Leader's Line...

Casting Tournaments at the LBCC

wanted this Target Talk to be about my small experience with casting tournaments at the club. With the casting tournament they have 10 or so different games and only one is for big distance; the rest are precision casting. I did my first two (C division) and little did I know Cecil O'Dell had signed both of us up for another two. I thought it was only fair that I return the favor, and signed us both up for another couple of events.



Oh, the arrogance of the people at the tournament! One of the events was casting a plug with a spinning rod. I did not have a spinning rod so one of the advanced casters gave me theirs to use. I promptly broke off the plug and leader. They told me no big deal; they were happy I was participating. Then in another event where you cast a dry fly out to circles at various distances, I again did not have the proper equipment. The top woman caster had just completed her event and asked if I wanted to use her setup. Nothing but acceptance. And a whole lot of fun.

Fly Tying Forum April Schedule

MATT MURDOUGH, MEMBER

Welcome to the April edition of the LBCC Fly Tying Forum. It's time to stock up for spring trout fishing and get a head start on flies for that Alaska fishing trip. Matt will lead two classes this month on mayfly emergers. The first class covers the earliest stage of the emergence process when the nymph has risen to the surface film, but has not yet cracked its



wing case. Ed Engle's floating nymph does a great job imitating this phase; we will tie the Blue-Winged Olive (BWO) version. Ed's pattern uses the dubbingball parachute-hackle technique, a useful addition to a fly tier's toolkit. Matt's second class covers a later phase of the cycle, when the mayfly has emerged from its shuck, but the wings have not yet completely



unfurled. Wayne Luallen's CDC Emerger beautifully captures this moment in time. In class we will tie the Pale Morning Dun (PMD) version of Wayne's pattern. The two emerger classes will continue to build on techniques from our previous (March) session on small dry flies.



We have two newcomers to the instructor chair this month! Bob Campbell will teach a salmon and steelhead pattern, the Purple Performer. This quick tie uses only three materials, thread and a hook—it's a handy pattern for Alaska rivers where all things purple are often on the menu. Kendall Blackburn wraps up the month with the Chubby Montana, a variant of the high floating Chubby Chernobyl. This pattern works well by itself or as an indicator for a suspended nymph.

We will send out pattern sheets to the Fly Tying Forum distribution for all the flies covered in the coming month. Anyone who is interested in leading a tying session should reach out to Matt Murdough (mmroaringbrook@gmail.com) to get onto the schedule. If you have a pattern or genre of fly you'd like to learn how to tie, let us know; we likely have someone who can demonstrate it. We're looking forward to seeing some new faces at the Forum!

Then you need to check around, because they are a manufacturer of some of the finest saltwater and salmon/steelhead reels you can buy.

Now I know I don't really need to gild the lily but with the exception of three, all of the reels are Hatch Finatic 7s and 9s and they are new in box! Completely unused. Brandy, dandy. Now there are only a couple of the smaller 7s but there are a bunch of 9s. If you want a great reel for permit, dorado or small tarpon or a two-handed reel for a 13' or longer rod, then here is your chance.

Price? Well these reels retailed for \$650 and \$800. The Club is going about half price at \$350 for the 7s and \$400 for the 9s. As a Hatch guide/pro staff I couldn't even get them at that low a price!

Additionally, there are some Nextcast lines—all Skagit-style heads and all with an integrated sinking front end. Price is \$30 each.

Improving your casting is key to adding additional abilities to accurately present a fly to a fish, or cast with increased distance. It is also necessary if one wants to learn how to double haul—a class in the near future. Also, learning different mends and curve casts can dramatically increase your ability to catch fish.

Streamer Fishing the Lower Owens River

Try streamer fishing the Lower Owens River; you will be hooked once you feel the tug of the fish striking your fly. Most of us go to the Lower Owens River and just fish with nymphs, wet or dry flies without ever tossing a streamer.

VITAL COMPONENTS TO STREAMER FISHING.

Rod: The best rod to use is the same rod you take to fish nymphs or dry flies (i.e. 5- or 6-weight is a minimum).

Reel: Take a reel with sinking line and leader in your fishing vest. For the Lower Owens River, drag is not very important to fight the fish. However, at some other rivers, reels with moderate quality drag systems are enough for even large trout (22 inches and more).

Fly Line: Sinking fly line with a head that sinks fast and is at least 25 feet long. The first 30 feet of these fly lines weigh at least 225 grains. I will give more detail on how to select streamer lines in a future Target Talk article.

Tippet: At least 10-lb. test (or 1x tippet) for the Lower Owens River, or 15-lb. test at streams with larger fish.

Streamer Flies: Start with Size-6 Woolly Buggers, all black or all white, or any streamer you are comfortable casting 30 to 40 feet. This is a very deep rabbit hole to head into; there are many flies to tie and fish, with too few fishing days.

Cast: Sinking fly lines don't cast as easily as your floating lines. You will feel your rod load much more while casting the sinking fly lines. Watch out for the tailing loops and the fly line hitting your head. Be ready to cast the fly at least 40 feet.

Retrieve: The most important moment in the retrieve is one second after the fly hits the water. The fish

sense the fly landing and look at the fly. A stationary fly looks like a leaf or stick landing in the water and will thus be ignored. The fly moving immediately after landing will keep the attention of fish and hopefully trigger a striking response. Streamer fishing involves making the fly come to life. Vary speed and length of strips; also try pausing. Sometimes stripping at a consistent rhythm works, other times varied rhythm works. Experiment until you find the rhythm that works.

