

Alex Cady Educates Us on Catching Freshwater Bass

If you are like me, most of your fly fishing life has been focused on trout fishing. Only in the past five years have I started getting interested in other species, thanks to the education that I have received from the presentations at the club. In July we are pleased to announce that Alex Cady will be speaking to us on catching freshwater bass with a fly. Alex provided me with the following bio:

"You can pretty much say that Alex was born with a fishing rod in his hand. He caught his first fish when he was only two years old with his Grandpa Joe. When Alex was six years old he learned how to fly fish the streams and lakes near Mammoth Lakes with his father.

"Any chance Alex got to fish, before school, he would venture off and fish at a local pond for bass or offshore to chase tuna and sharks. At the age of 18 he moved to Mammoth Lakes and went to the Clearwater Guide School to chase his dream of being a fishing guide. In 2014 he moved back to Southern California to guide the local inshore and lakes.

"Over the years Alex homed in on the local Southern California and San Diego bass lakes and onshore bass species. Alex is now proud to call 'The Fly Stop' in San Diego home, as head guide and manager of the store".

As mentioned above, Alex manages and is the head guide at "The Fly Stop". This fly shop is a brick and mortar and online full service fly shop that specializes in wholesale fly prices. 




Pre-Trip for the Brookie Bash is Wednesday, June 19th at 7:00 РМ.

Update on California DFW Regs Simplification

For those of you wondering about where the California DFW Inland Trout Angling Regulation Simplification proposals are heading, I have an update as of the beginning of June. On the morning of June 6, I received a text message from Mammoth fly fishing

guide Harry Blackburn informing me that he had a chat with CDFW Environmental Program Manager Roger Bloom. Harry informed me that DFW is listening to the numerous voices of concern that they received regarding the proposal changes.

They received over 5,000 solicited comments during the open period of online submission. Roger also received a lot of phone calls during March and April from concerned sportsmen and sportswomen. Harry informed me that Roger believes changewhatever form that may be, unbeknownst to anyone yet-would happen at 2021 at the earliest. I called Roger Bloom myself to clarify. I had a lengthy, good

of comments, then grouped those sources together. It was obvious to DFW which comments came from outfitters, guides, spin anglers, fly anglers, etc. "We had a special folder for inflammatory remarks," Roger jokingly told me. No doubt DFW stuck their neck out when they rolled out the possibility of revolutionary changes to trout fisheries across the State of California. I joked with Roger that it was like he put on a deer costume, and ran around the woods during deer season opener. He replied that the vast majority of submitted concerns were rationale and

on target.

Roger informed me that DFW is analyzing the grouped data to find consistency across all groups. That will likely drive any change to inland trout fisheries that occurs. They will not collect any fish census data until they have an idea of what changes may take place. He told me, "There is no purpose in spending the resources taking a fish count of Hot Creek, for example, if we keep Hot Creek fly only." Valid point. As a guide myself, I asked what becomes of the data collected from guides on the Guide License Daily Trip Logs. He would like to see those logs become computer driven so they can at least look at that data across the

conversation with him. He told me that they are compartmentalizing the various 5,000 submitted comments into identifiable groups of representation. They sorted through the data, and identified sources state—but this is beyond his decision making. It comes more from enforcement.

Fly Tying Tip: Don't Crowd the Head!

When tying, how many times have you 'crowded' the eye, thinking at the beginning 'I shall not crowd the head', but do it anyway? Don't lie...we have all done it!! This tip is from Kelly Gallup on one of his videos. It especially works well if you are trying to be consistent with your tying and want all your flies, dries, streamers or whatever to look consistent.


Start your thread in the same location every time on the hook, then never take any of your material in front of the tie-in location or behind the thread at the rear of the hook. In this case I have started the thread about ½ eye length behind the eye and stopped at the rear, halfway between the barb and hook point as the thread hangs down (Photo 1).



As you place your tail, do not take your thread past that point toward the back. **(Photo 2)**.



If you find your tails are drooping, you have probably gone past the barb as the threads hang down onto the curve of the hook **(Photo 3)**.



