Welcome Back, Sockeye Salmon! 100 Years is Far Too Long

I'm involved with a couple of non-profits in Oregon. One is called "Eastern Oregon Legacy Lands". This organization is working with the Nez Perce Tribe to bring sockeye salmon back to Wallowa Lake in northeastern Oregon, after an absence of 100 years. I cannot think of a more worthwhile conservation project.

At the time of Lewis and Clark, there were two major runs of sockeye salmon in Oregon: one on the Deschutes River in the central part of the state, and one on the Wallowa River in the northeast corner. Sockeye salmon normally spend their formative years in a "nursery lake". On the Deschutes River, the nursery lake was Suttle Lake; on the Wallowa River, it was Wallowa Lake.

THESE KOKANEE SALMON IN THE UPPER WALLOWA RIVER ARE LANDLOCKED DESCENDANTS OF THE ORIGINAL SOCKEYE SALMON RUN.

These runs formed the southern border of the sockeye's range. The Wallowa River run was also the main source of food for the legendary Chief Joseph and the Nez Perce tribe.

Before Joseph and the Tribe were unjustly forced from their home in the Wallowa "Valley of the Winding Waters", the Tribe had lived there for hundreds, maybe thousands, of years. Each spring, they would move from their winter camps in the sheltered river mouths to the southern slopes of the hills. There they collected kouse roots for the "Time of First Eating". In August and September, they would camp at the south end of Wallowa Lake and wait for the sockeye salmon run.

The run was magnificent, awe-inspiring. Thousands of brilliant red sockeyes jostled and pushed each other on their way up the Wallowa River. According to one source: "These fish were so numerous that the various channels [of the river] appeared as a solid red band. In fact, as the Nez Perce crossed these streams, their horses were sometimes seen to actually kick these fish out on the bank."

The Nez Perce say that families often caught a year's

supply of salmon in one net. The sockeye run was the Tribe's main food source and a keystone of its culture. Of every ten meals for a Nez Perce family, nine were salmon.

After refusing to sign the "Thief Treaty" of 1863, the Tribe's relations with its white neighbors worsened. In 1877, Joseph and the Nez Perce began their famous 1,170mile flight, pursued by the U.S. Army. They were captured

40 miles from the Canadian border, and were never allowed to return to their beloved Valley of the Winding Waters. A dam was built on Wallowa Lake in 1919; soon afterward the sockeye salmon disappeared.

But in 1996, the Wallowa Lake Dam was listed as a "High Hazard Structure". Since then, the Nez Perce Tribe has worked with local conservation groups and irrigators to get it refurbished. And now, a hundred years after the dam was completed, the State of Oregon has funded the "reconstruction" of the Wallowa Lake Dam.

This reconstruction effort includes fish passage, which is needed to make sockeye salmon reintroduction feasible. The appropriation is \$14 million, to be supplemented by grants which will raise the total budget to \$16 million. The reconstruction is currently scheduled to be completed "sometime in 2022". The Tribe is working to realize a 100-year old dream: to re-introduce sockeyes to the Wallowa River.

Reintroduction of sockeye salmon has always been a major goal of the Nez Perce Tribe; they've been planning for it for many years. The Nez Perce Tribal Fisheries Department is currently doing limnological and prey base studies in Wallowa Lake. The department is well respected and has done some very good work re-establishing Coho salmon in the Wallowa and Clearwater River systems.

The historic prime spawning area for sockeye is the inlet of the Wallowa River at the south (upper) end of the lake. This area is in a nearly pristine state now. It is adjacent to the Wallowa Lake Lodge, a beautiful old resort hotel with a long history (I've stayed there). The owners had planned to put it up for auction, but a group of investors led by Eastern Oregon Legacy Lands, with help from the Nez Perce Tribe, purchased it instead.

This quote from the previous owner should shed some light on the reasons for the purchase: "For many years we have striven to assure the lodge property and the whole south end of the lake would be preserved in its natural state for the use and enjoyment of future generations. The new community-based ownership shares our hopes and dreams, and is uniquely positioned to achieve that goal. Their efforts have earned our strong support."

The adjacent spawning area would be covered by a permanent conservation easement. The agreement between the lodge owners and the Tribe calls "for the Nez Perce Tribe to hold a conservation easement, which the tribe will purchase. The easement will prohibit development on most of the open ground of the lodge area, including the Wallowa River wetlands and adjacent uplands."

This easement would be in place, in perpetuity, to protect spawning habitat for the anticipated sockeye salmon run, which is central to the cultural values of the Tribe. It would also protect habitat for kokanee salmon and bull trout, as well as nesting bald and golden eagles.

The map on the following page (pg. 12), "Wallowa Lake Basin Land Conservation Projects", shows Wallowa Lake. At the very southern (bottom) tip of the lake, "Wallowa Lake Lodge" is shown in black lettering. The area in yellow around the lodge is the conservation easement.

The map on the next page (pg. 13), "Wallowa Lake Lodge", shows the area of the conservation easement in detail. Zone A, which includes the upper Wallowa River, is the protected area where the salmon will come to spawn. Zone B will provide wildlife habitat, especially for nesting bald and golden eagles.

The Tribe is raising the money for the conservation easement. It has so far raised \$700,000, but still needs an additional \$325,000.

Anyone who has seen the inspiring beauty of a sockeye salmon run knows that it is a miracle of nature. Please consider making a contribution, and helping the Nez Perce Tribe to bring this miracle back to the "Valley of the Winding Waters".



