Leader's Line...

Why is the Green River Trip so Popular?

ishing the Green River, from the river bank or a guided drift boat, is truly a treat for club members. The local businesses boast that anglers will catch trout averaging 16 inches. There were reports of 15 to 20 fish per day per club member fishing from boats, including a few fish larger than 21 inches. Many participants answered the question of "how many fish" honestly by saying, "I lost count after 15 or 20 fish". Forty club members just returned from the Green River and here is a partial list of the reasons the club trip is well attended each year.

- Catch 16 inch-plus trout in large numbers.
- Fish with great guides from Old Moe Guide Service.
- Stay in clean comfortable cabins at the Red Canyon Lodge.
- Have fun with old friends and new friends.
- Be part of the natural beauty of the Flaming Gorge area while fishing.
- Combine a club trip with a chance to visit family members and friends living nearby.
- Test personal skills for casting, angling and reading waters.
- Escape from LA traffic, work, and flat land.
- Pose with a trophy-sized fish (without dropping it!) for a photo.
- Eat homemade huckleberry ice cream at the Dutch John Resort store.
- Terrific fishing trip value \$

During the last dinner of the trip, everyone asked that their spot be reserved for next year. Sorry, anyone else wanting to go will need to be placed on a waiting list. If you would like to attend as a third group, please send me an email. Perhaps having a trip during the third week will give people a chance to fish during the great annual cicada hatch occurring from late May through early June. We can add the cicada hatch as a new reason to participate in this club trip.

The biggest challenge of the trip was the wind; forget about freezing cold temperatures. Everyone reported the need for their best freezing cold weather gear. Wind will make us feel even colder and compound flaws in our casting skills and make tiny flies stick in our fleece, knit caps, fishing buddies, or guides. At least, the very cold wind didn't freeze the fly line in the rod guides and result in lost fish.

As we're advocates for "know before you go", the club distributes the trip information during the pre-trip meeting, listing favorite midway motels, rest stops and restaurants. Additionally, there are numerous

Mammoth Fisheries Summer Trifecta: Hot Creek, Upper Owens, and San Joaquin River

our speaker this month, Chris Leonard, is a teacher at Mammoth High School. His greatest passions are education and fly fishing, making him a choice fly fishing instructor and on-water guide.

He guides through Kittredge Sports during the summer, also weekends and holidays during the school year: rivers and lakes, Tenkara and western rods. He has lived in Mammoth Lakes full-time since 2004. His favorite waters to fish and guide include the Owens River, Hot Creek, Rush Creek, Rock Creek, San Joaquin River, East Walker River and Crowley Lake.

A seasoned traveler, he has chased trout as close as the Western USA, as far away as the Midwest, Eastern USA, Central America and South America. He has hooked chrome in the Pacific Northwest and Alaska, redfish in NOLA and bonefish, permit, and tarpon in Belize.

His passion for fly fishing began in 2005 when he started the Mammoth High School Fly Fishing Club. Every spring, he takes local Mammoth kids out on the water to teach them how to fly fish!

Many Long Beach Casting Club members have spent time in the Eastern Sierras. It is the closest worldclass trout fly fishing to Southern California. After the winter snowstorms, this summer will be epic! The rivers will be healthy, and the lakes full.

Chris will bring to the club his local knowledge of how to improve your odds of a successful day on three of his favorite fisheries: Hot Creek, the Upper Owens and the San Joaquin River. Hot Creek is undoubtedly Chris'



favorite moving water fishery. He averages about 75 days a year on this blue-ribbon creek. The Upper Owens is one of the most beginner-friendly rivers in the area. And the San Joaquin River is an absolute gem. It is second to none in regard to the pristine beauty of its natural surroundings.

Chris will discuss where, when and how to best fish these waters. He will also touch a bit on two of his other favorite fisheries: The East Walker River and Crowley Lake. Please join us Thursday, June 27, as we gear up for what is going to be a productive and lengthy summer of fly fishing in the Mammoth Lakes region.

"Rookies and Brookies are made for each other!"




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
The Green River Trip #1 in Pictures: Great Fishing, Crazy Weather and Much, Much More

Talk! This month's Leader's Line is devoted to Green River Trip #2, and if you skip to the back you'll find a Green River recap in our Fly of the Month segment. Thanks to President Colin Kumabe and Past Prez John Van Derhoof for these excellent articles. As I once again find myself with some space to fill in the current Target Talk, and I've got a whole lot of pictures, I thought I'd put together a pictorial journey of Green River Trip #1.



