# Don't Trip this Fall! Get Good Wading Boots

ust how important are wading boots to your fishing success? While I'm not the one to turn to for advice on casting, tying flies, identifying hatches or tying fancy knots, I'm very competent in the skill of wading. In my experience, to wade successfully, the essentials are a good staff and great boots with the correct soles. Let's talk about boots and soles.

Over the last 30 years I have tried a variety of different boots and sole configurations, including Simms, Patagonia, Orvis and Korkers. To start off, you need a boot that has strong ankle support. This may seem counterintuitive, as it restricts your movement on land, but that's a small price to pay for

the extra stability while wading on slippery rocks. Once you get into the \$300 range, almost any boot will have good ankle support. I know \$300 is more than some pay for their rods, but unless you can stay on your feet you are not going to have much fun.

As to the soles: I don't care what clever names the manufacturers come up with to promote their rubber soles; rubber slips on slimy rocks. You can add studs which will help, depending on conditions, but are still not ideal.



waterborne diseases, you need to freeze or dry them thoroughly when moving between bodies of water. For those of you who think felt is a problem no matter what you do, the next best option is aluminum. To get a grip like Death itself, the aluminum bars are the best.

If you only have one pair of boots, I would go with

a studded felt sole. While not the best for trail

hiking, they are next to impossible to beat in all

types of water. To prevent the spreading of snails or

Unlike tungsten studs, which try to bite into hard rock, aluminum studs conform to the surface of the rock to give grip.

They work well, but they almost double the weight of the boot. The aluminum stars work well and are a bit lighter, but they

### This Month's Speaker: Doug Rodricks

#### Fly Fishing in the Eastern Sierra

#### TONY DAUS, 1ST VICE PRESIDENT

Doug Rodricks will be presenting on fly fishing in the Eastern Sierra. Doug will cover much of the water we have come to know and love, including the Upper Owens River, Hot Creek, Lower Owens River, East Walker River, Crowley Lake, Bridgeport Reservoir, Eagle Lake and San Joaquin River. He will also touch on a few of the lesser known Eastern Sierra streams and lakes.

Doug will be discussing the different fishing seasons in these areas, and what type of flies and techniques are used successfully during those times. He will cover proper use of the fly rod when it comes to fighting larger trout (rod angles, rod position, and how to play fish and get them in quicker). Doug will compare the similarities between lake-fishing and river-fishing techniques, and proper use of the fly rod in these different waters. He will also cover aquatic insects and smaller baitfish, and some of the best bugs that Sierra Drifters uses to imitate these sources of trout food. Finally, Doug will touch on proper handling, photographing and releasing of fish to better ensure survival of the resource.

Doug Rodricks grew up in sunny southern California, and would spend many summers vacationing in Yosemite National Park with his family before he could even crawl. The sights, sounds, and smells of the outdoors were instilled in him at a young age, as he experienced the beauty of the high country. His interest in trout fishing started at the age of nine, when he witnessed an angler reeling up a trout out of the Merced River. To this day, he still remembers the sun's bright glare reflecting off that fish's iridescent scales. It was this magical and captivating scene that would spawn his passion for fishing. The following year, he hooked his first trout in the gin-clear waters of that same river. Doug continued to fish anywhere



and any time he could throughout his growing years. The majority of his fishing was for trout in the Eastern Sierra and tuna, yellowtail, dorado and wahoo off the California Coast and Baja Peninsula.

Doug took up fly fishing at the age of 18 and would practice fly casting after school every evening. He vacationed in Idaho and West Yellowstone one summer, where he experienced drift-boat fly fishing for the first time. In 2001, he met Tom Loe in the Eastern Sierra where he continued his path toward learning the most exciting way of catching trout. Through this relationship with Tom, Doug soon found himself taking over as the owner of <u>Sierra Drifters Guide Service</u>.

### The Venison Stag: Our Annual Holiday Dinner



**DECEMBER 1 AT 9:00 AM:** we will need help with last-minute decorating and table setting.





seem to fall off with time. The same goes with almost any traction device you add to the soles: they fall off.

While I'm still working on finding the perfect boot, for now I have settled in with Korkers. I love the BOA system: being able to switch out the soles to accommodate different wading/hiking situations is a big plus, and they are easy to get on and off. The



only issue I have with Kokers and the BOA system is I can't seem to get them as tight as I would like. For my Korkers I have rubber soles with Aluminum Bars, studded felt and studded Vibram.

In conclusion my advice is get the best boot you can afford. The boot should have strong ankle support and felt soles with built-in studs.

I have always heard that "pride comes before the fall"; I hope that putting myself out as an expert wader will not bring about my fall.

