down to the middle of the bend. If you plan to tie the fly with a peacock 'eye' barb or 'herl' barb (often incorrectly called quill) body, then let's talk a bit about the difference. Many people believe that the classic two-color barb is from the herl—it is not. Using the barb from herl will give you a very slightly and barely noticeable two-colored body when wrapped. The peacock **eye barb** is the proper choice and will give you a striking light and dark segmented look that it is remarkably realistic! Use a plastic (not rubber, which is more abrasive) drafting eraser to gently rub the fluff off, and tie in the barb by the tip end and wind up to the thorax.

To tie a wire-ribbed version, then tie in the wire at the middle of the bend. Wind your thread smoothly forward to the thorax remembering that this is your body; so make it look nice! Spiral the wire evenly forward to the thorax and tie off. If you want to make the fly sit lower in the water, then wind the wire closer together. I recommend wiggling the wire to remove the excess rather than cutting it with your scissors—it will help save your scissors and the broken end will not cut your thread, while the scissor-cut end will.

- 2 Select one good quality CDC puff or feather for the wing. If your CDC plumes are not really good quality, I suggest using two. I really like a fairly full wing and wingcase for this fly, which will help it hang in the meniscus and not slide below it. Tie in the CDC at the beginning of the thorax and pointing rearwards. The length of the CDC should be about the length of the hook. Remember, this is the wingcase and the wing. If you are in doubt, stop and fold the wingcase forward to the eye to double check that it is the correct length. If, when you are finished, the wing looks too long, then shorten it by plucking the ends with your finger nails; not scissors, which will look unnatural.
- 3 The thorax should be peacock herl or peacock herl colored dubbing. Using herl, tie it in by the tip and with the dull/dark side pointing forward. Wind



forward as needed to produce a full, neat looking thorax. Lately I have become quite enamored with Peacock ICE dubbing and regularly use it in place of herl. If that's what you want to use then apply dubbing to your thread, creating a short, tapered rope, wind this forward to the headspace and pick it out a bit with your bodkin; this will help with flotation and realism.

4 Pull the CDC wing forward over the thorax. I like to let it slide a small amount down the sides of the thorax as this will let it float better, but don't get carried away. If it wants to slide down too much, give the material a quarter twist to keep it under control. Tie the wing off at the headspace and then wind a couple of turns around the base of the wing to help gather and control it. Form a neat small head, apply some head cement and you are ready to head on out to the stream and give your new Smoke Jumper a try.
