Leader's Line...

Chilly Water, Cold Sulky Trout

uring our Lower Owens River Club Trip in early January of 2019, water temperatures dipped below 40 degrees Fahrenheit and the fish became very stubborn...there were very few fish caught. Cold temperatures in early January resulted in cold-blooded sluggish trout behavior. It seemed that each morning the fish just refused to eat any of my offerings and flies needed to be presented directly to the mouths of fish. How can we catch more fish? There were many fishy looking spots where making the following changes improved chances to catch stubborn trout:

- Adding or removing weighted flies.
- Adding or removing split shot lead.
- Increase or decrease leader length between strike indicator and flies.
- Shorten casts to reduce slack and set hook.

Only through trial and no-catch will you know:

- How heavy or light the flies is needed?
- How much lead to add or remove?
- How much to lengthen or shorten the leader to strike indicator?

The answers to these questions can be easily worked out, if you think about it. You just need to remember that in winter, trout hang on the bottom and other areas where food may be obtained with minimal effort.

Increase the weight on your flies and add split shot to bring the flies to the trout. The amount of weight that you will need to get the flies down to the fish is typically affected by:

- Current speed fast moving water will carry flies over spots holding fish.
- Stream depth and leader length requires more lead or heavier flies to get the flies to the bottom faster.
- Thickness of leader thicker leader moves line downstream faster than thinner leader.
- Fly sizes unweighted large flies drift downstream faster than smaller flies.

If all else fails, go to turnout #9, then walk 100 yards upstream to a pool fed by the stream running over a cobble drop-off. Yell "Eddie sent me!" You will catch fish. I did and caught a fish, with witnesses Eddie Madrid and John Jones! Some may say I caught it because I built my rod in Eddie's LBCC Rod Building Class. Others say I was lucky...what do you think?

Best wishes to catch more BIG fish! See you at the LBCC Pond and upcoming club trips.

Time to "Learn the Kern" with Guy Jeans

TERRY KOMISAK, FIRST VICE PRESIDENT

Guy Jeans, owner/guide/instructor, is a Certified Casting Instructor with the Fly Fishing International. He guides, lectures and teaches over 250 days a year all over the Southern Sierra, Sequoia National Forest, Golden Trout Wilderness, Domeland Wilderness and South Sierra Wilderness. He also guides and teaches "Fly Fishing in the Surf" classes along the California coastline. He is an "Elite Pro Staff" member and instructor for Redington.

In 2012, Guy received the "Lee Wulff Award" from the International Federation of Fly Fishers. He has fly fished all over the US and Canada and loves to catch all species of fish on a fly. He is also host of the critically acclaimed show and DVD series "Sierra Fly Fishing", and he writes articles about fly fishing for magazines and newspapers throughout the west. He is a contract fly designer for Solitude Fly Company and his Kern Emergers and other patterns are used and sold internationally.

Guy will be talking to the club on February 28, 2019. The topic is an overview of the Kern River, including the southern Sierra and the Kern River drainage. Lake Isabella is included in the area and allows the angler to sample carp and crappie. Brown and rainbow trout are found in both the river and lake. When the river is flowing too high for comfortable wading, in the high runoff season of early summer, Guy will give us pointers about fishing the upper creeks which gather to form the upper Kern River.

With the Kern River drainage being as large as it is, for the more adventurous angler, overnight trips may be required to get a feel of the Golden Trout Wilderness. Guy has experience in guiding pack horse trips into this area.

If you like backpacking, you may want to quiz Guy



about this aspect of the wilderness area. Come to the club meeting to learn all that Guy has to offer about the Southern Sierra and Kern River drainage.




Captain's Corner: Southwestern Tournament Looms Large

We have two club casts scheduled for February: Sunday, February 3rd and Sunday, February 21st.


BROOKIE BASH IS ON!



