James Monteith & Wallowa Lake, Oregon

BOB MAYFIELD, 1ST VICE PRESIDENT

Tames Monteith is Chairman of Eastern Oregon Legacy Lands, a regional, science-based conservation non-profit combining education and policy work. In his 47th year as a professional conservationist, he served as Executive Director of Oregon Wild for 17 years, and co-founded Wallowa Land Trust (2004), Backcountry Hunters & Anglers (2004) and the Coalition of Oregon Land Trusts (2010).

He also serves as Managing Partner for <u>Wallowa</u> <u>Lake Lodge</u>, a 98-year-old former fishing and hunting lodge at the head of Wallowa Lake in Northeastern Oregon. It was purchased by more than 100 families in 2016 as a community project when Hilton and Hyatt corporations were competing to buy it and develop the property.

WALLOWA LAKE SOCKEYE BACKGROUND

Wallowa Lake is one of only <u>two Oregon lakes</u> originally inhabited by native sockeye salmon. Restoration of sockeye to Wallowa Lake has been a dream of the <u>Nez</u> <u>Perce Tribe</u> since extirpation in the early 1900's. The upper Columbia-Snake-Wallowa River systems comprise one of the last cold water refugia in the West.

Wallowa Lake Lodge, Eastern Oregon Legacy Lands and the Nez Perce Tribe have <u>partnered to help</u> <u>expedite the return of sockeye salmon</u>, partly through establishment of a permanent conservation easement on Lodge grounds at the head of Wallowa





Lake (Wallowa Lake also contain Kokanee, including record-sized fish.) This model, including a forprofit business, a non-profit conservation organization and a sovereign nation working together, has attracted significant interest. Oregon Department of Fish & Wildlife and Oregon Department of Parks & Recreation are cooperating partners in this endeavor.

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



Fly Tying Tip: Jeweler's Rouge

When we all started our fly tying, the standard bobbin holder was a stainless-steel barreled type. Then you were probably told to discard them as they will fray your thread. Get ceramic instead. Interesting in that some of the best tiers in the country ONLY use stainless tube bobbin holders. So how in the heck do they keep them from fraying and breaking thread? Simple, jeweler's rouge and a toothpick.



If you find that your thread is fraying or breaking from a burr in the barrel, take a toothpick, coat the end with some jeweler's rouge, then twist around in the top of the barrel until it is smooth. That's it. This was a tip from Frank Matarelli (the whip finish tool guy and designer of the "standard" bobbin holder) to Wayne Luallen years ago. Wayne has never had to buy a new holder and has used his holder, received from Frank, for decades. The cheap bobbin holders are all you need; no use in spending more than you have to.

If you check with a local jeweler, he may give you a small piece of rouge, or if you want to splurge, you can buy about a thousand years worth with a \$5.00 kit from Harbor Freight.

(Please note: I still have the very first bobbin holder I purchased in 1963—a Matarelli. I have kept mine smooth free of burrs using this technique all of these years. John V; junior TT editor)

Please note that "barbless" is referenced to emphasize. Also, please note that "only artificial lures with barbless hooks" are allowed. This includes the use of barbless treble hooks. Also, Hot Creek is the only waterway listed above that specifies the use of only artificial flies instead of all other kinds of artificial lures with barbless hooks.

For our club trips, **be sure to completely remove barbs** from hooks. For improved catch numbers, practice your casting at the Pond. See you at the Pond.

Fly of the Month: Stacked Adams Quill

There are dozens of iconic flies that we can all refer to as time-honored fish catchers. The Woolly Bugger, Elk Hair Caddis, Royal Wulff, Pheasant Tail, Hare's Ear and of course the Adams. I vacillate between the Adams and the Elk Hair Caddis as my favorite "searching" dry fly pattern and, though it is a tough call, the Adams is the winner about 51% of the time. So is there a need to make the Adams even better—or is that even possible? I think I may have actually found a version that might.

Been playing a lot with hackle stackers and decided to try an Adams version. Well, one thing led to another and the Stacked Adams Quill is the result. Nope, it's not iconic yet, and waits to be proven on the water. Also, it's not a fly everyone might be interested in tying—it's a tougher tie without question. What I do really like about this pattern are the endless possibilities for changing color or even materials to match a hatch or the hook size you might need. This means it is less an Adams and more an easily convertible fish catcher.

