Yasushi "Yash" Iseda, long time member of the Long Beach Casting Club, passed away suddenly on February 8, 2021. He had been an active member for 20 years and president from 2015-2018.

Yash was born and raised in Riverside, California, the youngest in a family of eight children. At the age of two, his family was sent to an internment camp in Poston, Arizona. The family returned to Riverside where he attended school through junior college.

In high school he started playing football, continued to play in junior college and received a football scholarship to Long Beach State. It was then that he realized how much he loved living near the beach.

After graduating, he began his teaching career. He taught Physical Education and Industrial Arts for the Garden Grove School District, retiring after 34 years. His love for the beach took him to Seal Beach, where he lived for over 40 years.

Yash always loved fishing and wanted to learn more about fly fishing, so he joined the Long Beach Casting Club in 2001.

Excerpts from the <u>September 2015 Target Talk</u>:

### Leader's Line article "What is a Mentor":

"After crewing on big sailboats for 15 years, the rigors of sailing were taking a toll on me physically. I decided that it was time to find a new activity to keep me busy. I had always been a bait fisherman, but fly fishing fascinated me. I decided that it was time to take the Long Beach Casting Club Beginning Casting Class. That was in the late 1990s. It was obvious that one night a week was not going to be enough to make me a proficient caster, so I decided to come to the club and practice my casting during the day. That decision opened the world of fly fishing for me. That was the beginning of long friendships with those I consider my mentors."

Yash had many different interests throughout his lifetime. To name a few: sailing, creating beautiful stained glass windows, wood carving and painting, swimming daily at the community pool, fly fishing, fly tying (Double Midge), and gardening (raising orchids, fuchsias, succulents, and plumerias). Some of you probably have some of his double midges or a cutting from his plumerias.

Many days you could find him either sitting on the bench in front of the clubhouse or helping people on the pond, working as a handyman fixing what needed to be mended or installed, maintaining the flower beds in front which contained green and white calla lilies from his mother or in the kitchen with John Lincoln preparing Nooner Lunches and group event meals. He was always willing to help out, wherever he was needed. You name it, he did it or found someone who could.

There are countless members who were mentored by him during these many years, through the Lower Owens Pre-Trip meetings, January-March Lower Owens trips, Green River trips, and discussions while visiting the clubhouse. He would even help strangers whom he met on the river and give them flies or nymph rigs.

Many of you probably caught your first fish on a fly rod with Yash on a Lower Owens trip at one of his "secret" spots...not secret for long. He always mentioned



that he was willing to share his "secret" spots since it challenged him to find new ones.

Casting can be safely done through the normal routine taught in the club's Beginning Casting Classes. Being safe while practicing casting at the pond is easy:


- Wear your face covering. Wearing masks reminds us not to put our fingers in our mouth and nose.

## "Torpedo the Dams, *Full Speed Ahead!*"

Those of you who are following the saga of the Klamath River dam removals have probably heard the optimistic reports. Here's the latest (unless I've fallen behind) from Cal Trout, in an article entitled: "Restoration Contract Signed":

## Our Zoom Fly Tying Has Reached an End...

Our Fly Tying demo videos have come to a close. Club members who were involved with this long-distance endeavor think it's been a great success, from the comments of new and repeat tiers. This summer we drafted enthusiastic Fly Tying Club members to be part of this team. In August, we began team training and practice sessions. In October, the season started with the promise of an all-star team. If you weren't sitting in the Zoom stands watching their performance, you truly missed out.



The team wanted to mimic the tradition of our Beginning Fly Tying Class with these new online Zoom "demonstrations". So each night the meeting was opened up early, at 6:00 PM, for students to arrive and get to meet each other and the instructors, just like in our in-person classes.

The meeting opened with Cecil O'Dell welcoming the students at 7:00 PM. Dan Oliver would then play the pre-recorded video for that week's lesson. These videos were filmed in Ultra HD 4K and also made available to the students on YouTube, so they could re-watch the video as needed. The videos follow the Club's beginning fly tying manual, and take the same technique-focused approach that has made the Club's class such a success in the past. After the video, the



students were assigned to breakout rooms, for more personal interaction with a volunteer to get their questions answered. Again, this mimics the Club's in-person meetings, where volunteers would walk around the clubhouse helping students as needed.

One of the benefits of this Zoom format, not only to the new students but also to the past students now turned volunteers, was the "After-Hours" sessions with Joe Libeu and John Van Derhoof. Each week, Joe and/or John (usually both) delved into the history, variations and tactics on fishing each fly. It is difficult to summarize the vast amount of information that was shared during this part of the meeting, but even experienced fly fishers and tiers would have found value. Time after time, the students cited this afterhours discussion, and that the videos covered the "why" of the technique and not just the steps in the pattern, as the reason they returned week after week.



It was interesting to look at the submitted flies from "Week Two: the Ant" through "Week 16: the Royal Wulff". You can see how much progress they were making toward becoming accomplished tiers. It's encouraging to see them start critiquing their own flies, and also their own patterns, after seeing John's and Joe's slides.

The participants had asked the club, "what's next?",

so the volunteers decided to extend the program for two more weeks! On March 9<sup>th</sup>, we presented the Goddard Caddis, and on March 16<sup>th</sup>, Joe Libeu discussed the system box (how to arrange the flies in your fly box).

