A t June's meeting Dave Smith will present tips on DIY ("Do it Yourself") fly fishing on New Zealand's North Island. The North Island offers exceptional fishing, with a massive diversity of type of rivers and lakes, from the braided flood plains of <u>Hawkes Bay</u> to the world-class spring creeks of mighty <u>Waikato</u> to the lake-run rainbows of Taupo and the massive <u>Rotorua</u> brown trout. The North Island is very accessible for all levels of fly anglers, and doesn't mandate long hikes and 70-foot casts to spooky fish. With most of the fly anglers heading directly to the South Island, you'll often find yourself alone on a river.

With so many angling options, it can be mindboggling to know where to start. It's no wonder so many fly anglers turn to hosted trips to take the confusion out of where to fish, how to fish, fly patterns and gear selection. But with a few tips and tricks, a DIY New Zealand trip is as easy as booking a hosted trip, and a whole heck of a lot more fun. As an experienced world fly-fishing traveller and DIY expert, Dave will help guide you through the process of research, booking and executing the trip of a lifetime.

Dave has been a fishing fanatic his whole life, starting with bait fishing on family camping trips in the Sierras. Whenever there was a chance to fish, he took full advantage of it. After college Dave moved to New Zealand for work and found his lifelong passion for fly fishing and fly tying.

Since then, Dave chases everything from alpine trout to bonefish, carp and mako sharks. He's been a competition trout angler since 2012, with appearances at two <u>Team USA</u> National Championships, <u>America</u> <u>Cup</u> international competition and many regional

# **Fly Tying Forum: June**

Welcome to the June edition of the LBCC Fly Tying Forum; it's hard to believe summer is already upon us. Time to stock up your fly boxes for the coming season!

John Barnett starts us off this month with the venerable Lady Caroline. First tied in 1864, this traditional Spey-style pattern was named in honor of Lady Caroline Gordon Lennox. Lady Caroline was a renowned Atlantic salmon angler who, for over 50 years, routinely bested her Victorian male counterparts on her family's Gordon Castle estate on the River Spey. The Lady Caroline underwent a revival in the 1950s as a steelhead fly, and inspired a generation of tiers including Syd Glasso, Dave McNeese, Bob Veverka and John Shewey to craft their own elegant versions of classic Spey patterns.



Our remaining classes in June are aimed at the many saltwater anglers in the Club. Colin Kumabe will demonstrate the Surfin' Merkin, a Pacific sand or mole crab imitation. The Merkin is a very popular surf-fishing fly and nearly all fly fishers in Southern



California tie their own variations for local perch, corbina and croakers.

Allan Grosdidier will lead a tying session on the Ned Gray Sand Crab, an easily tied pattern using deer hair, chenille and a hackle.



Finally, Mark Flo will present a session for the Crazy Dad, a Shane Stalcup pattern that's been around for years. Originally tied as a freshwater crayfish pattern for bass and trout, it works equally well in saltwater bays and estuaries.

### **LBCC Backpack Trips!**

**TRIP #1:** <u>McGee Pass Trail</u> to <u>Big McGee Lake</u>, out and back, August 16-21. Four nights out.

Back to Big McGee Lake and beyond. Drive to McGee Pass Trailhead and car-camp on Wednesday, August 16, to acclimatize and prepare for an early start to hike in the next day. The seven-mile trail to Big McGee Lake is strenuous, with 2,500 feet of elevation gain and steep sections, but it is well worth the effort. Fishing in and around Big McGee Lake is excellent, with great views of the Sierra Crest. On this trip the lake will our basecamp.

For those who choose to participate, there is an option for a one-or-two-night 5.5-mile backpack over McGee Pass (1,450 foot elevation gain) to fish remote Tully Lake, at the headwaters of Fish Creek, and a chance to visit Tully Hole. We will hike out and be back at the cars on Monday, August 21.

### **TRIP #2:** Twenty <u>Lakes Basin Loop</u>, September 20-24. Three nights out.

This is a moderate four-day/three-night ten-mile loop through 20 Lakes Basin in the Hoover Wilderness by Saddlebag Lake, a little north of Tioga Pass. It's perfect for those new to backpacking and/or backcountry fly fishing. This scenic area at 10,000 feet is below the majestic Sierra Crest.

