your next fishing trip that practice will really help to position your fly to provide the best opportunities for


catching fish.

Conway Bowman "Carps" About Local Fishing Opportunities

STEVE JONES, 1ST VICE PRESIDENT

We are in for a treat at our monthly meeting in September! As I did my research about Conway Bowman, all I could say was: "WOW". He's made a name for himself in the flyfishing industry, and we're lucky to have him as a speaker at our club. Conway is a local expert whom we've asked to teach us about fishing for carp on the fly.

One of the goals for our club is to teach about "all things flyfishing". Carp on the fly has recently become popular here due to the fish's size, fighting capabilities and close proximity. Because of this, we thought we should introduce it to the club.

Carp is just one of the many species of fish for which Conway is well known. He is an accomplished allaround adventurer, fisherman and waterman. His name is synonymous with "extreme" fly fishing.

For Conway, home base is Encinitas, where he guides for blue water species on the fly—most notably the fast and ferocious Mako shark. He's the host of three highly-rated and award-winning television series: "THE FORD OUTFITTERS" and "FLY FISHING THE WORLD" on Sportsman Channel and "FIFTY PLACES TO FLY-FISH BEFORE YOU DIE" on the World Fishing Network.

Conway has traveled from the remote beaches of Baja California to the humid jungles of Thailand in search of all kinds of wild fishing adventures. His escapades have led him to hook a wide variety of fish species including Atlantic salmon, Steelhead, wild trout, redfish, bonefish, tarpon and the elusive carp! He currently holds the IGFA World Record for redfish caught on the fly: 41.65 lbs. Conway is also the author of The Orvis Guide to Beginning Saltwater Fly Fishing.



When not searching for his next adventure, Conway can be found taking his wife Michelle and boys Max (9) and Jackson (4) surfing, skin diving or fishing in and around their home waters of Encinitas, California. His time on shore is now occupied by managing the City of San Diego's largest natural resource, the San Pasqual wetlands.

The 2019 Y&I has come and gone, leaving behind a clear contradiction of the popular maxim that luck is better than skill. The top three finishers are all highly skilled and all had won or placed high in previous contests.

Top rod honors went to Steve Timm who had an impressive 299 inches (more than 24 feet). Second place went to multiple-time winner Kevin Green with 168 inches. Third went to Rix Gano, who also has taken past top rod honors. Rix scored 118 inches. The top three all scored triple digits.

The weather was SoCal perfect, the incoming tide was exactly as predicted, and August weekend boat traffic was much lighter than normal which probably helped in the grand total of 863 inches (71+ feet) of fish caught and released.



The remaining fishermen averaged double digit catches of some 30 inches each. There were 10.5 fishermen (one devoted grandpa joined us for a while, then left for granddaughter's birthday party-fish count not known.)

Other numbers: \$45 donated to the endowment fund, 20 pounds of posole, 16 PBRs, 11 posole eaters, five species -- sand bass, spotted bay bass, calico bass, halibut and croaker. Three rays hooked and subsequently lost. A numberful time was had by all.

So what is the next step?



Like to explore new waters? Ever think about the wonders that Lewis and Clark encountered? Do the rivers Bitterroot, Big Hole, Blackfoot and Clark Fork pique your curiosity? This September you can scratch your itch for new waters by joining a small group of explorers to investigate these famous streams.

Gary Kosaka, former LBCC board member, very capable fisherman and all-around good guy, moved to SW Montana and quickly found himself on the board of the Fly Fishers of the Bitterroot.

At our Green River #2 in May he mentioned a desire for an LBCC club trip to explore the blue-ribbon opportunities in his neighborhood. I quickly signed on and said I would be the local contact for anyone who is interested. Since the dates interfered with already scheduled events and we didn't want to step on any existing plans, we've waited until those trips filled. This isn't a typical Club "been-goingthere-for-years-and-know-every-guide's children by first name" kind of trip. We're trailblazing. Still interested? Then here's the scoop:

SEPTEMBER 17 — Fly (drive if you want to, it takes about 2 days with stops on the Beaverhead or Big Hole) to Missoula, Montana. Rent a car and together, drive south for about 45 minutes to Hamilton. 



Intermediate Fly Casting Clinic Starts on Tuesday, October 1, 2019


JOHN VAN DERHOOF, CASTING CO-CHAIR



Fly of the Month: John's Western Coachman

I thought it would be nice to introduce all of you to a Western classic wet fly with a twist: a version of the Western Coachman that I have been using for years. Living in California, we are blessed with a truly remarkable tradition of fly tying. As an example, of the fifty recipients of the FFI's Buszek Fly Tying Award, ten (yup, twenty percent...) are from California, more than any other state. Any winner of the Buszek Award (I was honored in 2007) has an appreciation of the Western Coachman, because not only is it a great fly to fish but also its originator is the namesake of the award: Buz Buszek of Visalia California. I believe it was Buz and his Buz's Fly Shop's legacy that set the stage for a lot of the outstanding tiers we have here.

