Fly Fishing with a Personal Whitewater Craft

irst off, I wanted to give you a bit of background on my experience with whitewater craft. I have been camping and fishing the Kern River since I was a teenager. Once Diane and I were married and had children, we continued to enjoy the area: backpacking, rafting, fishing, and exploring the back country.

Back in 2011, I bought two <u>Waterstriders</u>, which are one-person rafts capable of navigating Class III rapids quite well (see picture). Since I was familiar with the Kern, I decided to make it the place for my inaugural run.

I bought a highquality Type III life vest and set off for the Powerhouse Run. The Powerhouse Run is considered a Class III/- in difficulty and goes from Powerhouse down to Kernville Park. There are two Class III rapids on this run: Big Daddy and Ewings. On this day the water was flowing a bit high, and the Big Daddy rapid had been altered by the homeowners to protect their homes.



long before I reached it, and I decided to pull over and take a look. I was not sure how to pick my way through the rapid and thought I should just get out and head for the road. After a brief conversation with myself I determined that if I quit, I 'd never know what my raft or I were capable of. So I charted my course, strapped down my rod and gear, and paddled over the edge.

Things were going quite well as I launched from the powerhouse. I could hear Big Daddy well upriver

This Month's Speaker: Captain Mike Gaglianese

Fishing the Texas Gulf Coast for Redfish

TONY DAUS, 1ST VICE PRESIDENT

aptain Mike Gaglianese is this month's speaker. A former baseball player at Purdue University, Mike spends nine months of the year, October-June, guiding mid-Texas coastal bay systems out of the town of Rockport. Here are some brief biographical notes Mike has put together for us.

"I grew up in upstate New York just South of the Adirondack Mountains. As I made my way through high school and college I decided I wanted to turn my love for fly fishing into a career. After playing baseball at Purdue for four years, I moved to Gunnison, CO to guide a Western river from a drift boat.

"Shortly after I realized there is no way to feed my fishing obsession in Gunnison year-round, so about 5 years ago I started coming down to Rockport on the Middle Texas Coast to get my fix in the off season. The endless wilderness and flats accessible by poling a skiff through water that was full of sight fishing opportunities kept me coming back and staying longer. With the help of my partner Captain Dane Scott, we spent the years fishing and guiding roughly 60 miles of the Texas Coastal Bay systems. Our season down here lasts from October to June until we escape the heat and head back to our drift boats.

"The terrain and habitat varies from marshland covered in Spartina Grass to crystal clear sand flats with a mangrove backdrop. These fish eat big flies and on a good day you can expect to be casting at fish all day. The variety and diversity of scenarios in this fishery makes it special. We see everything from schools to single tailers, spooky fish and fish that would eat a set of car keys as soon as they hit the water. All the fishing we do on the Texas flats is from the skiff, a true spot and stalk fishery."

My planned course was nothing short of chaotic, but I successfully navigated the run. At the bottom I rigged up and caught a beautiful 18-inch rainbow. I was feeling rather good about myself at this point. I did have one more thing I wanted to work out, however, and that would be to see if I could anchor in the soft water and fish

I tossed the anchor out and started playing around with it. I could not get it to stick, so I kept making adjustments, but to no avail. I was so busy working with the anchor that I failed to notice how close I was to the last rapid, called Ewings. All I had to do was miss the large boulders and I would be at Kernville Park. By the time I got the anchor in the raft, I was not only near the boulders but going over the top of one of them.

Over I went and nosedived into the hole at the bottom and flipped the raft. I went into the water, along with everything in the raft. I didn't recover any of my belongings but did manage to get to shore. After I got home and thought about the takeaway from this experience, it was as follows: for me, no anchor in the raft. For Diane, Bob always goes on the first run on his own.

When I first bought the Waterstrider there were only two options available: Waterstrider and Watermaster. Now there are many types of one-person or two-person rafts available. I'm not writing this to sell Waterstriders—just the concept of a personal watercraft.

Since my initial maiden voyage, I have enjoyed many incredible days with family and friends on various rivers in the West. We mostly use rafts for steelhead on the Lower Sacramento, Klamath and Trinity. Here is a link to a short video of my son on a rapid on the Klamath.