Topography includes lakes, meadows, interconnecting streams and interface of different geologic processes. Elevation gain and loss is relatively minimal. Participants should be prepared for quickly changing weather: sunny and warm to wind, rain and snow.

On Wednesday, Sept. 20 drive to the USFS Saddlebag Lake Campground. It's about a seven-hour drive to Saddlebag Lake, and participants are requested to arrive by 6:00 pm for the group potluck dinner and to ensure they will be somewhat acclimatized to the elevation and have their kit organized for the next day. We will hike in on Thursday, Aug.21 and hike out and drive home on Sunday, Aug.24, for three nights out.

# Save the Date! Learn the Double Haul

### July 11 & 18, 2023 from 7:00 pm-9:00 pm

### JOHN VAN DERHOOF, PAST PRESIDENT

This July the Long Beach Casting Club will be offering a class on the Double Haul. We will be doing this class over two consecutive Tuesday nights, starting on July 11 and ending on July 18, from 7:00 pm-9:00 pm. While this class is open to all members, there are things that need to be understood.

**INITIAL STUDENT CONSIDERATIONS**—here are some things you need to resolve. The first, and most important, requires an honest assessment of your casting abilities. Nope, please **do not gloss over that part.** 

- 1 We are asking that all students be able to comfortably false cast 40'-45' with accuracy and control. The painted grid in the bottom of the pond is 10' x 10' and starts at 20' (the third stripe is 40'). Or, think about how well you can cast at the five staggered targets in the casting pond (20' to 50'). If you can't false cast (no, not the Pick-Up and Lay Down; you must false cast multiple times to each target, including extending line) to at least the fourth one, then work on your casting first and take the Double Haul Class at a later date, after your casting has improved. I'm sorry, but you need to be able to cast comfortably so you can concentrate on learning something new. Besides, learning the Double Haul with that level of casting will not improve your distance at all, and more likely will decrease it.
- 2 Make sure your fly line is clean and very, very, very lightly dressed with a line dressing (wipe it on, let it sit for an hour or so and try to wipe it off!). Do not use dish detergent like Dawn as it is too harsh and could strip away some of the line's coatings. Use a terry cloth hand towel and body wash or shampoo—even unscented baby wipes work.

There are several line dressings available (SA, Glide, Loon, etc.) that can be used—even ArmorAll will work.

3 If you use a 5-weight rod and happen to have a 6- or 7-weight rod, bring the line (should be clean and dressed) for the heavier rod and install it onto your 5-weight. Believe me, it can really help.

My apologies for being blunt in this regard but the reality is that, if you cannot cast to the level requested, then you will not be able to effectively learn the Double Haul. The Double Haul is **NOT** a beginning cast; it's more likely beyond the intermediate level. Even if you manage to get the body movements correct, your casting will be insufficient to give you the benefit of any potential extra distance you could achieve. In fact, it usually gets worse!

This is why all of us are constantly encouraging each of you to come down to the Club and practice. This is particularly helpful if you do this when other better casters are around (mornings during the week as well as Saturday and Sunday mornings) who can point out problems and fixes.

# Fall River, June 2023

For the third year, LBCC will be fishing the largest spring creek west of the Rockies—Fall River. More like a river than a creek, this spectacular water is located an hour northeast of Redding in the shadow of beautiful Mount Shasta. The Fall River is a 21-mile-long tributary to the Pit River. It is a designated Heritage and Wild Trout Stream. The cool clear waters of this world-class spring creek are fished from boats casting 30-40 feet downstream with big dries or nymph rigs tempting large rainbows along the bottom.

**WHEN:** May 30-June 3 Arrive Tuesday depart Saturday. 4 nights



**WHERE**: Circle 7 Ranch. Visit <u>https://www.</u> <u>theflyshop.com/adventures/circle7.html</u> to see this incredible location on the river. There are five homes on the ranch. We will have the entire White House, set up for eight members. A virtual tour online of White House is a must, to note the beauty of this home.