Fly Tying Tip: Alternate Tools




1 Then you create a dubbing loop and use a spinner

have you then tried to wrap/palmer the dubbing noodle with the spinner still attached? Awkward!

Instead use an electrical clip (aka electrical lead clip or test clip), wrap the thread a couple of times around the clip, then you can cut the thread and have a less bulky holder to wrap your dubbing in place (рното #2 and PHOTO #3). Just be careful not to release the clip before you palmer and tie off your dubbing, as it will unwind!

They also make a great third hand to hold small materials so you do not lose them on your tying desk. When I have a length of trigger point fibers, a single strand of flash, or a single CDL (Coq de Leon) feather I use for tails, I hold the excess with the








clip. The material is easily held and much easier to find orkeep from blowing off your desk as you tie multiple flies (PHOTO #4).

Some tiers will use these clips as hackle pliers but beware: the curved copper hook that holds your material(s) can be sharp and you will end up cutting more hackles than you wind!

Items can be found at electrical supply stores such as Orvac (California) or Altex (Texas) or through the internet. Search for Multimeter Part Colorful Electrical Testing Hook Clip Grabber, or similar.



Fly of the Month: Madison River Improved Zelon Midge

In case you haven't figured this out yet (after all these years), I am obsessed with midges. I am also obsessed with fishing midges dry and while, ironically, I am known for tying complex, mind bending Atlantic Salmon Fly patterns (at least back when I was young and had eyes...), my personal choice is an obsession with simplicity—yes, I can be quite lazy given a choice. Well the Madison River Improved Zelon Midge fits perfectly with all three of these foibles of mine, to a tee.

I have been using a similar pattern to this for years and my weekly edition of the Blue Ribbon Flies News showed me a simpler and cleaner way of tying a great fly that is incredibly effective. Now, I offer it to you!

Using dry fly midge imitations to free-rising trout can be a painfully non-productive process. The fly needs to be low in profile but not sink like a rock as soon as it hits a bit of turbulence. The fly also needs to mimic the appearance of the natural in some representative fashion or the trout will reject it outright. The Madison River Improved Zelon Midge seems to be able to manage that all of that with aplomb.

Here is one last reason to give this pattern a try...what is the one mayfly here in California in general and the Sierras specifically that always seems to hatch at about the same time as or in the same water-type that midges do? What mayfly seems to be pervasive in the areas where this club and its members seem to fish the most? If your answer is the Blue-Winged Olive then you are correct and this fly will pretty much match it perfectly.

I tie this in only a couple of sizes: 20, 22 and 24 **AND** I prefer using standard dry fly hooks for this instead of a midge/emerger style hook. Tie this fly in two colors: light dun Zelon shuck and wings with an olive thorax and olive shuck with light dun wings with a very dark olive thorax. The first combo is more indicative of a midge and the second matches Blue-Winged Olives as well. Use olive thread in both cases and, of course, if you find another combination let all of us know about it. One final note to consider: if the guys from Blue Ribbon recommend this fly, it works!

MATERIALS FOR TYING THE MADISON RIVER IMPROVED ZELON MIDGE:

Hook: Tiemco 101 Ring-eye #20-24 or

similar

Thread: Size 6/o or 8/o Olive (personally,

I like using Veevus 12/0)

Shuck/Tail: Light dun Zelon

Body: Olive Zelon tail/Shuck with


wide spaced olive thread over

it

Wing: Light dun Zelon tied spent wing

spinner style

Thorax: Olive Ice dubbing Head: Olive thread



INSTRUCTIONS ON TYING THE MADISON RIVER IMPROVED ZELON MIDGE:

- Attach your thread to the hook at the headspace. Wind down to the bend of the hook and select about 12 to 24 strands (depending on the hook size) of the Zelon shuck. Tie these strands in so that they are the length of the hook shank or a bit less.
- Advance the thread forward to the thorax using wider than normal spacing, allowing the Zelon shuck to just peek through underneath. If you want to make the fly a bit more durable then, when you are done, put a drop of head cement on the body.
- Again, select another bunch of Zelon for the wing, comprised this time of about 20 to 30 strands depending on the hook size. Attach these strands, laid out flat, on either side of the hook in the same manner as you would tie in a mayfly spinner wing using X-wraps. Once secured, trim the wings so they are about 3/4 the length of the shank. I do this by grabbing and pinching both wings together, pulling them back to the tail and then trimming them simultaneously to the desired length.
- 4 Finally, apply dubbing thinly to your tying thread and make one or two complete turns behind the wing, using these turns to slightly push the wing forward as shown in the drawing. Then continue with one complete diagonal (front to back) X-wrap before finishing with another complete wrap or two in front of the wing. If you do not make the complete diagonal X-wrap you will leave a "hole" in the bottom of your thorax exposing the hook and the tie down point of the wing underneath. Also, when you wrap in front of the wing, try not to push the wings back—keep them pointing forward.
- Form a small head, whip finish, apply head cement and you're done. One last thing that helps in finishing off these tiny flies... I like to keep a couple of leftover hackles lying around my tying desk. What I am referring to are the tips of a hackle that are left when you are done wrapping it. Use these

to run through the hook eye of even the tiniest size to clear it of wet head cement. You will thank me the next time you easily slide your fly onto your tippet!