Those of you who have attended the Green River trip in the past, and bothered to read the pre-trip information, may remember this quote from Page One: "...there is no such thing as bad weather; only inappropriate clothing!" My son, who spent the winter in Fargo, North Dakota, might disagree with this philosophy, but in the case of the Green River in May it works great. Fortunately, it appeared that everyone brought their long johns, wool beanies, rain jackets and fingerless gloves on Trip #1. We got rain, we got snow, we got wind and we got sun. And that was just the first twenty minutes.




With this kind of weather, fishing ranged from tough to spectacular, but everyone (or at least everyone I talked to) caught fish. Some people caught a whole lot of fish. As is usual on any trip, those in the drift boats did the best, especially when it came to fishing dry flies. However, many anglers walking on the banks found pods of aggressive trout to drift nymphs to, and some were lucky enough to encounter rises and tie on some dries.

This was my third trip, and so far I've confined my fishing to the "A" section of the Green, but there is also a "B" and "C" section of the river (see the pre-trip



information mentioned above), a nearby boat ramp and picnic area on the reservoir called "Antelope Flats" and the lake right by the Red Canyon Lodge. There is also an area called "Jones Hole", roughly a two hour drive from Red Canyon Lodge. More on Jones Hole later. But there's a lot more to this trip than fishing.



For one thing, there's the food. The Red Canyon Lodge and Flaming Gorge Resort are both very good. The dinners were wonderful, and punctuated by great conversation. Also, Dan Luas, staying at the Red Canyon Lodge, served up excellent breakfasts on Tuesday and Thursday morning. Any plans I'd had for sticking to my diet were "tabled", so to speak. Tuesday was tamales and Thursday was omelettes, and both were amazing. It was a great chance to catch up with others on the trip and get some fishing reports. Hats off to Dan.

Another big draw is the scenery. I flew in to Salt Lake City this time and rented a car. After a long and heated discussion with Siri (I think I may have made her cry), I gave in and used her route along I-80. It turned out to be beautiful, especially for an old fan of Western



movies like me. It takes you through Wyoming cow country, then crests a timbered summit or two in the Uinta Mountains on its way to the Lodge. I passed a couple of trailheads with fishing signs on them. I made a plan to come back and fish them, but ran out of time.

Once you're at the lodge, things get even prettier. There is a beautiful lake which goes almost to the front porches of the resort's cabins. There's a canyon rim trail with magnificent views of the Flaming Gorge through the pine trees. The area is open meadow, carpeted with grass and sagebrush and studded with Ponderosa pines. I walked it one evening during a snowstorm, enjoying the beauty. It was even prettier the following morning at dawn, with a blue sky and bright sun slanting through the trees, melting the previous night's snow.





Which brings me to the wildlife. As I walked in the shadows of the pines, I spooked a herd of elk and got to see them canter across the trail not far in front of me. A little further along I came near to the campground and decided it was time to go back. I turned to see a bighorn ram in the trail. He must have known it wasn't hunting season, because he took his time leaving and gave me plenty of really good photo ops.

My first Green River trip, years ago, was the first time I saw a pronghorn antelope. I've since learned that they are so plentiful in Wyoming that you don't even need a tag to hunt them, and on my return trip to Salt Lake City this time I saw many of them on the hilltops. I also learned on this trip that wild horses can be seen on the 191, north of the I-80...something to keep in mind for next time.



But you don't have to leave your drift boat to see wildlife on the Green. I saw a couple of ospreys with trout in their talons, just demonstrating who really knows how to fish. Mark Flo saw one with a trout so large that the poor bird almost couldn't get out of the water with it. My first trip on the Green, I saw something swimming toward me that made me wonder whether I should get out of the water and



run. It turned out to be a muskrat. There are otters, duck, mergansers and other creatures on the water.

But let's get back to the fishing. The Green River is known for its cicada hatch (a form of locust that is really big, unbelievably noisy and irresistible to trout). This hatch occurs in late May and June, so our trips are generally far too early, especially Trip #1 (see Colin's comments in Leader's Line). But one of our own, Mr.




John Lincoln, was able to find an early cicada hatch.