**WHAT:** With four bedrooms and 2.5 baths, the White House has ample room for eight members to spread out and fish as much as we want. Amenities include Satellite TV, Wi-fi, central air and a sundeck with a barbecue. Rental boats are available each day. We will be guided the first day (Wednesday) on the nuances of fishing from boats on a spring creek. The Fly Shop in Redding will supply four guides. Early June has major hatches of mayflies and, if we're lucky, the largest mayfly hatch, the Hexagenia, will have us casting

**PACKAGE: \$848.18** per member includes four nights accommodations, shared guide for full day on Wednesday, shared rental boat for two days Thursday and Friday. **\$484.93** is due on March 15, payable to The Fly Shop in Redding. **\$263.25** is due April 20, payable to The Fly Shop, and the last **\$100** is due to me by May 15 for a rental boat for two days.

**DINNERS:** Each member will have a partner to fish with as well as to cook for the group of eight. At the pre-trip meeting, we will determine the meal each twosome will cook on each night. Groceries may be bought at Safeway in the town of Burney, about 20 miles before getting to the ranch. Lunch on Wednesday will be provided by the guide. Breakfast and lunch are on your own.

**NOTES:** Drive time from Los Angeles is 9.5 hours. Other locations to fish include Hat Creek, Pit River, Baum Lake and McCloud River.

# Spey-O-Rama at the Golden Gate Angling & Casting Club!

Long Beach Casting Club was well represented at the Jimmy Green International Spey-O-Rama Tournament, on April 22 and 23. There were five LBCC members who participated—Larry Allen, Matt Abrams, Mike Ivy, David Ross and Tom Olson. We didn't make it to the podium, but most of us recorded our "Personal Best" total, and/or "Longest Cast" in a Spey tournament.

There were 37 casters in three divisions: Women's Open, Men's Open and the Men's Senior Division. Casters came from Argentina, Norway, England, Wales, Scotland, Ireland, Korea, British Columbia and several states from across the US.

To compete, a caster must qualify by completing specific casts to a minimum distance, unless he has been in a previous Spey-O-Rama. With the number of casters this year, each of us had to compete in a qualification round on Saturday for our respective division. The top ten scores go on to compete in the Finals on Sunday.

We are happy to report that David Ross advanced to the Finals in the Men's Open Division; a huge personal goal, and a great accomplishment to be in the top ten! Matt Abrams and Tom Olson also advanced to the Finals in the Men's Senior Division. Matt and Tom finished with Personal Best scores against a very competitive field of the best Senior Spey casters in the world.

Spey-O-Rama, or SOR, is the most prestigious Spey event in the world. It requires four different casts, and those four casts are totaled to compute each caster's score. The caster is allowed three casts of each type within a six-minute time limit. The casts are a Right Single Spey, Right Snake Roll, Left Single Spey and



Left Snake Roll. The longest cast in each category is used to calculate the caster's overall score

The tournament had a large audience at the Golden Gate Angling & Casting Club, for both the Qualification and Finals. The casters were introduced on a PA system as they waded out to the casting stations.

The caster is standing in three-foot deep water in the large pond at the Golden Gate Club. There are 40-degree line delimiters on each side of the pond and a buoy line in the middle. For a cast to count, it must start on one side of the buoy line and land on the other side.

Spey casting is two-handed casting: a right-hand cast is when the right hand is on top of the cork handle, and the left hand is on the bottom of the rod below the reel.A left-hand cast is done the opposite way. Casting left-handed can be harder than it looks; I like to think what it would be like if, in golf, you had to tee off on one hole right-handed and the next hole left-handed. But some casters find the opposite hand has less muscle memory and can be an advantage.

Practicing for the 2024 SOR and LBCC Tournaments starts this month! We have more members who want to participate next year. Please join us on Saturday mornings to learn Spey casting for fishing or to compete; everyone is welcome.

Signing up for a competition will get you to practice and become more proficient at Spey casting. As the LBCC Spey Captain, I'm very proud of our casters for participating, doing so well, and keeping LBCC "On The Map" in the world of Spey casting.



The Brookie Bash this year will be affected by the deep snowpack and high water levels. The streams and rivers may be unsafe for wading, and Little Lakes Valley may not be open, or the road up to it may be closed. In the last big snow year, the road up there didn't open until July 4. This year we had quite a bit more snow than the last big snow year.

What we intend to do, if the streams and higher elevation are not viable, is to fish the lower elevation lakes. Crowley should offer great fishing. Convict lake, Twin Lakes and the other Mammoth Lakes should also offer great fishing.

We will try to have the Tenkara event on Hot Creek. But, if waters are too high, we'll switch the location.