The version that I am showing here is an Adams. Tail, hackle and wing are all based upon the typical Adams which we have all learned to tie. The variation occurs with the stripped peacock eye barb body—still gray but not dubbing. Also, the idea of splitting the tail fibers is something adapted to a more specific imitation of a mayfly genus and species. An Adams is usually considered a generic mayfly imitation, and good at imitating a lot of different bugs all over the country. The original Adams was tied by Len Halladay for Charles Adams to imitate a specific mayfly on a small lake near Traverse City, Michigan. The genus and species of that fly has never been discussed in any of the information I have read but I could guess that a slow/slack water Gray Drake or a Callibaetis could certainly be one of several "usual suspects".

Regardless, it remains today one of the best all-around fly patterns ever tied. Suggestions for other mayfly species could include an olive body with a medium to dark dun hackle and wing, for a Blue-Winged Olive. How about a bleached peacock eye barb, light dun hackle and wing, for a Pale Morning Dun? The pattern listed, dressed lightly, would easily imitate emerging Callibaetis on Hebgen Lake in Montana or Sullivan Slough and

Silver Creek in Idaho. I could go on to include Green Drakes, Mahogany Duns and several other highvolume hatches we are likely to run into at various times of the year in the western United States.

Tie a few and give 'em a shot!


MATERIALS FOR TYING THE STACKED ADAMS QUILL:

Hook:Tiemco #100BL or similar; #12 to #24Thread:Veevus 12/0; dunTail:Medium Pardo barbs (or Cree hackle); splitBody:Natural colored Peacock Eye barb; strippedHackle:Stacker style Brown and Grizzly (or Cree)Wing:Grizzly hen hackle tipsThorax:"Adams" gray dubbingHead:Thread

- So let's start...attach your thread to the hook using a Jam Hitch and wind smoothly and evenly down to the end of the shank. While you're winding, stop occasionally and untwist your thread. This will help to create the smooth underbody necessary to make for a smooth overbody. Using the thread, create a small bulge at the end of the shank. Depending on the size of the fly you are tying, select from one to four hackle barbs (per side of the tail). Tie in the barbs for the far side on the back side of the hook and then the near side barbs along the front of the hook.
- 2. Get the body material ready. I have recently gone to using Polish Quills. These are pre-stripped peacock eye barbs in natural and a wide variety of dyed colors. They are excellent quality and easy to use. Or, select a barb out of the eye of a peacock shaft. It **needs** to be from the eye—only the barbs from the eye area are variegated; light on one edge and dark on the other. Remove the barbules from the barb using an eraser (I like a white plastic drafting eraser). Tie in the narrow end of the now "clean" barb with the light edge towards the eye. Wind the barb forward with touching wraps one half of the way down the shank. Leading with the light edge forward reduces accidental covering of the dark edges. For durability, add a very thin coat of UV resin if desired.
- 3. Time to create the hackle stacker... hold the index finger of your "off" hand over the hook shank about four to six inches away. Right at the juncture between the body and thorax, wind your thread up and over the top of your finger and then one or two times around the hook shank. Now, do this one or two more times until you have two or three four to six inch loops above the shank. The turns around the shank will help keep the large loop from being pulled smaller, as you create the next large loop.
- 4. Select two nice long hackles (like a Whiting; it will make your life easier...) and the barb length should be sized for the fly or a half-size smaller. Tie in the hackles with the dull side down, leaving



about 1/16" of bare stem exposed. Holding the thread loops upright (I usually use my right index finger inside the loops of thread), wind the hackle smoothly up the thread and back down. Make sure that the amount of hackle wound on the thread core will reach, or be just barely short of, the headspace. Lay the remaining hackle over the front side of the shank and tie it off. Take hold of the thread loops of your hackle, pulling it upright firmly, and with your other hand stroke the hackle barbs back towards the tail. Don't be too gentle you want as many of the barbs as possible pulled back and out of the way so they don't get trapped underneath, which will give the fly a messy look.

- 5. Now you can tie in the hackle tip wings in the normal way. If you had tied them in earlier, they would have gotten in the way while winding the hackle. The wings want to be just longer than the hackle. They should also splay out a bit to either side—more when the hackle is pulled forward.
- 6. Apply dubbing to your thread and wind a dubbing thorax. I prefer to keep the dubbing rather loose and spiky. This will allow the hackle to settle into the thorax rather than sit on top.
- 7. Take hold of the thread loops of your hackle and pull the hackle forward, between the wings and over the eye of the hook. Without pulling too tight on the thread loops, tie them off. Form a small, neat head and whip finish. Trim away the thread loops and add some cement or UV finish. Now, go fish it!