## Fly Tying Tip: Parachute Post


Have you had trouble winding a parachute post? Some materials are hard to grasp, and you probably wished you had a parachute post tool.

Instead, here is a real easy way to support the post while you wrap up and back down the post. You can also include the hackle.

Prepare your post on the hook as you would normally, getting ready to wrap up the post (**PHOTO-1**). Then use a thin pin or needle next to the post, held as you wrap (**PHOTO-2**). The pin is stiff enough to keep the tread from slipping off the post and losing your nice neat wraps. Once you have the post completed (with, or without the hackle as in the photo), just pull out the pin and you're left with the wrapped post (**PHOTO-3**).

This works great if you are using calf tail, poly or other hard/slick material. I know that some tiers use UV resin, but if you do not want that bulk, it's much easier than the traditional holding of the wing and trying to wrap up the post. Also, a little too much UV resin can and does wick up the wing, making the entire wing stiff and unrealistic to the fish, who will likely spit it out—quickly!





## Fly of the Month: Scotty's Midge

TT ey, how's doing? It is the season to keep a bunch of midge patterns in your vest! For all of you who are 📕 📕 planning on making one, two or all of the club's trips up to Bishop and the Lower "O" this year, or for those heading off to the Green River, Utah, winter and early spring is the season to present some midge patterns to those rising trout you see during midday. Scotty's midge is one more to add to your fly box, and it's an easy one to tie.


I first learned about this pattern a few years ago, talking to some friends who fish both in the Sierras and in the Rockies during the winter and early spring. I was intrigued by the look and the simplicity of the tie and was eager to give it a try on the Green the last few years as well as the Lower "O", and, oh yes boys and girls, it works!

Midges inhabit every type of water, and are available year around. However, because of the prevalence of larger or more abundant insects like mayflies, caddis and others, both aquatic and terrestrial, they don't become a prime source of food until that time of year when most self-respecting bugs are staying warm—in the Sierras and the Rockies, that's winter and springtime. They are found in a variety of colors but, primarily, they are black (think Yash's Twin/Zebra Midge), red-brown (my choice would be a \$3 Dip) and olive—Scotty's Midge. Scotty's Midge, because of the way it is tied, does a good job of skittering and nervously moving across the water's surface. If you would like some variations to this consider the following: a black thread body with a silver rib, a red/brown thread body with a silver rib, a dark olive thread body with a chartreuse rib and a pink thread body with a red rib.

Sooooo, when fish are rising and there isn't a blue-winged olive to be seen anywhere, then you'd better be considering a midge imitation. Scotty's Midge would be an excellent choice!

### MATERIALS FOR TYING SCOTTY'S MIDGE

MATERIALS	FOR TYING SCOTTY'S MIDGE
Hook:	Tiemco 2487, 2488 or equivalent in sizes #18-#22
Thread:	Veevus 12/0 Light Olive (also rusty dun)
Tail/Shuck:	Royal Wulff Red Zelon or Darlon
Body:	Light Olive (your thread)
Ribbing:	Dark Green extra small Ultra Wire (optional)
Thorax:	Black Ice Dubbing
Wing:	Sparkle Dun quality deer hair



### **INSTRUCTIONS FOR TYING SCOTTY'S MIDGE**

- Insert the hook into your vise and attach the tying thread just behind the head space. Wind smoothly down the shank about 1/3 of the way down the bend. Select a clump of red Zelon and tie it in. It shouldn't be too heavy and its length should be about 2/3 the length of the body. If you are going to add a rib, tie it in along the back side of the hook shank now.
- 2. Smoothly advance the thread forward to the thorax area—remember, the thread IS your body. Rather than fighting with your thread, take the time to occasionally counter-spin it to keep it flat, like floss. I have demonstrated this technique to club members a thousand times and yet I see very, very, very few who actually do this. It keeps your thread wraps smooth, and allows **you** to control where your thread goes when tying materials in or doing loose loops; it even makes whip finishing easier. It makes tying so much easier, so do it—right-handers spin counter-clockwise and lefties, go clockwise.
- 3. If you were tying the fly with a rib, wind it

forward now with nice even spacing. Apply the thorax dubbing to your thread, and wind on a bulbous and slightly shaggy thorax. Leave the thread in the middle of the thorax.

4. Almost home...select a clump of Comparadunquality deer hair, for the wing and stuck wing shuck. The deer hair should be fairly soft and well-flaring, with short tips. Stiff, dense hair that does not compress should not be used. Stack the hair, and tie it in with the tips forward over the eye of the hook. The tips should be the length of the hook shank. The tie-down point is the middle of the dubbed thorax. If you tie the wing in here, the dubbing will force the tips and the butts upward. However, you are not trying to stand up the wing like a Comparadun dry fly; instead, let them angle up at only about  $20^{\circ}-30^{\circ}$ . It is this low angle that helps the fly to skitter and dance a bit on the surface. Trim off the butt ends, so they extend just beyond the rear end of the thorax. Pull back the wing tips, and whip finish behind the eye of the hook. Be sure to reset the wings to that low angle. The fly is complete and all you need do is add water...the fish will take of the rest.