John took a two hour drive (and a significant hike) to Jones Hole, a spot on the Green River in Dinosaur National Monument, well downstream of the Gorge. It's famous for ancient Native American pictographs. John was able to see the pictographs but also ran into the only cicadas anyone saw (or heard) on the trip. He fished cicadas on the surface and caught some really nice trout.

Beautiful scenery, crazy weather, great food (and company), really cool wildlife, excellent fishing and the possibility of casting a dry fly the size of your thumb to willing trout. How could it get any better?

Oregon's Deschutes River: We are "Golden"!

The Deschutes River, here in now-and-then sunny Oregon, is beloved of flyfishers. It hosts a famous run of summer steelhead and has an exquisite resident native trout, known as the "redside rainbow". The flies are big. No squinting through your magnifiers to tie on a #22 Zebra Midge here; if your #16 Caddis Pupa isn't netting fish, you "trade up" to a #14.

There are tremendous hatches here, but one of them so completely overshadows all the others that it's known simply as "The Hatch". This is a mix of salmonflies, golden stones and Little Yellow Sallies. It goes from mid-May through June, and it's on now.



My wife Julie and I went on a drive around beautiful, snowy Mount Hood on Saturday, ending up in the town of Maupin, right in the heart of the Deschutes stonefly madness. We'd brought a picnic with us and found a day-use area just above the river. A big stonefly showed up on our picnic table. Julie, sandwich in hand, ran for her life. I went down to the river and got these pictures, wishing I'd brought a fly rod.

These are all golden stoneflies (Acroneuria californica); I haven't seen any salmonflies (Pteronarcys californica), which are even bigger. But these guys are big enough. The favored imitation, a "Chubby Chernobyl", is usually tied on at least a #8 hook.



Stonefly "hatches" are a little different from the mayfly and caddis behavior we're used to. Typically stonefly nymphs crawl along the river bottom to the bank, to hatch. The surface pandemonium ensues when they wander into the bushes and mate (see the picture). They frequently fall into the water, and the trout are right by the bank, waiting.

Needless to say, I won't make the mistake of coming here without a fly rod again. Next time, I'll be rigged up with a #8 Chubby Chernobyl. Tight lines!

Fly Tying Tip: UV Resin



Alot has been written about UV Resin types and their cure lights, but I was asked recently when do you use the resin? Initially UV resins were used as a replacement for epoxy. As the resins cure immediately, there is no need for a drying wheel, multiple coats with drying times in between coats! For large fly heads, thick UV Resin is a must as the faster flowing ones are harder to work with in heavy layers. You can also use multiple layers instead of a single thick one.



I use the medium thick resins to protect the bucktail on Clousers and similar flies that will hug the bottom (PHOTO-1). The resin is a great protector and will allow your flies to last a bit longer. How about UV bodies for small bait fish imitations or shrimp? Using clear will give you a translucent body allowing the underbody to reflect through.

Thinner resins and flexible resins are great for producing shell backs on scuds, or sowbugs (PHOTO-2). They can also be used for wing cases on nymphs. How about a thin coat on the face of a deer hair popper to give it some stiffness? Use the flex types to stiffen the front of large synthetic wings on streamers. Helps them retain their shape when stripped.



You can use the real thin versions (brush on) with parachute wing posts and hackle (previous tip) or to penetrate thread wraps in lieu of head cement. Try protecting delicate abdomens like Peccary and quills with a coating. Coat heads of Thunder Creek and similar minnows.

Finally you have colored resins. Loon and Solarez have "colors" that can be used as hot spots, bodies, colored wing cases, eggs, etc. Let your imagination run wild (PHOTO-3). Finally, check out the web for additional ideas, like the Facebook page for Solarez, some great ideas on uses for UV resins.



Fly of the Month: The Green River at 800 CFS... No Thanks!

Well what a difference a year makes. Once again the Green River provided a ton of opportunities and several challenges. Fishing was pretty good but as the river was running at its bare minimum flow of 800 cfs, they were a lot tougher to find



Unlike years past, I went to tie flies at the East Idaho Fly Tying Expo before going to the Green. Held in Idaho Falls, the show was three weeks earlier than normal. By going to the Green afterwards I thought my fishing might be a little warmer and more similar to what I was used to. Strike one...