Body:	Olive or Tan Dubbing (I like Australian Possum) or dubbing of your liking
Head/Legs:	Black or Brown dubbing

Bead: Size:	to match hook size

Rib:	Small green wire (you can also use copper/black wire or 3x or 4x Tippet)

Lower Owens Winter 2019 Tenkara Clinics January 19 & 20 and February 16 & 17, 2019 On the H2O Guided Tenkara Fly Fishing Clinic w/ Chris Leonard & Luong Tam – Bishop, California

Join Chris Leonard and Luong Tam for a full day on Saturday and a half day on Sunday of guided Tenkara fly fishing in the Wild Trout Section of the Lower Owens River this winter 2019. Chris & Luong will offer two clinics this winter: January 19/20 and again on February 16/17. We will focus on developing a strong set of Tenkara specific fly fishing skills while targeting trout on the Lower Owens. 
Fly Tying Tip of the Month: Parachutes for Small Flies



How many of us try wrapping thread up and down a parachute post to form the base and have the thread unwrap on us if we pull too hard? What about trying to tie off the hackle after its wrapped? I have, and it can be aggravating. Well here's a good solution to the problem...

On small parachute flies (#18 and smaller), Tim Flagler uses UV curing resin to set the post and finish off the hackle wraps. I have modified his technique a bit and find it much easier and faster than using thread on the post and to tie off the hackle.


 I use a thin amount of posting material, here EP Trigger Point Fibers, bound to the hook with a few (three tops) wraps of thread (Photo #1).





2. Then twist the post and apply a single drop of thin UV resin (Photo #2). I used Solarez Bone Dry as it has a very thin brush, but a drop of any thin resin at the end of a bodkin will also work. Just be careful as too much will wick up the post too far, making the entire wing rigid and something that a fish might likely spit out.

 While still holding the twisted post hit with the UV light (Photo #3).






 Once you have your tail, abdomen, thorax completed and hackle tied in, form a neat head and whip finish your thread (Photo#4).

5. To wrap the hackle, again use a single drop of UV resin on the stiffened section of the post, then wrap your hackle up the post through the resin. As you hold your hackle in the wet resin, again hit it with the UV light (Photo #5).





 Trim your hackle and you are done (Photo#6)! All without the pain of horizontal thread wraps, tying down your hackle and trying to whip finish behind the eye or on the post.

POINTS TO CONSIDER: the most important thing about this method is the amount of UV resin you use. It cannot be stressed enough that a light, single drop

of resin will do the job. Any more and it will quickly bleed up the twisted wing, making the entire post solid. While Solarez Bone Dry has a thin brush, you will need to drain or scrape off the excess resin that is above the brush where it is attached to the cap or it will run down towards the tip. **Also**, if you have a resin without a brush, put a drop on a Post-It Note and use your bodkin to apply a small drop from the Post-It Note to the post. Easier single handed when you are holding the parachute post with the other hand. Just don't leave the Post-It Note in sunlight or flash it with your UV light!

Finally, using too many wraps when tying in the wing will increase its size at the base, and cause it to taper from base to top like a wine bottle. This means the first turn of hackle won't be flush with the thorax and the hackle barb, and the base of the wing will be exposed. The fish won't care but another more critical tier might!!!

Fly of the Month: Hot Creek Micro Caddis

A couple of years ago I was going to go up to Mammoth Veteran's Day weekend with my daughter, Nicole, and decided to take a look in my fly boxes. I had discussed fly selection with my local expert, Jim Solomon, based on his trip two weeks prior and, man, I was woefully low on the style of caddis that had been hatching for him plus the BWOs that were just starting to make their appearance. It was time to hit the vise and crank out some Hot Creek Micro Caddis...

Many of you who have fished Hot Creek are well aware of the Gray Sedge (caddis) that hatch there all year long. As the season progresses, the caddis seem to shrink in size, all the while increasing our frustration. The caddis that were working two weeks before my expected trip were size #22 and #24. Now, I really don't want to spend a lot of time trying to tie some fancy or difficult pattern for something this small, when there is a pattern that is very simple to tie and effective to fish.


The Hot Creek Micro Caddis is a simple thread body, CDC down wing, peacock herl thorax and one or two turns of dun hackle. Jeez, how easy can you get—okay you can; don't use a hackle and it will still work. The beauty of this pattern is that I wouldn't hesitate to use it during a midge hatch or for emerging Blue-Wing Olives. If you're tying this pattern and want to meet all of these three circumstances then take the extra 30 seconds and use the hackle; it really seems to help during the BWO hatches...