We may get into the streams, but be prepared to fish lakes if we can't. In the lakes, fishing is better with a float tube or boat. If you don't own either, consider renting one up at Mammoth. You can also get a guided boat on Crowley if you want to guarantee you get some nice fish. The guides the Club recommends are:

# Fly of the Month: FMAO Midge

Pelcome to spring 2023 near Dutch John, Utah. This year's annual trip was considerably more trying than previous ones. Snow, wind, low water, rock falls. You name it we experienced it. But through it all one dry fly seemed to shine above the others: the FMAO Midge. Well gee John, what does FMAO mean? Well I am sure all of you are aware of the acronym LMAO but here I have substituted the 'L' with 'F' and no it's not that word! Shame on you! The 'F' stands for **Freezing**...

Here's a rundown of the trip. I drove to Idaho Falls to tie at the East Idaho Fly Tying Expo and it snowed essentially the whole way. Arrived in shorts looking the fool from SoCal (well I am so, why not). Tied for two days with snow every day and cold winds then drove from Idaho Falls to Dutch John through snow and wind and a closed stretch of I-15 just north of Ogden. Snowed every day in Utah and often the wind was a sustained 25–35 mph and much higher gusts. There were also two recent rock falls: one in the 'A' section at Deadman Rapids and another in the 'B'; section on the right side of Red Creek Rapids. Very few of the guides had checked it out in the current flows so most folks were floating 'A'.

Ah the flow...they are doing repairs on the dam and taking liberties with the minimum allowable flow of 800 cfs. First day fishing it was 775 cfs and, floating the next day with my guide Doug Roberts of Old Moe Guide Service, it was the same. The second day floating it started 686 cfs, dropped as low as 576 cfs before getting back to 750 cfs. I have now seen two real extremes on this river: 576 cfs this year and 9600 cfs in 2010! Doug's brandi-new Clacka' now has a lot of river rash on its underside. Also, the flow from the dam was not temperature controlled and the water was a delightful 36°. As cold as the water was the air temp was usually anywhere between 15° and 20° in the morning and I would still be clearing ice out of my guides well into the afternoon. That, paired with the wind, made for some tough and uncomfortable conditions.

Fishing was tougher and slower than usual but still we managed to boat mid-20s to low 30s each of two days of floating but my walk and wade results were significantly less than usual. The lower water flow really fouled things up. Surprisingly, even with the wind and snow, both midges and Blue-Winged Olives came out

to play. The fly offered here was the pattern that nailed both hatches beautifully. Simple and easy to tie it does an excellent job of imitating a lot of smaller emerging insect species. Blue-Wings, Midges, Pseudocloens and others are all easily imitated. So tie some up and give them a try!

### MATERIALS FOR TYING THE FMAO MIDGE:

Hook:Tiemco 100 or similar; size #18-#24 (#22!)Thread:Veevus 12/0; blackShuck:Darlon; shrimp orangeBody:ThreadRibbing:Copper wire; extra smallWing:EP Triggerpoint fibers; whiteThorax:SLF Davy's Bug Dub; blackHackle:Whiting; dun grizzlyHead:Thread



#### INSTRUCTIONS FOR TYING THE FMAO MIDGE:

- 1. Insert your hook into the vise and attach your thread behind the head space. Wind about half the way down the shank of the hook. Select a very thin clump of the shuck material. Tie it in by continuing to wind down to the bend of the hook. I like to keep the shuck uneven so I tend to pull a few fibers out a bit longer or trim the end so that it tapers. KEEP IT LIGHT! You want to see through it.
- 2. Pull off a 4" length of wire ribbing and tie it in low on the far side of the hook. That's the perfect location for ribbing in the normal direction (low and on the front side for winding the reverse direction). This means that the first turn is in the correct location on the front side and not half the way up around the hook. Now smoothly wind your thread forward to the thorax. Remember, it's the body. Next follow it with 4 or 5 turns of ribbing and then tie it off.
- 3. Select a small amount of your wing material. Tie it in at the back end of the thorax and winding forward to front extent of the thorax so that it is protruding out both front and rear. (Be sure to leave room for the head!) This will also leave a level base for the thorax and hackle. Trim the rear part so that it extends about half the way down the body. Leave the front alone for now.
- 4. Select an appropriately sized hackle for the fly and tie it in at the back end of the thorax leaving a short section of exposed rachis between the barbs and your tying thread. Apply the thorax dubbing to your thread and wind towards the front with one final turn in front of the wing to help stand it up. Now wind the hackle two (2) turns forward and tie it off in front of the wing. A larger fly like an #18 might, *might* need three turns depending on the quality of your hackle.
- 5. Pull the wing back and trim it where the fly's body ends. Whip finish and go find some fish in freezing conditions and locations to catch 'em in!!!