Safe wading! stay on your feet and not in the water.

# Fly Tying Forum is Back!

The Forum is back from our September fishing break and busy learning new techniques and patterns. In addition to our usual Wednesday sessions, we have a special opportunity for all Club members: Steven Fernandez, one of California's most creative tiers and a Buszek Award winner, will teach a Saturday session November 4th from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Steven's going to teach some Eric Otzinger patterns for his Saturday session: the Hot Creek Caddis and the Hackle

Wing Dun. Please join us to tie along or just watch; lunch will be provided.



Matt Murdough will lead

off the regular Wednesday sessions this month with

John Barr's Slumpbuster and a similar Pine Squirrel Matuka pattern, based on it. These flies can be tied much smaller than



conventional rabbit-strip leeches or woolly buggers, even down to Size 18. They can be the winning ticket

for large trout that have "seen it all", including this pot-bellied rainbow who ignored six other patterns before nailing a "micro-" Pine Squirrel fly.



Next up, John Barnett will lead us in tying the Shady Lady. This foreand-aft-style streamer is tied on a keel hook and is designed to swim with



the hook point up. Although rarely seen in fly shops today, keel hooks used to be popular for streamers, wet flies, and even dry flies in the 1970s. John will supply the hooks for everyone to use. Mid-month, Allan Grosdidier will demonstrate his killer

crayfish pattern for smallmouth bass. Allan has been developing this fly for quite some time and we'll have a chance to try the latest generation!



Jeff Gross will wrap up November with the EC Caddis. This innovative pattern was developed by Ralph Cutter in 1981 to represent an emerging or crippled caddis. It features a two-tone body, trailing shuck

and parachute hackle, using elk hair as the wing post.

#### A Great Experience in the Range of Light

Seven intrepid Club members, Co-Leader Colin Kumabe, Sandeep Sasi, Mitch Hall, Mike Sweeney, Kevin Robinson, Craig Gibson and yours truly braved a day and night of freezing temperatures, some light rain/snow and incessant wind with stinging ice pellets to stalk and catch some small brook and golden trout in 20 Lakes Basin within the Hoover Wilderness. After setting up camp at the outflow of Lake Helen



in 20 of knots wind the first day out and then spending the next 15 hours pinned in our tents, the next day dawned clear, each following day became increasingly warmer and things began to look up. We spent the second day fishing our way past meadows,



meandering streams and several lakes. ## A "Glamp" on the Klamath

#### Or, the One that Got Away

The Klamath River has a special appeal for me. My mom's side of the family hails from the little nearby city of Eureka. We've spent a couple of weeks in that area every summer since I was a rugrat (and dinosaurs roamed the earth), and it has always felt like a second home.

My old great-uncle Sid had a summer place at Klamath Glen, which is right on the river near Highway 101, the main road in that area. The cabin was washed away in the 1955 flood, before I was born, but my family has many fond memories of time spent there.

At my mom's funeral, her brother recalled fishing in a boat with her on the Klamath, when they were kids. He tried to net a big salmon she was reeling in, but it got away, and she cried. I have to tell you, on my last trip to the Klamath, I found out exactly how she felt. But we'll get to that.

In August I got a message from Jake Campbell at Western Rivers Conservancy, an excellent Portland non-profit. They had scheduled a September fly fishing trip on the Klamath. Did I want to join them?

After a rough five seconds of soul-searching, I was in. Fishing on the Klamath is not something to lightly pass up, and Western Rivers Conservancy is one of my favorite non-profits. I've written previously in Target Talk about their efforts to keep the Klamath healthy (see our March, 2016, January, 2018 and November, 2018 issues).

These efforts have been centered around Blue Creek, a beautiful stretch of water and a vital "cold water refuge" for the fish. I've experienced firsthand the benefits of that cold water creek (see my March, 2016 Target Talk article). I believe preserving that water, and, now, keeping it off-limits to anglers, is crucial to the survival of anadromous fish on the Klamath, especially now that the dams are being removed.

The drive down was uneventful, and nice except for the predictable smoke from yet another fire. This fire hit "close to home" for me, as it was in the Smith River watershed in Northern California. I will come right out and say it: the Smith is the most beautiful river I've ever seen (check out my <u>November, 2018</u> article, for a description of it). I'm not looking forward to checking out the damage from that fire.

I was due at the boat ramp in Klamath Glen at 8:00 am, so I stayed the night in the coastal Oregon town of Gold Beach. Jake Campbell, the trip organizer, was staying there as well, so we got together for a very good seafood dinner at Spinners Restaurant (a Rob recommendation if you're ever in Gold Beach), washed down by some local beer.