When: Streamer fishing can be good any time of the day, even without an insect hatch. They perceive the fly as something that looks good enough to bite; let's call this a "thing". The know this large "thing" is equivalent in calories to dozens of dries, midges or nymphs. Look at this thing as waving a steak in front of a teenager.

You won't feel the tug until you have tried streamer fishing. Before you go, practice your casting at the Pond. Remember sinking fly line casts differently; see you at the Pond.

Fly Tying Tip: Bucktail Trimming

When getting ready to tie in bucktail (or other hair) for Clouser Minnows and similar, I like to trim bucktail hair to length prior to tying it down. At the same time I trim the hair, I put an angle on the cut, so when tied down, the ends have a smooth ramp for the thread.



I have found that if you start the cut so that the hairs are shorter to longer (**Photo-1**), the last hair wants to push away from the blades.



If you start with the hair being on the long side to start (**Photo-3**) and then trim...





Even with serrated scissors, you get some longer ones that you have to further trim (**Photo-2**).

The cut comes out better, so that you can do a tie-in (Photo-4) without additional cuts.



Fly of the Month: PMD Last Chance Cripple

Okay, easy is over and messy is still happening. Last month you all had a chance to tie a messy, easy-to-tie and effective pattern. This month you're going to get another sorta messy pattern but it is a tad more challenging to tie. The best thing about this pattern is that is a bona fide picky trout catcher. Born on one of the toughest trout waters on the planet, let's learn <u>René Harrop's</u> Last Chance Cripple.


René has been tying since he was nine (1954) and is one of the best and more innovative tiers out there. He and his wife Bonnie founded House of Harrop and René was also a co-founder of Trouthunter Lodge (1968) and fly fishing store on the banks of the Henry's Fork River in Last Chance, Idaho—hence the fly's name. Last Chance is just north of the famed Harriman Ranch State Park. Here trout were born just to torment you as they eat everything on the surface except your fly! He is also a founding member of the Henry's Fork Foundation (1984).

As the fly's name states it is a cripple pattern and a derivation of some of <u>Bob Quigley's</u> cripple patterns from the 1980s. Bob was a Northern California fly tying genius and developed his patterns for fishing the equally tough Fall River and Hat Creek. If you have ever watched a mayfly cripple on the water's surface it is anything but the slim, delicately-proportioned insect we think of. In many cases it is trapped and struggling to pull itself free from its nymphal shuck. It looks like a mess and hence the brilliance of these types of patterns—messy by design. While I have tied this as a Pale Morning Dun (PMD), any mayfly species that has difficulty hatching, or spends an extended period of time on the surface waiting for its wings to dry enough to fly away, is fair game for this pattern. I am currently tying Blue-Winged Olives (BWO) for the Green River where I will likely be fishing as you read this! Yeah, I'm gloating...

Tie some of these up for tackling those tough hatches and tough fish. Fish 'em as a single dry or as the dropper with an emerging nymph or soft hackle on the point. One last note: the fly alone is not the solution to picky fish. In most cases it's the cast, presentation and drift. A drag-free float is imperative and the Last Chance Cripple is the icing on the cake.

MATERIALS FOR THE PMD LAST CHANCE CRIPPLE:

Hook: TMC 100BL or fave dry fly; size to match
Thread: Veevus 12/0; primrose (Light Cahill)
Tail: Three strands of wood duck
Shuck: Darlon or Zelon; gold
Body: Magpie Materials turkey biot; PMD
Thorax: BRF Zelon dubbing; PMD
Wings: CDC puff; light dun
Hackle: Whiting dry fly; dun cree or light dun



INSTRUCTIONS FOR TYING THE PMD LAST CHANCE CRIPPLE:

- Start by inserting the hook into the vise and attaching your thread behind the head space with a jam hitch. Wind the thread down to the start of the hook bend, and try to keep it flat by counterspinning your bobbin holder. Select three or four strands of wood duck flank and tie them in. Their length should be the length of the shank.
- 2. Now select about 12 to 24 strands of Darlon or Zelon shuck material. The quantity depends on the fly's size. Now tie in the material over the wood duck tail and cut the shuck so that it is half the length of the tail. I like to keep the shuck fairly light and translucent in appearance.
- 3. Select a biot and tie it in with the cupped side up and the translucent edge pointing forward. This will insure that the "herl" on the trailing edge of the biot stands up. Now wind the biot forward, evenly spacing the "herl", showing off its segmentation, to the thorax and tie it off. If you need to go a bit into the thorax area, that will be fine as it will be covered by the thorax dubbing.
- **NOTE:** I've always tied this a bit differently from most other tiers. Most tiers dub the thorax, leaving a larger than normal (2x or 2¹/₂x) head space. Then they tie in the wing and hackle in that expanded head space. Here's what we are going to do...
- 4. Select a nice fluffy CDC puff and tie it in right behind the head space. The length of the wing should be the length of the hook, and the wing should point out over the eye. Don't cut the butt ends! Now cover the butt ends with touching thread wraps to the start of the thorax. Cut the butt ends about half the way over the body.
- 5. Select a properly-sized hackle and tie it in with the dull side forward, right at the rear edge of the thorax. Apply the thorax dubbing to your thread—it should be loose and straggly. Don't trim or remove any longer guard hairs. Now make



one turn of the dubbing behind the hackle and then wind it forward and make one turn in front of the wing, to slightly stand it up, and then finish behind the wing.

6. Wind the hackle forward two to four turns, depending on the size of the fly. Tie off the hackle using three thread turns right behind the wing. Lift the wing up and place one or two turns in front of the dubbing, and then finish with a three or four turn whip finish. You and your Last Chance Cripple are now ready to take on the toughest of trout!