Oh, so you want a fly to use someplace other than Hot Creek? Heck, I have used this fly fishing scum suckers and midge hatches on the Green, micro caddis and late season Pale Morning Duns (size #18 & #20) on the Henry's Fork, Callibaetis emergers (size #18) on Lake Hebgen and bank feeding cutthroats on Slough Creek (size #20 & #22), the Lamar (size #18 & #20) and Soda Butte Creek in Yellowstone.

Believe me, this fly works.

MATERIALS FOR TYING THE HOT CREEK MICRO CADDIS:

Hook:	Tiemco #101 (ring eye) in sizes #18–26 (Partridge Vince Marinaro Midge hooks in sizes #20–24 are an excellent choice as well)
Thread:	Uni-Thread 8/0 in bright green or chartreuse
Body:	Your tying thread
Wing:	Natural dark dun CDC feathers tied downwing style
Thorax:	Peacock herl
Hackle:	Natural or dyed grizzly medium dun trimmed top and bottom
Optional:	3-6 strands of pale olive Zelon tail for mayfly emergers



INSTRUCTIONS FOR TYING THE HOT CREEK MICRO CADDIS:

- Attach the thread to the hook and wind down to the end of the shank, and then back again to the beginning of the thorax. The thorax should be about ¼ of the shank length. Since the thread is your body material, you should take care and wind smoothly, minimizing gaps and overlaps to create a smooth body. If you want to tie this specifically as a mayfly emerger like a Blue-Wing Olive, add about 4 to 6 strands of pale olive Zelon as a tail. This will imitate the mayfly's shuck.
- 2 Select a CDC feather to use for the wing and, using the loose loop technique, tie it in so the wing lies flat over the body, extending to or just slightly beyond the end of the body. When fishing this as an emerger, you can shorten the wing slightly to make it look more like a wing that has not fully expanded, and is therefore an insect not ready to fly away.
- 3 Select a dun-colored hackle from the very base of a neck that matches the size of the hook, and tie it in with the dull side pointing forward, towards the eye. Select a nice but fairly short fibered strand of peacock herl from the bottom of the "stick" and tie it in with the dull side (the quill side) going forward. Wind the peacock herl forward to the headspace and tie it off. This should be about four to eight turns, depending on the size of the fly and the density of the herl.
- 4 Wind the hackle forward about 1 ¹/₂ to 2 ¹/₂ turns, depending on the size of the fly. The hackle is not really for flotation but simulates legs and just adds to the bugginess of the pattern, so keep it simple and don't overdo it. Whip-finish a very, very small head and hit it with a coat of head cement. With flies this size the last thing you want to do is leave the eye glogged with cement. So, take a moment and grab something skinny, like an old hackle tip, and pass it through the eye to clear it out.

Now, go have some fun fishin'...



NOTES:

Since I first wrote this, there have been a lot of changes in the fly tying world of materials. Many of the new items now available have made tying even quicker and easier and patterns, frankly, better.

Of these new products, the one I have most embraced is Hareline Dubbing's Ice Dubbing. This product alone or mixed with other dubbing materials is great and creates color and flash that I believe really attracts fish to your fly. For the Hot Creek Micro Caddis, using the Peacock-colored Ice Dubbing for the thorax instead of peacock herl will add a bit more flash to your fly. It will also make it more durable and easier to tie (unless you struggle with dubbing!).

Another product that I have found very useful is Enrico Puglisi's (EP) Trigger Point Fibers. This fine-textured synthetic material is also waterproofed and that means less care needed when fishing as opposed to CDC that won't perform well with just any floatant.

If you read these Fly of the Month articles you will have noticed that many patterns that I have been pushing have been ribbed. Using an extra small wire ribbing in a contrasting color to the body makes the fly look more realistic with minimal weight added. For darker bodied flies I routinely reach for Ultra Wire's Chartreuse and on lighter flies consider using the olive.

One final thought... When considering hackle purchases, I would suggest buying a neck—especially a Whiting neck. No, I don't get a kickback from them but even their poorest grade rooster necks have an astounding range of high quality hackles. You cannot get that buying a saddle that will only get you one or two sizes of flies that you can tie. I have a lot of older Hoffman necks and even those were amazing for their time and they still offer a lot of tiny hackles that can be used for small flies like this month's pattern.