Here is a list of some of the lessons I have learned about the benefits of owning a personal watercraft.

- You can travel with them. Pictured are my brother and me flying them up to the Olympic Peninsula in Washington.
- I always feel like I am on a new adventure.



- Go slow, don't try to cover too much water.
- Stop, make a hot lunch, build a fire to warm up.
- Be prepared to get wet. I have not flipped since the Kern but have gotten plenty of water splashed on me. Have good waders and have a rain jacket that can fit over your life vest, so that while you get wet on outside you will be dry on the inside.
- Have a large dry bag with matches, extra coat, and anything else you wish to stay dry.
- Keep things lashed down.
- When rowing, keep rod clipped or tied into boat. I lost a Sage rod and reel on the Lower Sacramento when I sat it in the boat and it snagged on the bottom of the river; it was never seen again.
- I carry a Garmin satellite communication device.
- Be courteous to the guides you encounter on the water, as you are an outsider and you're fishing areas usually only fished by them and their guests.
- Always wear a type III life vest and have a throw rope for emergencies.
- Note: wear the vest!

- Wear fins. While it is best to stop and fish from shore, fins give better control in slower water when you wish to fish and drift. Always keep your feet up on the foot strap when encountering whitewater; don't let your feet dangle down.
- Don't expect to catch as many fish as when you fish with a guide.
- Fish differently! Look to side channels that guides might not fish. There are some big fish there.
- Do not go blindly into these channels. Get out of the raft and take a look before you head in. Beware of obstacles in or across the river.
- Expect to be patching up your rafts, as they will get leaks and holes in them. Blow them up before the trip and check for leaks.
- Always carry a hand pump and a set of quick patches.
- Let someone know the drift you plan to take, and where you will put in and take out.
- Make sure you know what the takeout looks like from the water; it will not look the same as it does from the ramp. I also mark the spot on my GPS.

While a personal watercraft will not work for all of you, I wanted to share how they can add to the fun and adventure of your flyfishing experience.



Fall River Trip, June 2024

For the fourth year, LBBC will be fishing the largest spring creek west of the Rockies—Fall River. More a river than a creek, this spectacular water is located an hour northeast of Redding in the shadow of beautiful Mount Shasta. The Fall River is a 21-mile-long tributary to the Pit River. It is a designated Heritage and Wild Trout stream. The cool clear waters of this world-class spring creek are fished from boats, casting 30-40 feet downstream with big dries or nymph rigs, tempting large rainbows along the bottom.



WHEN: May 28-June 1. Arrive Tuesday, depart Saturday. Four nights

WHERE: Circle 7 Ranch. Visit The Fly Shop's link to Circle 7 Ranch to see for yourself this incredible location on the river. There are five homes on the ranch. We will have the entire White House set up for a total of eight members.

WHAT: with four bedrooms and 2.5 baths, the White House has ample room for eight members to spread out and fish as much as you want. Amenities include satellite TV, wi-fi, central air and sundeck with BBQ. Rental boats are available each day. We will be guided the first day (Wednesday) on the nuances of fishing from boats on a spring creek. The Fly Shop in Redding will supply four guides. Early June has major hatches of mayflies and, if we're lucky, the largest mayfly



hatch, Hexagenia, will have us casting Size-8 dries to ravenous fish!

PACKAGE: \$822.44 per member includes 4 nights accommodations, shared guide for full day on Wednesday, shared rental boat for 2 days Thursday and Friday. This price is actually \$22 less than last year! \$422.44 is due on March 15, payable to LBCC. \$300.00 is due April 20, payable to LBCC, and the last \$100 is due to me by May 15 for rental boat for 2 days.

DINNERS: each member will have a partner to fish with, as well as to cook for the group of eight. At the pre-trip meeting, we will determine the meal each twosome will cook on each night. Groceries may be bought at Safeway in the town of Burney, about 20 miles before getting to the ranch. Lunch on Wednesday will be provided by the guide. Breakfast and lunch are on your own.

NOTES: drive time from Los Angeles is 9.5 hours. Other locations to fish include Hat Creek, Pit River, Baum Lake and McCloud River.