**OPTIONS FOR THE FMAO MIDGE:** Change material colors to match the bug you're trying to imitate...

**Blue-Winged Olive:** Change the thread to dark olive, keep the shuck the same, change the ribbing to chartreuse, change the wing to BWO (a bluish gray), keep the hackle the same and change the thorax to dark olive.

**Pseudocloen:** Change the thread to bright olive, keep the shuck the same, change the ribbing to chartreuse, change the wing to PMD (tan-gray), change the hackle to light dun and change the thorax to olive.

**Pale Morning Dun:** Change the thread to light Cahill, change the shuck to gold, change the ribbing to dark olive thread, change the wing to PMD (tan-gray), change the hackle to light dun and change the thorax to gray/olive.

**Emerging Midge Option:** As midges emerge their thorax swells and is often red in color, so tie the fly the same but instead use red dubbing for the thorax.

**One Last Note:** If you want the fly to sit lower in the water, then simply remove the hackle from the underside of the hook. This is best done by using your scissors from the front of the fly and trimming as close to the thorax as possible. This will leave a very wide 'V' in the underside hackle almost like outriggers—that will support the fly but allow it to sit closer to the water.



# Tying Tip: Web Resources

I was asked to put together some links for fly tiers that I think have some of the best web presence. There are many good **AND** bad tying videos on YouTube and other sites. I'll be sharing some that I default to if I'm looking for information on techniques and materials, including full flies being tied.

The first person I use as a go-to for materials and techniques is <u>Wayne Luallen</u>. For those that do not know him, he is from the left coast, a <u>Buz Buszek</u> Recipient and one of the greatest "thinkers", when it comes to tying flies. He is constantly trying different ways to use thread and material to gain a better tie, from very small nymphs and dry flies to full-dressed salmon flies. If you ever get a chance to take a class from him at a FFI (Fly Fishers International) function, believe me, it is well worth it. I did so a number of years ago; his techniques and tips help me tremendously as I tie today. He has a series of short videos for various fly-tying tips and techniques on the Global Fly Fisher web site: <u>https://globalflyfisher.com/video/tips/all</u>.



Peruse the tips and you **WILL** find something you have never considered as you tie. When I met Wayne, he did his "Forking Two Tails" technique at a tying event that to me was virtual magic at the time. I can do it now, but not without the thread and material controls he advocates, the basis of everything we do in tying.

### Fly Tiers are Sooo Weird...

Recently, the Fly Tying Forum held a Saturday class focused on Catskill-style tying. These are the traditional flies that many of our older, more fly fishing-experienced members started out using. Despite being mostly Eastern patterns, they still worked out here, and continue to do so even today.



One of the patterns in the class was the classic dry fly "the Hendrickson". This pattern is comprised of dun rooster hackle fibers for the tail and wound dun hackle imitating the legs. The wing is wood duck flank feather tied in upright and divided. It's the body material that makes fly tiers weird...

In his classic book <u>Art Flick's Streamside Guide</u>, Art stated that the body material should be "...the pink fur from a vixen red fox (color comes from urine burns)".

Now I don't know who on earth would know this particular jewel of esoterica, but only a crazy fly tier could qualify. You will note the photo of a recently purchased and received red fox pelt I now possess. You can easily see the very pinkish fur in the "affected" area. You can also see the pinkish cast in the fur in each foreleg pit.

On a potentially stranger note, I posted this photo on a fly tying group page and received a note from Jim Slattery. Jim owns <u>Campfire Lodge</u> on the banks of the Madison River, runs <u>Jim's Fly Company</u> (a great place to buy Whiting necks, by the way) and was the <u>original inventor of the Stimulator</u> (nope, not <u>Kaufmann</u>). Anyway, Jim was told by a trapper that he trusts that the color does not, in fact, come from urine or excrement but instead by saliva after licking to "clean up".