The Coachman series of flies has been around for a long, long time. In fact the original Coachman dates back to the 1820s and was originated by Tom Bosworth, who just happened to be the coachman for the British Royal Family of the time. Other versions such as the Leadwing Coachman (changing out the white duck quill wing for, you guessed it, gray) came later. Longtime favorite the Royal Coachman was developed in 1878 by John Haily who was a tier for Charles F. Orvis, though *he* got the pattern from another unnamed commercial tier. Buz started tying his Western version in the 1940s specifically for rainbow and brown trout in the Kings River and after trying several materials for the winging, settled on white Mule deer.

Buz's original pattern is an outstanding and effective one as it perfectly imitates emerging mayflies and caddis, with the white wing simulating the expanding thorax of the new insect. Since I am never content to leave things alone, I started modifying the pattern for fishing freestone rivers like the Kings, the Madison, the Owens and the Green. In updating the pattern I have slimmed down the body and am using a mix of dubbings, kept the tippet tail, albeit a lot thinner, and sometimes add a few strands of Zelon to it like a shuck. I also kept the white Deer Hair wing.

I fish the fly as a wet fly/soft hackle swinging across and downstream (sometimes with a bit of weight) and also as a nymph dead drifting as the upper fly in a two fly rig. Remember, by saying upper fly, that means that it's the one that will be the

highest in the water column and the fly farthest from the weight. So give this old-timer a try and catch some fish!

Materials for tying John's Western Coachman:

- Hook: Mustad 3906B or similar.
- Thread: Veevus black ¹²/o or Griffith's black ¹⁴/o.
 Tails: Golden Pheasant tippet, four or five strands (mixed with a half dozen strands of olive Zelon or Antron—optional).
- Ribbing: Gold wire or fine oval tinsel on larger sizes.
- Body: Thinly dubbed Dark Olive Hare's Ear Plus and Peacock Ice Dubbing, mixed.
- Thorax: Peacock herl .
- Wing: Natural white hair Mule or Whitetail Deer.
- Hackle: Dark brown partridge rump.



Instructions for tying John's Western Coachman:

- Place the hook in the vise and attach the thread to the hook at the headspace. Wind evenly down to the bend of the hook. Tie in the gold wire ribbing. Select 4 or 5 strands of golden pheasant tippet and tie them in. Frankly, I left the tippet in to help keep with tradition but danged if didn't seem to work better with them in there as well! Now select 6 to 8 strands of Olive Zelon or Antron and tie them in on top of the tippet. The Zelon/Antron acts like a trailing shuck which adds to the "emerger" look.
- 2 Mix equal parts of the two body materials together and dub them very thinly onto your thread. The Hare's Ear Plus dubbing is, as you would expect, hare's ear but with Antron added. Wind the dubbing forward about one half the way up the hook shank. Now tie in the peacock herl with the dull side facing forward and wind it forward the rest of the way to the headspace and tie it off.
- With the gold wire in hand, reverse wind (you will be winding towards yourself and not away) two or three close turns around the hook shank immediately behind the tail material. Be sure not to tie it so close that the tail material sticks up at an odd angle. Continue winding the ribbing up the hook shank using five evenly spaced turns; not four, not six, but five turns. Five turns will provide the correct look while others will look sparse or overdone! The third turn should land where the dubbing ends and the herl begins.
- 4 Select a small clump of white deer hair and knock out or even comb out all of the basal fur. Place the hair in a hair stacker and lightly tap, aligning the tips. If you stand the hair out perpendicular to the skin before cutting it you may actually avoid having to stack it. Tie in the deer hair using the loose loop technique and with the tips reaching the end of the body or ever so slightly beyond. This is an emerger, not a streamer, so keep the wing short. Most people will tie this in leaving the butts long and then trimming them close to the



thread wraps. Wrong, wrong, wrong!

Once the length is determined hold firmly and cut the butts leaving 1/16" or a bit less remaining. With your thread untwisted (it won't work if you don't) and you controlling the loop (not the twisty thread), lightly place the thread on top of the remaining butt ends and around the hook only applying evenly increasing tension as you pull the thread up. Keep the tension on and add additional turns covering the all of the butt ends. If you do it properly you will be amazed at what a small "bump" the butt ends create. This is the best way to tie in just about any hair wing from a wet fly to a streamer to an Atlantic salmon/steelhead fly.

Select a partridge rump feather for your hackle. 5 The traditional hackle is "Coachman" brown hen or rooster, but I much prefer the mottled tones of brown rump feather of a partridge. If you want the hackle to flow back over the body, stroke the feather so that all of the hackle fibers are perpendicular to the stem and tie in the feather by the tip. If you want the hackle to stand up "spider" style (my preference because it moves in the current more) remove the basal fluff and tie the hackle in by the butt end of the rachis. Wind the hackle forward using two to five turns, depending on the size of the fly, and tie it off at the headspace. Form a small, neat head, whip finish and add a drop of head cement, insuring that the eye of the hook is not clogged, and you're ready to swing your way towards more trout!