CAL TROUT PRESS RELEASE

Ready for some good news? The next big milestone in the Klamath River dam removal process is well underway. Reservoir drawdown was initiated this past month for all three of the remaining dams slated to be removed: Iron Gate Dam, JC Boyle Dam, and Copco 1 Dam. Copco 2 Dam was removed in 2023.

Deconstruction of the remaining dams is expected to begin sometime in May or June. Restoration and revegetation also began in Janaury, and crews start-ed reseeding the former reservoir footprints as reservoirs receded.

This is an exciting milestone towards dam removal, and we are thrilled to share the news with you on behalf of the Klamath River Renewal Corporation (KRRC)! KRRC is is the entity overseeing removal of the dams, and they are your best source for questions and real-time updates on dam removal. Watch the videos below to see reservoir drawdown in action on all three dams.

Removal of the four Klamath River dams will be the largest dam removal and salmon restoration project in the history of the United States.



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Fly Tying Forum March Schedule

Welcome to the March edition of the LBCC Fly Tying Forum, especially to all those graduates of the Beginner's Fly Tying Class.

Cecil O'Dell will start us off this month with a modern version of the classic Green Rock Worm. As you can tell from the picture, this pattern closely imitates a caddis nymph, perfect for those hungry spring trout on the upper Owens!



Matt Murdough will follow with a class on techniques for small dry flies. "Small" is, of course, a relative term, so Matt will ask everyone to try tying a dry fly two sizes smaller than their personal best. The



pattern for the night will be an A.K. Best style Blue-Winged Olive with a quill body. This diminutive mayfly hatches nearly year-round in most Western states and provides an opportunity for dry fly fishing even when the thermometer plunges.

Allan Grosdidier is up next with the Prince Nymph. This popular pattern was originated by Oakland's Doug Prince in the 1930s, and now has many variations. The weighted bead-head Prince is one of the most common versions seen today.





f you're planning that big Alaska fishing trip for this year and want to know what one fly is guaranteed to work statewide, come to our fourth session of the month. Matt will demonstrate how to tie the Dolly Llama, a guide favorite streamer that will catch all five species of Pacific salmon, steelhead, rainbows, Dolly Varden, Artic char and grayling.

Fly Tying Tip: Hackle Wrap

This suggestion comes from Gary Borger whom we had as a guest last November here in Arkansas. If you are tying emergers, those have wings, leg shucks and all kinds of messy appendages. If you are a fan of the "Quigley Hackle Stacks", this is an alternate with similar buggy results. It can also be used with dry flies if you want a more durable hackle, though not pretty (but do the fish care?).



Prepare your fly tail and abdomen as you normally would and tie in your hackle (Photo-1). Take your feather and thread together, wrap forward to the eye of the hook, then back to the tie-in point, then back to the front. At this point you can release your feather and it will stay wrapped due to the thread intertwined with the feather (Photo-2).





Now you can tie off the excess feather and trim. If desired, you can trim the hackle barbs on the bottom and you have a messy hackle that is durable with the thread wrapped through it (Photo-3).

Steelhead Report Cards are (Over) Due!

Tust a friendly reminder that your steelhead catch report is due to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW). The fishing regulations require that everyone with a Steelhead Card is required to report the catch, regardless of whether you catch none, one or many.

The CDFW uses the information collected on the steelhead catches to track angling trends each year. Then, the CDFW makes fishery management decisions. So, the information you submit in your reports directly influences the way rivers fished by all of us are managed by the CDFW.

Reports were due January 31, but reporting doesn't close until April 1. Report using the following link: https://wildlife.ca.gov/Conservation/Inland-Fisheries/Steelhead-Report-Card

Fly of the Month: Fran Betters' The Usual

Thave heard a rumbliing among members that I have been mean-spirited by regularly posting flies in this rag that are very taxing or too difficult to tie. That simple and effective flies should be made more available. I agree that simple and effective flies are a wonderful thing to tie, but I also want to teach techniques and drag my fellow tiers along by their bootstraps, aiming them towards the heights of competency and excellence! However, in the name of fairness, here is a fly that is sure to delight those wishing something simple, messy and quite effective: Francis (Fran) Betters' The Usual.