The next morning the group assembled at the boat ramp, and took off upriver in jet boats to the camp, a little way upstream. The trip had been advertised as "glamping at its finest". "Glamping", for those not familiar, is a portmanteau of the words "glamorous" and "camping". If you don't know what a portmanteau is, you can probably figure it out from the context.

A quick inspection of the camping area confirmed the "glamping" claim. We were in tent cabins with the most comfortable cots I have ever slept on. Our meals were cooked by "Chef Francis", an expert practitioner of the culinary arts, and they were magnificent. But the pièce de résistance was the incinerating "loo".

Yes, that's right. The Incinolet Electric Incinerating Toilet, Toiletdom's answer to Dante's Seventh Circle of Hell, actually burns the human waste deposited in it. I confess I was afraid to use it for a day or two ("Portland Man Burns Down Yurok Sacred Tribal Grounds"), and I went with an old-fashioned shovel. But then my curiosity got the best of me. Watching the Incinolet do its thing is not for the faint-hearted, but I watched it, and I must say: Dante would have been proud.

And now to the fishing: our guides, Captain Brian Kohlman and Captain Randy Hamann (they're "captains" because they need a Coast Guard Captain's License to operate their jet boats, not because they'll have you flogged if you lose a fish—thank goodness), were top-notch, and put us on fish immediately.

Jake and I fished the first half-day with Brian and the rest of the time with Randy. They put us on plenty of fish. Unlike prior times (see my January, 2018 Target Talk article), the proportion of adult steelhead and "half-pounders" was close to equal. A half-pounder, as most of you know, is a steelhead who returns to fresh water after only a few months in the ocean. They are smaller than the adults, but also feistier.

But we were after adults, and we caught at least a few every day. Not bad for the "Fish of a Thousand Casts". Brian and Randy would typically anchor along slow-moving "glides", a little upstream from riffles. Jake and I would fish the glides, catch a half-pounder or two, and figure the next stop would be better.

Then we would approach the tailout of the glide into the riffle, and all Hell would break loose. One fish hit me and ran so hard that I skinned my knuckles on the reel crank as it went around and around at about 1,000 rpm. He kept going, and then got tired and let me reel him in a little. I got him close, and then he realized what was going on and took off again. This went on several more times, and then I finally had him.

I was reeling him in, as smoothly as I could. I hadn't noticed until I put my rig together that the reel, which I'd gotten at some angler's "I've had it with steelheading" sale, was set up for left-hand retrieve. I'm a right-hand retrieve guy (or at least that's my excuse) but there was no time to do anything about it.

The reel didn't seem to matter, until, all at once, it mattered. The fish was there, and then he was gone. In that moment, I knew how my mom felt when she cried over that salmon as a kid. I knew how my uncle felt about losing it, and I understand why it was important enough to him to weave it into her eulogy 80 years later.

Looking back, I enjoy thinking about the fight, and I consider it a nice "long-distance release". But that fish was a freight train, and I never even got a look at him. I have no idea how big he was, or how "chromie".

On the other hand, the trip was fantastic, and we never went very long without a fish. At night we would settle in for a wonderful dinner, drink wine and relax together. I'd brought a bottle of single-malt whisky from my trip to Scotland, and on the last night we sat around and drank it. By the time we went to bed, we had solutions for every problem facing the world today. It's a shame I can't remember any of them.

I'd like to thank my friends at <u>Western Rivers</u> <u>Conservancy</u> and <u>Confluence Outfitters</u> for a great trip. Now bring on the dam removal!

# Keep 'em Wet, and Release Your Fish Unharmed

The Long Beach Casting Club urges all members to practice catch-and-release. However, catch-and-release IS NOT simply releasing a fish that is likely to die.

Too often fish are held out of the water to allow the angler to:

- Take photos
- Remove flies

Taking photos for social media is the worst reason to take a fish out of water. After all, the photo of fish in social media only benefits the angler, never the fish. You should always take photos of the fish for social mediaf while the fish is in the water, never while it is out of the water.

Consider releasing the fish with your fly. A good guide is to hold your breath while removing the fly. If you need to breathe before the hook is removed, then place the fish back in the water to recover momentarily. If you are still unable to remove the hook before breathing, then seriously consider leaving the fly in the fish.

Remove hooks more efficiently with a tool. The Ketchum Release tool allows the angler to remove the hook while the fish is still in the water. This tool is faster than a hemostat. A hemostat requires a precise grip on the fly. The Ketchum Release tool is easy to slide along the tippet, then around the fly to remove the hook.

Catch and release more fish, with care. Practice casting at the Long Beach Casting Club Pond. See you at the Pond!