At the front of the fly, keep the material no farther forward than the tie-in point and you will not crowd the eye.

In the final photo (Photo 4) I stopped everything before the short blank section on the shank I reserved. I could have gone forward a few more hackle or thread wraps, but if you tend to crowd the eye, stopping everything at the beginning of the thread wraps will help.



As you do a dozen or more flies at a time and you start/stop the thread in the same location, the fly length, tail and front will all be consistent, creating better looking flies.

Fly of the Month: Grey Heron

Tere is your chance to try something you may not have tried before—an Atlantic salmon fly, or more precisely, a Spey fly. This is not one of the colorful flies that takes three days just to do the tail and body and another three for the wing, but one that is much easier to tie and renowned for its fish-taking abilities for both salmon and steelhead.


Originally the Grey Heron and other similar patterns were developed in the mid-1800s on the river Spey in Scotland. They were then known as "guide" patterns by the fishermen, since they were tied by the guides (more often poachers and guides than "just" guides) and were made with what simple and basic materials they could obtain. These were common people who could not afford the fancy materials that made up the flies used by the well-heeled gentry. In most cases these materials came from farm and domestic animals, or pets, or animals that were hunted for food. Tinsels and silk came from old clothing that could not be re-used in any other way.

Remember, great blue herons are a protected species and obtaining, possessing and using any of their feathers is a quick way to a healthy fine. I mean like \$6 figures before the decimal point healthy, so use substitutes like blue-earred pheasant and Whiting Spey hackle (chicken...).

I hope that you give the Grey Heron a try. It's a truly a great fishing fly. When tied properly, it has a slim and understated, yet elegant look about it that makes you proud of the job you did.

MATERIALS FOR TYING THE GREY HERON:

- Hook: Daiichi Alec Jackson, Partridge Bartleet or other low water salmon hook (low water hooks use a lighter wire and have a 1x to 3x (or longer) shank).
- Thread: Veevus 12/0 in primrose (a pale yellow often labeled "Lt. Cahill") and black.
- Tag: Extra fine silver oval tinsel.
- Body: REAR 1/4: yellow floss; REMAINDER: black wool crewel yarn, dressed thinly.
- Ribbing: Small flat silver tinsel with fine oval silver tinsel.
- Hackle: Gray heron substitute such as blue-eared pheasant rump from the black wool, with Guinea fowl at the throat.
- Bronze mallard tied flat in typical Spey fly Wing: fashion.
- Head: Black.


INSTRUCTIONS FOR TYING THE GREY HERON:

- Place your hook in your vise and attach your primrose thread to the hook over the looped eye. Wind down the shank, closing off the looped eye and continuing down, stopping directly over the point of the hook. Tie in the extra fine silver oval tinsel at the underside of the hook, wind forward three turns and tie it off at the underside of the hook. This creates the tag, which protects the floss body and hackle.
- Tie in the fine silver oval tinsel and the flat silver tinsel. Now, wind your thread smoothly forward ¼ of the shank and tie in the yellow floss at the underside of the hook, then wind backward to the tag and then forward to where you started. A slight overlap helps keep the floss smooth.
- 3. Hold your heron hackle substitute with the shiny side up and strip off the left side fibers from the base to not quite the tip of the stem. Preparing the feather like this keeps the hackle sleek, and without stray fibers sticking out that would occur with both sides of feather. Tie it in at the underside of the hook and tie in the black yarn. If the yarn has more than two strands, remove any extra to help keep the body thin. Change out the primrose thread for the black and advance it forward to the headspace. Wind the black yarn edge-to-edge up to the headspace and tie it in at the underside of the hook. You may have to untwist the yarn a little with each turn, to keep it flat and smooth.
- 4. Grab the flat silver tinsel and wind it forward five turns to the headspace, and tie it off at the underside of the hook. Why five turns? Because it is traditional and it looks proportionally correct. That and people who know the correct way will look at your four-turn fly and laugh! Before you cut off any excess, check your wraps. The second turn of tinsel should be where the floss and yarn meet. The third turn should land right in the middle of the body. Wind the silver oval tinsel so that it is behind, and butted up against, the

flat silver tinsel. Now wind the heron substitute hackle forward so that it is behind, yet butted up against, the silver oval tinsel, which will help protect it from a fish's teeth. Preen the hackle by gently pulling it down and back, to flow under and beyond the bend of the hook.