This year has been marked by a lot of late winter and early spring snowstorms in the Wasatch Range in north central Utah and Idaho and the Uinta Mountains over by the Green River. While the Wasatch Range had a lot of low snow on my drive up I-15 to Idaho Falls, the drive east from Ogden to Flaming Gorge Lodge was almost entirely white. The Uintas were particularly striking with snow and red rock but what really surprised me was seeing Sheep Creek Bay. Many of the Club's members have fished there but it was completely frozen over. As was Cart Creek Bay which is the arm of Flaming Gorge Reservoir that lies below the suspension bridge just before you cross the dam. I will say that it finally thawed when I was leaving six days later.

When I got to the Lodge I was able to check in early, grab a quick lunch and make my way quickly down to Little Hole to get in



an afternoon's fishing. As I got down to the water I was pretty surprised at how low the flow was. Yup, I knew it was 800 cfs and had been there during 900–950 cfs flows but 800 cfs was markedly different. Normally I can see enough into the water and spot fish finning in the current. Not this time and being a Sunday, there were but a few anglers to be seen and there were some Baetis in the air. The fish shoulda' been there.


I waited a bit to see if there were any fish rising—they didn't—and then rigged up a two-fly rig. I put a #18 Halo on top and a black and copper #20 Snowcone on the bottom. About ten casts later I had my first fish and it was a rainbow on the Halo. And so went the afternoon, mostly rainbows, a smattering of energetic browns, all on the Halo and all ho-hum fish around 17"—18".

I know you're sick of hearing about the Halo but the danged thing works and it *always* works a little better once it has been chewed on a bit. What was surprising was that nothing touched any midges that I offered. I switched out the black Snowcone pretty early on and tried several midge alternatives: a Copper John, multiple colors of Zebra midges, \$3 Dips and yes, sadly Yash, a Twin Midge, all with zero positive results. In fact, I caught no fish on midges this entire trip. Saw midges in the air (really tiny) but no hook-ups.



I floated both Monday and Tuesday with Doug Roberts, owner of Old Moe Guide Service. I have been fishing with Doug for years now and he never fails to produce a great day on the water. This year was no exception save the fact that the fish were in quite different locations from previous years. Monday morning we were greeted with 23 degree temps at the put-in for the 'A' Section and I was still de-icing my guides around 11:00 AM. The morning proved to be a bit on the slow side until Doug put on a secret weapon: the Green River Midge (GRM for short). However it was not a midge and while still sworn to secrecy I CAN tell you it was about two inches long to the tail, grayish in color with some brown and green sparkle, had no wing and was tied on a homemade jig hook with a bunch of lead. It was fished dead drift as the bottom of a two-fly rig and was really effective.

Once the fish started to hit the upper fly, a Baetis nymph that Doug ties, we knew the fish were starting to key in on BWOs and it was time



to switch over to a two-nymph rig: a Halo on the bottom and Doug's pattern, which was essentially a dark pheasant tail body but with a pale thorax that included some UV flash.

Soon it was dry fly time and we did very well on a Hackle Stacker of Doug's design. It was quite visible even from 50 or even 60 feet out and, more importantly, the fish liked it. Yes we really were fishing at those distances as any noise from the boat would put the little buggers down!

Day Two floating was, at least from the fishing perspective, a carbon copy of Day One. The only exception was the temperature which was technically 12 degrees warmer but infinitely colder due to a wind that must have come down to Utah via the Artic Circle. Same flies in the morning; same

flies at midday and same dry flies to end the day. Probably 30 fish or more each day. It could have been better but I doubt my arm would have agreed.

Walk and wade fishing was certainly a lot more challenging than floating. Didn't have too many people to contend with until



fishing with my friend (and ex-wife) Kelley, and her friend Steve on Friday, but since the fish were in deeper water or displaced altogether it was definitely slower-paced. Even slower than my first "half" day but I will say that the dry fly fishing in a few spots was at times pretty good. I picked up a really nice brown between ramps #1 and #2 on a size #20 Upright BWO which was tied in tandem with Doug's Hackle Stacker. Another pattern that worked well was the Nearly Dun that I featured in last Month's Fly of the Month article.

I love fishing the Green; that much should be obvious. I keep going back because every trip is different and I learn so much more about fishing (and the River as well) every time I return. That means you will have to read something like this again next year...





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