### Fly of the Month: Late Season Tiny Fly Rigging


A swe make our way towards fall and on into winter, it's time to consider some different ways to catch trout with the tiny flies that inhabit the stream at this time of the year. Years ago I learned a way to entice large trout to take very small flies on the Williamson River in southern Oregon. Now I have taken that same system and updated it with some easier-to-use components that can easily and quickly be adapted to other uses.

Those of you who have fished during this time of year (especially on the Owens and Hot Creek) have seen fish rising freely and yet, when you present a variety of dry flies to them, they reject your offerings. Obviously they don't like what you are offering but it may also be the fact that, while they are looking up, they ain't looking that far up and are eating just beneath the surface. Emerging small mayfly duns and midges are what's hatching and now you need a new way to fool the trout. Here's what has worked for me...

Why not give the fish two choices instead of one? Nope, I don't mean two dry flies or two nymphs—I'm talking about one of each by using a nymph rig and dry dropper but using tiny stuff and a few slight twists. On the Green River this spring I used this rig one afternoon and got a lot of fish and the distribution was about 50:50 between the dry and nymph. The flies that I used were a size #20–24 Doug's Stacked BWO and my favorite nymph, the Halo, with a copper colored tungsten bead in size #20. Pretty small stuff but, so were the flies that were hatching. You can find both patterns in past issues of Target Talk (find the HALO in February, 2022 & DOUG'S STACKED BWO in November, 2019).

I start this rig with a 12-foot monofilament leader that tapers to 3x. In the past I used to tie in a Perfection or Surgeon's loop at the tippet, but I now tie on a small (2mm) tippet ring, using a Clinch knot. These rings are much faster than dropper loops and create less drag on the water. I then tie on 3–5 feet of 4x tippet and about 6"–9" above the end I tie a Double Surgeons act as a Jam or Stop. You can now attach your dropper dry with 6x tippet using a Clinch knot above the Jam. Now, attach 6"-12" to 6x Flouro below the Jam Knot. This will be for your nymph. If your nymph does not have a bead head, then add a small split shot where the 5x and 6x are joined.

Add a small "pinch-on" foam strike indicator just above the tippet ring and you're ready to go. Fish the rig just like a dry fly but keep your eyes on the dry and the indicator. Small flies are tough to see!!!

#### **HOW TO FISH THIS RIG...**

I first learned about this type of rig years ago fishing with my then-wife Kelley and guide, Dale Siens, on the Williamson River, Oregon. We would launch his drift boat in Chiloquin at the ramp right below the famous "Blue Hole", and where the Sprague River joins the Williamson, and fish our way downstream. About half the way down we would arrive at "The Spot".

The Spot was a 150-foot long by 30-foot wide stretch of soft water that varied in depth from 20+ feet to about 8 feet at the far end. It was bracketed on the left by the main current of the river and on the right by a narrow section of faster water against the west bank. Causing this split in the current was a very wide rock and drop off. We would anchor on the downstream side of the rock, change to this rig and watch for trout rising or smutting.

Fishing started with a 45- to 50-foot cast to either the right or left seam and stacking line mends onto the water as necessary to maintain a drag free drift. The fish were usually feeding about 60 feet down the run but in a couple of instances Kelley and I would hook a fish with our entire fly line out. When we first started using this rig, we were only using a nymph—no dropper—a #8 or #10 split shot and an indicator. Now all of you know me as one to pump one fly in particular, the Halo, and The Spot is why! That fly outproduced everything else we tried, hands down. And even when we added a Parachute Adams as a dropper it still reigned supreme.

Now we were fishing downstream and the same can be done completely or mostly straight upstream but just make sure you are casting at a slight angle, so that, should fish not bite, you won't be picking up the rig to re-cast from right on top of it, and Happy Fishin'!



### Fly Tying Tip: Magnets 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition

A nearlier tip suggested some uses of magnets; here are a couple more ideas. At a Branson, MO tying event I was given a 'tool' by another local tier, Dennis Stead (**PHOTO#1**). Dennis thinks outside the box and comes up with some great tools and pre-weighted jig hooks. The tool is a 1/8" diameter earth magnet set in a piece of wood like a pencil. It is great to pick up small objects, especially hooks. As an alternate, use a piece of a magnet patch from a hook bag, cut and glued to the end of a popsicle stick (**PHOTO#1**). I put my piece of magnet on the back side of one I also use with some velcro, to pick out body dubbing.



If you use small hooks and tungsten beads (and some brass beads), the magnets can be used to hold the bead, with the hook in a plunger-style hackle plier. It is easier to thread the bead on than with bead tweezers (**PHOTO#2**; size 22 hook and 1.5mm bead). You can do the same with the pencil-type magnet. Anyone have other uses for magnets?