- 5. Prepare the Guinea feather by stroking the fibers out perpendicular to the stem, leaving a few untouched at the tip. Tie the feather in by the tip and wind three or four turns, making sure to stroke the fibers back toward the bend after each turn.
- 6. Almost done. Prepare the bronze mallard wings by first steaming them so that their natural curvature returns. Next, separate about a ¼ inch width of fibers from both a left and right side feather, near the base of the feathers. The sections you select should have dark brown tips and a grayish brown base. Stroke these fibers so they are perpendicular to the stem of the feather and cut the stem away from the rest. To tell the difference between the left and right side feathers hold each feather with the good side up. The left side will have the bronze fibers going to the left. Place both feathers side by side and stroke both left and right sides to help set them into one another, creating a single wing.

Lay the wing flat on the top of the hook and tie it down using the loose loop technique. Make the first two loops soft and adjust the wing so that it is a tent over the body before your tighten the thread wraps. Keep the wing as flat as possible. Having a smooth thread base in this area will help keep the wing dead flat. Once the wing is secured form a smooth slightly rounded head and whip finish. Add several coats of head cement, Sally Hanson's Hard as Nails or Solareze Bone Dry (my preference these days).





Notes and answers to some questions you may have...

- Using primrose (pale yellow) thread keeps the black of the hook (or thread if you were using black) from discoloring the yellow floss when it gets wet. If I really want floss to retain color when wet I will wrap a layer of flat silver mylar tinsel down beneath the floss.
- As you wind thread, every turn you make with the bobbin puts twist in the thread. Twist is bad! There is no other way to say it. You lose thread control, it creates weaker, fatter bodies flattened thread holds stronger with less bulk than twisted, round thread. To remove twist, stop and gently spin your bobbin counterclockwise (southpaws spin clockwise) every so often to take out the twist. Then, smooth the thread between your thumbnail and the ball of your index finger. A smooth skin and/or 150 grit sandpaper helps!
- As mentioned, herons are protected by law and cannot be used in tying these flies. It is a nearly unique fiber: long, thin and durable and retains its shape well when fished. It is not soft like marabou. The substitutes listed are about as good as they get without trying some really exotic materials or techniques—don't ask. Whiting also sells feathers and capes that will work for smaller flies. Spey hackle fibers should be 1½ to 2 times the length of the shank.
- This fly wants to be thin in profile. That means go easy on the body, the quantity of hackle. Also, the wing is flat with a very low profile and not on edge, so be sure to look at the image provided to use as a guideline. Think slinky and sleek!

As they sift through all the data, Roger believes change won't come down the pipeline until March 2021. What I gathered from conversation with Roger is that DFW is listening to the thousands of concerns, and has decided to take a breather before continuing further. I'd expect some change. No one knows what that will look like yet though.

At the time of my conversation with Roger, he informed me that Mono County District Supervisor John Peters is hosting a Town Hall Meeting at the Bridgeport Memorial Hall in Bridgeport on Wednesday, June 19 at 6:00 pm. Roger will be there with DFW staff to field questions per the direction reg changes are going. DFW is sending a new fisheries biologist to the Eastern Sierra - Russell Black, Mr. Black will work with current DFW Field Biologist Jim Erdman. DFW feels that they need a bigger presence of representation in the Eastern Sierra. I agree. Former City of Bishop Councilmember Joe Pesci informed me that three California State Assembly members sent a letter to DFW expressing strong opposition to the proposed changes. The City of Bishop and Inyo County Board of Supervisors also expressed opposition. Groups from outside the Eastern Sierra region, such as the Pasadena Casting Club, also took an official stance against the proposed changes. DFW is all ears open.

This is great news.

I will keep you abreast of new information when I learn of it. No decisions have been made yet. Keep voicing your concerns if you have them.