Fran Betters was a tremendous tier and innovator who lived in the Adirondacks and operated his fly shop (the Adirondack Sport Shop) near the West Branch of the AuSable River. He was also an author of the following titles: Fishing the Adirondacks (1982), Fish Are Smarter in the Adirondacks (1983), Something's Fishy in the Adirondacks (1985), Fran Betters' Fly Fishing, Fly Tying and Pattern Guide (1986), Fran Betters' AuSable River Guide (1991) and more.

As to fly tying, he was the creator of several popular flies such as **the Haystack** when he was, I believe, in middle school. Nothing major in terms of an original pattern, just the original form of the entire Comparadun family of flies! You like Wulff flies? Well Fran was the inventor of one of the very best: the **AuSable Wulff**. Sadly Fran passed in September, 2009. He has been honored with a place in the **Fly Fishing Hall of Fame** of the Catskill Fly Fishing Center and Museum.

The Usual is a simple searching pattern, like an Adams, a Royal (or AuSable) Wulff, or a Stimulator. It is a mess to look at and that's by design. It is comprised entirely of hair from the foot of a Snowshoe hare which has excellent flotation qualities. I like to use the portion of hair that is between the "toes", as it tends to be

a bit straighter and long enough to tie larger sizes. I usually tie this in two color versions: one all natural tannish-white, and one with a wing and tail of dyeddun Snowshoe and a body of olive-green Snowshoe. The fly can be tied in multiple sizes, from #10 all the way down to #20.

So here's your chance: Van Derhoof showing his kind and gentle side. If you want to tie something, but you don't give a ding-dang how it turns out, then Fran Betters' The Usual is for you!

MATERIALS FOR TYING THE USUAL:


Hook: Tiemco 100 or similar; #10-#20 Thread: Veevus 10/0; fluorescent red or orange

Wing: Snowshoe hare Tail: Snowshoe hare

Body: Snowshoe hare; widely spaced, allowing

underbody to show.





INSTRUCTIONS FOR TYING THE USUAL:

1. De-barb your hook and insert it into your vise. Attach your thread to the hook at the head space and wind down about half the length of the shank, then back towards the eye to a point where your thread is about 1/3 of the shank back from the eye. Over the years I have seen a couple of ways to tie this and I have found that tying in the wing first is, for me anyway, the best and most efficient.

Now, if you have never worked with snowshoe hare you will quickly notice that the hair is unruly (or worse than unruly). This is part of its appeal and why it's used. All that spiky hair aids in floating the fly. Carefully (the hare's claws are usually still attached and they're sharp) spread the center toes apart until they separate slightly, and remove a clump of the longer, straighter hair with your scissors. There will be a lot of basal hair and you need to remove most of it, but save it as this will be the body. Measure the wing so that it is the length of the hook and tie it in with the tips forward. The material is bulky so it will take about five to seven wraps to lock it in. Trim away the butt ends on a shallow taper back towards where the tail will be. This will help in making the underbody even. Now wind the thread back to the end of the shank.

2. Select a slightly smaller bunch of hair to be used for the tail. Again, remove most of the basal fur from your clump and measure the tail for length. It should be the length of the hook shank. Tie the

tail down, using about four to six touching wraps, winding back towards the eye. Trim away the butt ends on a similar angle and taper as the wing butts were trimmed. Okay, I know you want to be messy but you want the fly to last, right? So please do this for me. Now continue the touching wraps all the way to the back of the wing and then reverse direction to the tail. What we want here is a nice, fairly smooth red or orange underbody.

3. Almost home...using the basal fur you saved from the wing and tail, apply the dubbing material to your thread into a 2"- or 3"-long dubbing noodle. Don't make the dubbing too tight. The body wants to look spiky and the thread color should show through (this should delight messy tiers). Wind the dubbing forward but don't use touching turns leave the slightest bit of underbody color showing below. Once you get to the wing, stop winding the dubbing. Grab the wing and pull it back, and squeeze as hard as you can with your thumb and forefinger for about five seconds. Yeah, really squeeze! Now, still pulling the wing back, continue winding your dubbing in front of the wing to create a dam to keep the wing upright. This should only take two or three turns of dubbing. If you have any dubbing left, remove it, wind a neat (okay, messy) head and whip finish. Hope y'all had fun!
